4 The Speaker called the House to order at 10:00 a.m.

5  
6 Colors were presented by Cadet Captain Yurel Villa, Cadet Second  
7 Lieutenant Danika Matuska, Cadet Second Lieutenant James Strachan, and  
8 Cadet Senior Master Sergeant Tristan Biber; Civil Air Patrol.

9  
10 The National Anthem was performed by Stanley Howard Curtis,  
11 Adam Michael Smith, John Patrick McGuire, Drew Clifton Leslie,  
12 Brian Conor Sugrue, John Robert Lindsay.

13  
14 Pledge of Allegiance led by Remy and Roman Hamlin, Jackson Willford,  
15 Blake and Madilyn Slaugh, Jaxon and Colton Caldwell.

17 Speaker McCluskie announced that pursuant to House Rule 2,  
18 Vanessa Reilly would be appointed Chief Clerk.

29 **RESIGNATION**

30  
31 Friends and loyal supporters,

32  
33 If you know me, you know that my faith is very important to me,  
34 and after a contentious Special Session, I prayed harder than I ever had  
35 for peace in that moment. Meditation in church was certainly what was  
36 needed. The homily on the Sunday after Special Session was - if you  
37 wanted peace, you had to follow God's path. I want more than anything  
38 to follow God's path. I needed to understand what that path was for me  
39 in this time of my life.

40  
41

1 The last day of Special Session was sad and disappointing for me.  
2 I had no other choice but to bear witness to the collapse of integrity in the  
3 Colorado State House of Representative. The lies and hypocrisies the  
4 Majority spewed were beyond what I had ever expected, even in Colorado  
5 politics. It has been degraded, and the one word that is at the top of my  
6 mind is toxic.

7  
8 This week was heartbreaking and challenging for all of us. The  
9 school shooting in Evergreen and the assassination of conservative  
10 Charlie Kirk, along with remembering those we have lost on September  
11 11th. The week simply put, overwhelmed us all with emotion.

12  
13 I have spent the months reflecting on my life choices, especially  
14 in relation to my children. As a single mom, I raise my two children on  
15 my own. I am all that they have. There is nothing more important in my  
16 life than them. They have made so many sacrifices for me to be able to  
17 represent you. But they also need their mom right now, and I need to keep  
18 them safe. So, we have made the decision to return to Mesa County. I  
19 believe the three of us need some time at "home" right now.

20  
21 After much prayer and self-reflection, I am announcing my  
22 resignation as the Representative for House District 14, effective  
23 September 15, 2025. This was one of the hardest decisions I have ever  
24 had to make. When you are called to service, as I have been, it is difficult  
25 to walk away at a time when so many things need attention. It has been  
26 my honor to represent the good people of House District 14 in El Paso  
27 County. Your faith and confidence in me have meant so much to me, and  
28 I am forever thankful.

29  
30 I am proud of the legislation that I was able to run and pass to help  
31 my constituents and hardworking Coloradans throughout this great State.  
32 I have worked tirelessly to successfully lower your property taxes, fight  
33 for the Taxpayer's Bill of Rights (TABOR) and protect our children and  
34 families. There have been so many successful and impactful pieces of  
35 legislation, and to have the opportunity to change lives with good policy  
36 was and is a dream come true.

37  
38 I cannot express how grateful I am for each one of you. Thank you  
39 for your continued support and prayers for me and my family. I am truly  
40 blessed to have you in my life.

41  
42 My thoughts and prayers are with the hardworking legislators that  
43 I call colleagues, friends, and some, family. I pray they can find a path  
44 forward that places policy over personalities, and my hope is that truth  
45 and honor prevail for the Institution and those they have been elected to  
46 serve.

45 Good morning members!

46

47 A warm welcome to the guests and dignitaries who have joined us, thank you for being  
48 here on opening day!

49

50 First off, I want to take a moment to recognize the veterans here today, and those  
51 currently in our armed services - both in the chamber and in the gallery. Please stand  
52 or wave. We thank you for your service.

