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**A BILL FOR AN ACT**

101 **CONCERNING THE LOCAL REGULATION OF MASSAGE FACILITIES.**

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**Bill Summary**

*(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at <http://leg.colorado.gov>.)*

Current law authorizes a local government to license and regulate the operation of massage facilities within the local government's jurisdiction and to prevent the operation of illicit massage businesses, which are businesses that engage in massage but also engage in human-trafficking-related offenses. For the purpose of local enforcement, the bill expands the definition of "illicit massage business" to include a massage business that engages in crimes other than human-trafficking-related offenses.

Current law states that if a local government adopts a resolution or ordinance to establish business licensure requirements or to prohibit unlawful activities relating to illicit massage businesses, the resolution or ordinance must not be more restrictive than the requirements set forth in state law. The bill removes this limitation. The bill also allows a local government to impose local licensing requirements in addition to those requirements prescribed in state law.

Current law allows a local government to impose an administrative fee not to exceed \$150 for issuing or renewing a license. The bill removes the \$150 cap on such fees. Current law exempts businesses that held licenses before August 10, 2022, from the administrative fees. The bill removes this exemption.

Current law allows a local government to deny, revoke, or suspend a license under certain circumstances. The bill allows a local government to establish additional grounds to deny, revoke, or suspend a license.

Current law prohibits a person from owning a massage facility if the person:

- Has not submitted to a required background check at least 30 days before assuming an ownership interest in the massage facility; or
- Has been convicted of or entered a plea of nolo contendere that is accepted by the court for any of certain enumerated offenses.

The bill provides that, if a local government establishes business licensure requirements for massage facilities, the resolution or ordinance adopted by the local government must prohibit ownership of massage facilities by the types of persons that are prohibited from ownership in current law.

Current law states that preventing the operation of illicit massage businesses is a matter of statewide concern, and licensing and regulation of massage facilities is a matter of mixed statewide and local concern. The bill states that preventing the operation of illicit massage businesses is a matter of mixed statewide and local concern.

2           **SECTION 1.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 30-15-401.4, **amend**  
3 (1)(a)(III), (1)(a)(IV) introductory portion, (1)(a)(IV)(A), (1)(b)(I), (2)(d),  
4 (3)(a), (4)(a) introductory portion, (4)(a)(II), (4)(a)(IV) introductory  
5 portion, (4)(a)(XI.5) introductory portion, (4)(a)(XI.5)(C), (4)(a)(XII)  
6 introductory portion, (4)(a)(XII)(D), (4.5)(a) introductory portion, (5)

1 introductory portion, (6), (7) introductory portion, (7)(g)(II), and  
2 (7)(h)(III); and add (3)(d) and (4)(a)(XIII) and (7)(i) as follows:

6 (1) (a) The general assembly finds and declares that:

7 (III) All local governments in the state already have authority to  
8 enact resolutions or ordinances to establish licensing authorities to  
9 regulate or otherwise regulate massage facilities and to deter and shut  
10 down illicit massage facilities WHERE THE FACILITIES EXIST OR ARE  
11 REASONABLY LIKELY TO OCCUR; and

12 (IV) Because preventing the operation of illicit massage facilities  
13 by requiring current and prospective operators, owners, and employees of  
14 massage facilities to submit to periodic background checks ~~is a matter of~~

4 BUSINESSES, AND SAFEGUARDING AND PROMOTING PUBLIC HEALTH,  
5 SAFETY, AND WELFARE;

6 (2) As used in this section, unless the context otherwise requires:

7 (d) "Illicit massage business" means a business that may provide  
8 PROVIDES massage but AND:

9 (I) Engages in human-trafficking-related offenses, as described in  
10 sections SECTION 18-3-503 and OR 18-3-504; OR

11 (II) COMMITS OTHER OFFENSES AS DEFINED BY STATE LAW OR  
12 LOCAL ORDINANCE.

13 (3) (a) In addition to any other powers, a local government may  
14 adopt a resolution or ordinance to establish business licensure  
15 requirements or to regulate and prohibit unlawful activities to prevent the

24 JANUARY 1 OF EACH YEAR THEREAFTER. AS USED IN THIS SUBSECTION  
25 (4)(a)(II), "INFLATION OR DEFLATION" MEANS THE ANNUAL PERCENTAGE  
26 CHANGE IN THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF LABOR'S BUREAU OF  
27 LABOR STATISTICS CONSUMER PRICE INDEX, OR A SUCCESSOR INDEX, FOR

1 DENVER-AURORA-LAKEWOOD FOR ALL ITEMS PAID FOR BY URBAN  
2 CONSUMERS. THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT MAY ROUND THE ADJUSTED FEE  
3 AMOUNT UPWARD OR DOWNWARD TO THE NEAREST DOLLAR.

