Summary of Legislation

The reengrossed bill, originally recommended by the *Legislative Oversight Committee Concerning the Treatment of Persons with Mental Illness in the Criminal and Juvenile Justice Systems*, adds mental health professionals to the list of persons that must be included in any memorandum of understanding entered into between county departments of human or social services and other local-level service providers. The bill also requires the memorandum to contain a provision specifying that the child's parent may be present at any meeting of the interagency group that concerns their child.

Background

State law specifies a uniform collaborative management process that integrates the oversight of services from multiple state and county agencies. These voluntary agreements are initiated to improve the quality and efficiency of care provided to Colorado children and families.

State Expenditures

The bill may increase workload in the Department of Human Services (DHS) by a minimal amount, beginning in FY 2016-17. The DHS must share information concerning the collaborative management process with mental health professionals. Any increase in workload in the DHS is expected to be minimal and will not require new appropriations.

Local Government Impact

The bill may increase workload for counties by a minimal amount. Under the bill, county departments of human or social services and other local-level service providers must include relevant mental health professionals when entering into memorandums of understanding.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect August 10, 2016, if the General Assembly adjourns on May 11, 2016, as scheduled, and no referendum petition is filed.