53

54

1 I also want to be sure to give a huge thanks to the many people who keep this building  
2 and the legislature running: our aides and caucus staff, nonpartisan staff and clerks,  
3 our facility workers, and of course our sergeants.  
4  
5 And let's not forget our Chief Clerk's new Chief Responsibility – Baby Trevor!  
6 Congratulations to the Reilly family on your newest addition!  
7  
8 More good news - Love is in the air! Not only did Rep. Lukens receive a big diamond  
9 ring atop the cliffs of Ireland...  
10  
11 We also have some good news, from the press table for once – Seth, congratulations  
12 on your wedding! We all know that Hawaii can't possibly beat opening day at the  
13 Colorado State Capitol, so I'm sure it wasn't all that hard to get back on the plane.  
14  
15 A lot has happened since we last gathered here. Every year changes, some changes and  
16 some years can feel harder than others.  
17  
18 We are missing a colleague in our halls today. Senator Faith Winter served Colorado  
19 for twelve years before her tragic passing. I mourn her, as I miss her smile and warmth  
20 and her unwavering, steely dedication to fighting for what's right.  
21  
22 And last June, I saw with horror and a deep sadness that my friend, former Speaker  
23 Melissa Hortman and her husband Mark, had been shot and killed in their home.  
24 Melissa had been a support to me personally, a political force for good, and someone  
25 truly dedicated to making her home state of Minnesota better every day.  
26  
27 Just months after Melissa's death, Charlie Kirk was shot and killed in front of a crowd  
28 in Utah.  
29  
30 Their murders crystalized even more powerfully for me that political violence is  
31 rising, and it flows downstream from the caustic rhetoric all around us. No matter how  
32 bitterly we might disagree on the important issues, we have to raise the decency in our  
33 discourse, together.  
34  
35 I am heartened by the leaders on both sides who have had the courage to condemn  
36 political violence...violence can never be the price of democracy.  
37  
38 Before we move on, I want to acknowledge that there are others we have lost... family  
39 members, friends, and constituents who are no longer with us.  
40  
41 I invite everyone present to please stand if able, and take a moment of silence in  
42 recognition of those who have passed. Thank you.  
43  
44 I love that we begin each legislative session at the start of the year. Just as our  
45 calendars flip to a new page, we come back to the Capitol with novel ideas, bright  
46 faces, and sometimes also a fresh blanket of snow. Fingers crossed on the last one –  
47 you know we need the moisture!  
48  
49 I also come back to this building each year with a different perspective. In the high  
50 country, we say that you never step in the same river twice. I think that's true of our  
51 time at the Capitol, too.  
52  
53 The river keeps moving, the challenges change. Though the last year has been hard in  
54 so many ways, as I look at all of you today, I see resilience.

1 I see 65 representatives and dozens more staff who have faced real hardship – and  
2 have still shown up ready to work. That commitment renews my sense of purpose  
3 today.  
4  
5 Today is the start of a new session. It is the start of 120 brand new days where we  
6 work together to make a difference. We won't ignore the havoc outside these walls, or  
7 the gloom, or bury our heads in the sand to avoid discomfort.  
8  
9 But we will tune out the noise that's designed to capture attention for attention's sake.  
10 Coloradans have made it clear for years now that they simply do not care about the  
11 noise or performative outrage. They care about results.  
12  
13 And here, in our Colorado, we deliver real results. Our Colorado is a bulwark against  
14 the chaos in Washington. Coloradans are looking for us to focus on what matters.  
15  
16 What matters is that too many children live in poverty. And because of a single policy  
17 passed in this building, our Family Affordability Tax Credit, we cut child poverty by  
18 nearly 41% in one year – proof that it can be done.  
19  
20 What matters is the \$800 million budget gap that puts safety net programs at risk and  
21 we must turn over every stone to find the funding to sustain them.  
22  
23 What matters is protecting the rule of law and upholding justice for the dignity and  
24 rights of women, immigrants, LGBTQ Coloradans and working families.  
25  
26 What matters is that Coloradans' costs are too damn high. That is why I am fortified  
27 by the resilience in your faces today.  
28  
29 We've got a steep mountain to skin, but the run will be worth it.  
30  
31 In August, we faced the fallout from Congress's budget, which immediately blew a  
32 billion dollar hole in Colorado's finances on top of new unprecedented threats to  
33 Medicaid, SNAP, TANF, and other essential services.  
34  
35 In this moment, when the White House would hold Colorado hostage, I'm reminded  
36 of a Churchill saying:  
37  
38 "You were given the choice between war and dishonor. You chose dishonor, and you  
39 will still have war."  
40  
41 I fear this administration will target Colorado no matter what we do. So members, let's  
42 do what's right.  
43  
44 It's plain that Colorado's fiscal constraints make it hard to pivot quickly when costs  
45 rise unexpectedly or revenues disappear overnight.  
46  
47 Medicaid costs are growing at twice the rate of what we are allowed to spend under  
48 TABOR, driven by long-term care for seniors, behavioral health services, and  
49 prescription drug costs – health care that every Coloradan might need.  
50  
51 To be clear, this deficit is not reckless overspending. It is time to modernize our  
52 outdated fiscal structure, because our future shouldn't be bound by a 30-year-old  
53 formula that doesn't account for today's realities.  
54

