Subject to available appropriations, this bill requires the State Librarian to contract with a nonprofit to implement the Colorado Imagination Library Program. The bill will increase state expenditures on an ongoing basis.

Summary of Legislation

This bill requires the State Librarian, subject to available appropriations, to contract with a nonprofit organization for the creation and operation of the Colorado Imagination Library Program. The contractor must:

- create and operate the program, including establishing county affiliate programs in all counties;
- manage daily operations;
- develop, promote, and coordinate a public awareness campaign; and
- contract with a national nonprofit foundation to provide high-quality, age-appropriate books each month to eligible children.

The contractor must cover 50 percent of the statewide cost to provide books from the national nonprofit foundation, with each county-based affiliate program paying the remainder of the cost to the contractor. On or before July 1 of each year the State Librarian has entered into a contract, the contractor must submit a report to the Colorado Department of Education (CDE) and the General Assembly concerning the total number of eligible children residing in each county. Finally, the bill allows the CDE to seek gifts, grants, and donations for the program.

Background

The Dolly Parton's Imagination Library is a non-profit that provides books in the mail for free to children under the age of 5. Currently, there are 27 local affiliates in Colorado that serve 12,573 children statewide. According to the 2017 American Community Survey, there are 334,250 children under the age of 5.

Assumptions

Full implementation of the bill requires an appropriation; however, the fiscal note assumes that no General Fund will be appropriated for this bill in FY 2020-21. If sufficient gifts, grants, or donations are received, the bill could be implemented.

State Revenue

Starting in FY 2020-21, revenue to the CDE increases if CDE receives any gifts, grants, or donations for the program. At the time of this writing, no sources of gifts, grants, or donations have been identified, and therefore, revenue from gifts, grants, and donations cannot be estimated at this time. Gifts, grants, and donations are not subject to the TABOR revenue limit.

State Expenditures

Subject to available appropriations, state General Fund expenditures in the CDE will increase by \$47,850 in FY 2020-21 and by \$60,000 in FY 2021-22, as shown in Table 2 and discussed below.

Request for proposal. In FY 2020-21, \$17,198 is required to issue Request for Proposals (RFP). The RFP process will take 350 hours at a charged rate of \$51 per hour.

Contractor costs. Expenditures will increase to hire a contractor at an estimated cost of \$30,000 in FY 2020-21 and \$60,000 in FY 2021-22. The fiscal note estimates that administering the program and creating and administering a public awareness campaign will cost \$60,000 per year. Contractor costs in FY 2020-21 are prorated to account for the January 1, 2021, contract start date.

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor on July 10, 2020, and takes effect on September 14, 2020, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