4 (IV) Allowing a licensing authority, or a THE licensing authority's  
5 designee, to deny an application FOR REASONS DESCRIBED IN THE  
6 ORDINANCE OR RESOLUTION ADOPTED BY THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT,  
7 INCLUDING if:

8 (XI.5) Granting the A licensing authority, or the licensing  
9 authority's designees, authority to revoke or suspend a license FOR  
10 REASONS DESCRIBED IN THE ORDINANCE OR RESOLUTION ADOPTED BY THE  
11 LOCAL GOVERNMENT, INCLUDING if:

12 (C) An owner of the licensed massage facility has been convicted  
13 of or entered a plea of nolo contendere that is accepted by the court for an  
14 offense listed in subsection (4)(a)(IV)(C) of this section or is registered  
15 as a sex offender or is required by law to register as a sex offender, as  
16 described in section 16-22-103; and

17 (XII) Granting a licensing authority, or THE licensing authority's  
18 designees, the authority to revoke or suspend a license for violating  
19 prohibited acts pursuant to subsection (5) of this section. A licensing  
20 authority, or the licensing authority's designees, may temporarily suspend  
21 a license with AND SCHEDULE a hearing to be scheduled within fifteen  
22 days when AFTER the licensing authority MAKES FINDINGS AS DESCRIBED

2 NECESSARY BY THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT FOR THE PROTECTION OF PUBLIC  
3 HEALTH, SAFETY, AND WELFARE, SO LONG AS THE RESOLUTION OR  
4 ORDINANCE DOES NOT CONFLICT WITH THE REGULATION OF THE PRACTICE  
5 OF MASSAGE THERAPY PURSUANT TO ARTICLE 235 OF TITLE 12.

6 (4.5) (a) ~~A person is prohibited from being an owner if the person~~  
7 ~~either~~ IF A LOCAL GOVERNMENT ADOPTS A RESOLUTION OR ORDINANCE TO  
8 ESTABLISH BUSINESS LICENSURE REQUIREMENTS FOR MASSAGE FACILITIES  
9 IN ACCORDANCE WITH THIS SECTION, THE BUSINESS LICENSURE  
10 REQUIREMENTS MUST PROHIBIT A PERSON FROM OWNING A MASSAGE  
11 FACILITY IF THE PERSON:

17 or ordinance, a law enforcement officer may follow the penalty  
18 assessment procedure described in section 16-2-201 for any violation of  
19 the prohibitions set forth in subsection (5) of this section. As part of the  
20 ~~local government~~ COUNTY ordinance or resolution authorizing the penalty  
21 assessment procedure, the ~~local government~~ COUNTY may adopt a  
22 graduated fine schedule for violations of the prohibitions set forth in  
23 subsection (5) of this section. A graduated fine schedule may provide for  
24 increased penalty assessments for repeat offenses by the same person.

25 (b) A ~~local government~~ COUNTY may specify in the resolution or  
26 ordinance that a massage facility that engages in two or more violations  
27 of the resolution or ordinance is a public nuisance, as described in section

1 16-13-303, unless the violation is already a public nuisance, as described  
2 in section 16-13-303. The county attorney of a county, the city attorney  
3 of a city and county, ~~the city or town attorney of a municipality~~, or the  
4 district attorney acting pursuant to section 16-13-302 may bring an action  
5 in the district court of the county for an injunction against the massage  
6 facility that violates the resolution or ordinance.

7 (7) A RESOLUTION OR ORDINANCE ADOPTED BY A LOCAL

17 (i) A HOTEL OR RESORT WITH AT LEAST FIFTY ROOMS, AT WHICH

19 **SECTION 2.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 31-15-401, **add** (1)(s)  
20 as follows:

21 **31-15-401. General police powers.**

22 (1) In relation to the general police power, the governing bodies  
23 of municipalities have the following powers:

24 (s) TO LICENSE AND REGULATE THE ESTABLISHMENT AND  
25 OPERATION OF MASSAGE FACILITIES TO PREVENT HUMAN TRAFFICKING  
26 AND THE OPERATION OF ILLICIT MASSAGE FACILITIES IN ACCORDANCE  
27 WITH SECTION 30-15-401.4.

1           **SECTION 3.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 31-15-407, **amend**  
2 (1) as follows:

3           **31-15-407. Statewide policy to prevent the operation of illicit**  
4 **massage businesses - background checks required - legislative**  
5 **declaration.**

6           (1) The general assembly finds and declares that because  
7 preventing the operation of illicit massage businesses, as defined in  
8 section 30-15-401.4, ~~is a matter of statewide concern, and licensing and~~  
9 ~~regulation of massage facilities~~ is a matter of mixed statewide and local  
10 concern, it is necessary, appropriate, and in the best interest of all  
11 Coloradans to require, uniformly throughout the state as a matter of  
12 statewide policy, that every current and prospective operator, owner, and  
13 employee of a massage facility submit to a background check, as defined  
14 in section 30-15-401.4 (2)(a.5), which generally means a  
15 fingerprint-based criminal history record check as required by section  
16 30-15-401.4.

17           **SECTION 4. Act subject to petition - effective date.** This act  
18 takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following the expiration of the  
19 ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly (August  
20 12, 2026, if adjournment sine die is on May 13, 2026); except that, if a  
21 referendum petition is filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V of the  
22 state constitution against this act or an item, section, or part of this act  
23 within such period, then the act, item, section, or part will not take effect  
24 unless approved by the people at the general election to be held in  
25 November 2026 and, in such case, will take effect on the date of the  
26 official declaration of the vote thereon by the governor.