1 The math just isn't mathing for the people of our state.  
2  
3 No one is coming to the rescue during our session. There are no easy buttons.  
4 Balancing this budget will require shared sacrifice and serious leadership.  
5  
6 To the members of the Joint Budget Committee, Representatives Sirota, Brown, and  
7 Taggart: I know all of you have sleepless nights both behind you and ahead of you.  
8 Thank you for taking on this weighty responsibility.  
9  
10 In the pain we're facing, I also see a chance to look beyond our budget, and find  
11 answers to the question Coloradans have been asking: How do we unrig our economy,  
12 so it works for everyone – not just the few, but the many?  
13  
14 The promise of America is freedom and a fair shot. And the promise of the West goes  
15 further: it's progress. Progress comes from new ideas, and from the determination to  
16 see them through.  
17  
18 We know hardworking people are struggling to stay ahead under the lingering effects  
19 of inflation and global tariffs. Now skyrocketing costs are sinking all boats.  
20  
21 In Colorado, it's time to continue fighting for a new economy that brings back a shot  
22 at success for everyone. No one should be able to pull up the ladder behind them to  
23 keep other people down. That's not the Colorado way. It is not how we move forward.  
24  
25 That's why this session we will do three things:  
26  
27 lower everyday costs...  
28  
29 protect our successes...  
30  
31 and sustain targeted investments in our future.  
32  
33 When we lower costs and create good paying jobs, we can keep building an economy:  
34  
35 where working people have a fair shot. Where entrepreneurs can take a risk and start  
36 a business, where small businesses are equipped to hire, compete and succeed. Where  
37 farms and ranches are passed down to the next generation, instead of being sold off  
38 in pieces.  
39  
40 On healthcare and housing especially, we need to cut right to the heart of what is  
41 making Coloradans' lives more expensive. That also includes working on childcare  
42 costs, the prices of everyday goods, and putting consumers first.  
43  
44 When Congress let health care premiums surge, Colorado Democrats stepped up to  
45 stabilize our insurance market and blunt the devastating impact of these hikes.  
46  
47 If Congress continues to fail to extend the enhanced premium tax credits, we'll need  
48 to look at options once again to keep health insurance prices from spiraling.  
49  
50 Colorado is a beautiful place to call home. We're lucky to live here. But the cost of  
51 renting or buying a home is making that dream almost impossible for working people.  
52  
53 This year we will work to unlock innovative financing mechanisms to build more  
54 affordable housing, make it easier for nonprofits to build homes on land they already  
55 own and continue to reduce property insurance costs.

1 We know that health care and housing represent the biggest squeezes on working  
2 people's budgets. That is why we keep coming back to these policy issues, with the  
3 fortitude to both make big changes and get it right.  
4  
5 We're not just bringing back a fair shot for working people to thrive – we will also  
6 make sure our kids have more possibilities too.  
7  
8 We have a lot to be proud of where our children are concerned. When I first entered  
9 the legislature in 2019, school finance was dire. Since then, we have raised the  
10 per-pupil funding for K-12 schools by 46%, brought total program funding up by \$3  
11 billion, and eliminated the budget stabilization factor.  
12  
13 We didn't stop there. We secured free full-day kindergarten and launched universal  
14 pre-K. Universal preschool is not just saving thousands of families over \$6,000 each  
15 year in child care, it's giving kids a head start on school readiness and social  
16 connection at a critical stage.  
17  
18 Our next task is to unify education and opportunity, by bringing higher education,  
19 apprenticeships, and workforce pathways under one roof. Everyone must be equipped  
20 to start the career of their dreams.  
21  
22 Our kids don't just deserve a top-notch education, and the skills to confront a changing  
23 world. We owe our kids, and our kids' kids, a liveable future by protecting Colorado's  
24 pristine environments, land, air and water.  
25  
26 And we owe it to rural communities and urban centers alike to invest in our renewable  
27 energy future.  
28  
29 We must hold our ground on all the protections we've put in place, and fight the  
30 Trump administration's attempts to claw away our 8 million acres of public lands and  
31 auction them off. Coloradans agree, and we all agreed in this very chamber last year:  
32 our public lands are not for sale.  
33  
34 And it's not just Coloradans who love their public lands: Katy Perry may have been  
35 our first pop star in space, but when those 11 minutes were up, she kissed the earth and  
36 she liked it.  
37  
38 I'm immensely proud that Western Slope Democrats and Republicans have a tradition  
39 of bipartisan collaboration, especially on water rights and land protection – one I hope  
40 we continue.  
41  
42 Together we can balance a clean, healthy environment with the needs of a growing  
43 state.  
44  
45 This session we're going to protect our progress.  
46  
47 But we will not forget about the other crucial part of the American promise: our  
48 freedoms.  
49  
50 Coloradans' civil rights are not to be played with. We won't shove our immigrant and  
51 LGBTQ neighbors back into the shadows. We won't give up on disability access or  
52 voting rights. We are a model for abortion rights in the post-Dobbs reality, and we  
53 won't roll them back.  
54  
55

1 We are a nation founded by immigrants and social outcasts. Diversity does make our  
2 state stronger, and it is un-American for the federal government to use masked  
3 vigilantes to arrest, detain, and evict people off the street on the basis of their skin  
4 color, language, gender, or very identity. Colorado will continue to stand against this  
5 betrayal of our values.  
6  
7 We will remember Renee Good...and the wrongful detentions of Jeanette  
8 Vizguerra-Ramirez, Fernando Jaramillo-Solano and his children, and just so many  
9 others.  
10  
11 Members: we have a lot ahead of us. Our budget situation especially will force us to  
12 concentrate on what truly allows Coloradans to thrive.  
13  
14 The path forward is not always clear. But in Colorado we know how to trailblaze right  
15 through the brush.  
16  
17 Our work for the year is just beginning. But as this is my final opening day speech...  
18  
19 Thank God, says my husband.  
20  
21 ...I have to reflect for a moment on how far we have come.  
22  
23 I am immensely proud of what we have accomplished in the seven years. I have been  
24 a part of this body. I am so proud of the results we have delivered often in partnership  
25 with Republicans:  
26  
27 Poverty is down. Incomes are up. Tax rates are lower. School meals for free for every  
28 student.  
29  
30 Protections now abound for public health and air quality in oil and gas operations.  
31  
32 More people have health coverage thanks to reinsurance, the Colorado Option, and  
33 OmniSalud.  
34  
35 We strengthened protections for renters, and passed breakthrough measures to build  
36 more housing.  
37  
38 We've led on pragmatic gun violence prevention.  
39  
40 We passed first-in-the-nation protections for our waterways, streams, and wetlands.  
41  
42 AND: One year from now, the curtains will rise on the Sundance Film Festival in  
43 Boulder.  
44  
45 Just like the Avalanche, and the Nuggets, and the Broncos, and someday soon, our  
46 women's soccer and hopefully, women's hockey - the big green machine has been a  
47 winning team.  
48  
49 To our new faces today: Reps. Slauch, Flanell, Goldstein, and Nguyen, welcome to  
50 the Thunderdome – I mean, the Gold Dome.  
51  
52 Minority Leader Caldwell: Thank you for stepping up to lead your caucus. I look  
53 forward to growing our partnership this session.  
54  
55

1 To my colleagues in their final year: Majority Leader Duran, Representatives Froelich,  
2 Sirota, Soper, Titone, Valdez, and Woodrow, thank you for your service. It's been real,  
3 it's been fun...alright yeah, it's been real fun at times.

4  
5 On a more personal note, it is the privilege of my life to be your Speaker. Thank you  
6 for your trust. I'm proud we have done the daily, nitty-gritty work to compromise and  
7 find solutions together.

8  
9 Majority Leader Duran: I am eternally grateful to have you in my corner. You are a  
10 legislator's legislator and a fearless advocate. We have traveled far together, and I  
11 know we're not done yet. The Senate doesn't know what it's got coming. Thank you  
12 Monica, for everything.

13  
14 To my dear, wonderful family: just one more session. And I really mean it this time.

15  
16 You have been my collective rock through this incredible ride. Thank you for just  
17 being here and walking up the hill with me. And Susan, you are the bravest, toughest  
18 person I know - stay strong! "Thank you" isn't enough - but thank you all.

19  
20 Folks, we have big things to do this session. As we start each of the remaining 119  
21 days in this building, I will keep some things in mind, and I hope you will too.

22  
23 Talk to each other, kindly whenever you can. Lead with laughter. Lead with  
24 compassion. Assume the best of each other, and in each other.

25  
26 Each of you can find common ground with the other people who sit in these chairs, no  
27 matter how strange walking that acreage together might turn out to be.

28  
29 Members, staff, and guests. We are present. We are organized. We are ready to take  
30 care of business.

31  
32 Welcome to the opening day of the Second Regular Session of the 75th General  
33 Assembly.

34  
35 **Minority Leader Caldwell addressed the Members of the House of**  
36 **Representatives:**

37  
38 Thank you Madam Speaker & Thank you members of the 75th General Assembly. It's  
39 a beautiful thing to see you all here with your families & the People of Colorado.

40  
41 During the second regular session of this General Assembly - and in the year of our  
42 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary - as my first address as the new House Minority Leader - I'm going  
43 to do something a bit unorthodox. During the interim, we've seen our politics - here  
44 and across the nation - reach a level of toxicity that is not just harmful to our discourse  
45 - but dangerous.

46  
47 I commend the Majority Leadership on their efforts to work across the aisle - to  
48 explore how we can lower the temperature - while also recognizing that there will still  
49 be fierce, but respectable disagreements on policy. It's important that our sides  
50 understand what we believe and why we believe it.

51  
52 I've maintained since I was first elected that no matter our political differences - if you  
53 bring me a bill that doesn't violate the Constitution or our foundational principles - is  
54 good for the People of House District 20 & the People of Colorado - I will gladly put  
55 my name on it with you. That's what the people of Colorado want to see from us, and  
56 that's what we owe them.

1 As 22 elected House Republicans, we represent approximately 2 million Coloradans  
2 in our districts alone. In 2024, approximately 45 percent of Coloradans who cast a vote  
3 for a House candidate - voted for a Republican.  
4

5 I bring this up as a reminder- that while we may be the Minority Party now, we  
6 represent the views of a large percentage & wide range of Coloradans all across this  
7 great state.  
8

9 So, What does our Caucus believe and why do we believe it?  
10

11 We care about affordability. Coloradans are asking us; How are you going to make my  
12 life more affordable? How are my children going to have the same opportunities that  
13 I once had? Because right now, that's not their reality.  
14

15 We've noticed that the more bills we pass in the name of affordability, the less  
16 affordable Colorado becomes. The Colorado State Budget has increased by nearly 50  
17 percent in the last 7 years - and so I ask all of you - have our roads, our schools, our  
18 safety, or our healthcare gotten 50% better? While we're facing another billion-dollar  
19 budget shortfall, we'll still pass a record-setting budget. This is in large part because  
20 the Taxpayer Bill of Rights is often side-stepped by new enterprises & the fees that  
21 come with them.  
22

23 We are going to HEAR and see a lot of finger pointing at H.R. 1 - but the reality is  
24 these challenges did not begin this year - or with a single federal bill. The issues  
25 Coloradans are facing have been building for years - as a result of state level decisions.  
26

27 Overburdensome regulations & unprecedented government growth FROM THIS  
28 BUILDING - stifles economic prosperity - causes businesses to close or leave - and  
29 drives up the costs for everyone.  
30

31 When you're living on the margins — paycheck to paycheck — legislation that adds  
32 a little more to your costs through taxes, fees, or regulations - eventually adds up. And  
33 we do that here, hundreds of times a session - year after year after year.  
34

35 That fraction of a percent - over and over again - eventually becomes the difference  
36 on whether you can buy a new home - whether you can fill up your cart with food at  
37 the grocery store - whether you can fill up your gas tank to go to work or to take your  
38 children to school. Whether you can put money in a savings account or towards your  
39 children's college fund. Whether you can pay a medical bill - fix an unreliable vehicle  
40 - or survive on a fixed income like our Seniors must do. We must slow down the  
41 growth of government in order to spur the growth of the People.  
42

43 We fight for parental rights. We believe that parents have the right to make the best  
44 decision for their kids, not the government. As parents - we know our children better  
45 than any elected or unelected body ever could.  
46

47 As a dad myself, of two young sons, their lives have changed my entire outlook on the  
48 world.  
49 When my first son was born - and I stood there in the operating room and looked into  
50 his eyes - I knew from that moment - that whether I lived 50 more days or 50 more  
51 years - my life would never be the same. I would never Sleep the same - Think the  
52 same - Dream the same - Pray the same - or Love the same. I felt that, not the  
53 government.  
54  
55

1 When one of our children are hurt — and they're lying in a hospital bed — it's not the  
2 government that sits next to their bed - holds their hand - asks God how this could  
3 have happened - prays to God for a full recovery - or tells their child that if they could,  
4 they'd take the pain away & put it upon themselves. That's what parents do, not the  
5 government.  
6  
7 So when we see legislation from this building - telling us that the government knows  
8 better than us — the parents - we get mad - and we fight for the God-given rights as  
9 parents - to make those decisions without Government intrusion.  
10  
11 We care about the environment — after all — we all breathe the same air, Many of our  
12 constituents are those who depend on a healthy environment. They're farmers,  
13 ranchers, hunters, guides, sportsmen, conservationists, and those just blessed enough  
14 to live amongst God and His creation.  
15  
16 In the pursuit of a cleaner future - we are putting those most vulnerable in an untenable  
17 position. I've been poor, I know what it's like to watch your parents living paycheck  
18 - to paycheck. When you live on the margin - a 10% increase in your electric bill is the  
19 difference between paying a bill and missing a meal.  
20  
21 We can work towards a cleaner environment - but we must do it pragmatically. We  
22 must not do it at the expense of destroying our lower and middle-class Coloradans -  
23 turning away new industries that require a reliable electrical grid - or killing  
24 good-paying blue-collar jobs - many of which are trade union jobs made up of  
25 pipefitters, electricians, plumbers, truck drivers, rail workers, gas workers, & coal  
26 miners. We will one day have the innovation and infrastructure to have entirely clean  
27 energy - but our current trajectory - is Activism on a collision course with reality.  
28  
29 Our climate policies are leading to unaffordable utility bills - removal of affordable  
30 natural gas options - base load facilities closing prematurely - and the very serious  
31 potential for rolling blackouts in some of our largest cities - if we do not slow down  
32 and take a little more time to transition. Let California make the mistake of rushing to  
33 their own destruction, NOT Colorado.  
34  
35 Public safety is a top priority for the Minority Caucus. Law and order is a cornerstone  
36 of any functioning society. Coloradans must feel safe to go about their daily lives - and  
37 businesses must be able to operate without constant crime. And if crime does happen  
38 - they all must be assured that the criminal will be punished to the full extent of the  
39 law. Redemption & second chances for those committing crimes should be a part of  
40 our policy — however - the innocent people not committing crimes MUST come first.  
41 We must put the needs of the innocent before the wants of the criminals. And our  
42 brave law enforcement officials MUST KNOW we support them.  
43  
44 We believe in school choice. A school that may be amazing for your children - may  
45 NOT be the right choice for mine. A child should not be confined to the building they  
46 just so happen to live closest to. A child who struggles in one school may flourish in  
47 another. Parents should have the choice to send their children to the school that best  
48 fits their needs - whether it's a district-run public school, charter school, private  
49 school, or homeschool - period.  
50  
51 We believe in protecting Life. Whether that's the life of our vulnerable children while  
52 they attend school - or the life of the innocent - still in the womb. We hear a lot about  
53 life lessons & lived experiences - and how lucky are we - to have the chance to  
54 experience such things.  
55  
56 We feel so passionately about our 2' Amendment rights for that very same reason.

1 We carry our firearms to protect the lives of our families, ourselves, and those around  
2 us, whether they agree with us or not. Restrictive gun laws do nothing to stop the  
3 criminals committing the crimes — instead - they make it more difficult for the  
4 law-abiding to exercise their God-given right to defend themselves and their families.  
5

6 And lastly - but most importantly - our faith in God guides not only how we raise our  
7 families and live our lives - it also guides our foundational principles when  
8 representing our constituents. These very same principles are those shared by virtually  
9 all of the original signers - of the Declaration of Independence & of those who ratified  
10 the US Constitution - which laid the foundation to create the greatest country to ever  
11 exist in the history of the world. We cannot legislate morality. And the further we  
12 stray away from those founding principles - the further we should expect our society  
13 to decay with broken homes, substance abuse, crime, and suicide.  
14

15 And so you can imagine our shock and horror - during the interim - when we watched  
16 someone many of us admired - a young father, husband & Christian - Charlie Kirk -  
17 be murdered in front of the entire world - simply for his willingness to debate those  
18 biblical values on a college campus. It was troubling - watching so many in the public  
19 - many in positions of trust - mock the murder of a young man that left a wife  
20 husbandless & two children fatherless. As many of us share those same Christian  
21 beliefs with Charlie - we viewed the celebration and mocking of his murder as a  
22 justification for our own deaths.  
23

24 We find solace in scripture like Isaiah 41:10: "Fear not, for I am with you."  
25

26 To Charlie, I say this: May we all be so persuasive in our arguments, so just in our  
27 actions, and so righteous in our convictions, that the devil dances on our graves when  
28 we die.

29 So... how now shall we live?  
30

31 Do we accept Colorado being ranked nationally as the r most expensive state to live  
32 in?

33 Do we accept being ranked 48th in housing affordability - or 48th in Cost of Living  
34 - or a D+ grade for our roads?  
35

36 Do we accept being the 6th most regulated state for business, with approximately 45%  
37 of our regulations being excessive or duplicative?  
38

39 Do we accept being ranked 49th out of 50 for public safety? Or 7th overall in Violent  
40 Crime?  
41

42 Do we accept being ranked #2 nationally for property crime? Or 4th in auto theft - and  
43 the top 10 for retail theft? Do we accept being ranked in the top 10 for human  
44 trafficking? Or one of the worst states for fentanyl - a poison that has robbed so many  
45 families of loved ones - many of them children.  
46

47 I don't believe that anyone in this chamber feels this is acceptable. And our caucus has  
48 warned for many years that this would be the outcome of misguided policies. So - let  
49 this session of our 150th anniversary as a state - be a turning point where we come  
50 together - as Coloradans ask us to do - and change the course.  
51

52 In 2026, we have a very unique — OPPORTUNITY - to improve the lives of our  
53 constituents - and ensure a prosperous future in Colorado - for another 150 years.  
54

55 God Bless you all. God Bless Colorado. And May God Bless America.

16 **ADDRESS BY THE HONORABLE**  
17 **Jared Polis**  
18

19 Your Excellencies Madam Speaker and President Coleman, and Minority Leaders  
20 Caldwell and Simpson, thank you, welcome to my final State of the State address. I  
21 am truly humbled to be here as your Honorable Governor. It has been such an honor  
22 to be your Governor.

23  
24 To my family, who have been on this journey since day one. Thank you, Marlon, for  
25 your unwavering support and for your inspiring work as Colorado's First Gentleman  
26 on animal protection, recycling and composting, voter participation, and LGBTQ  
27 rights, and for being an incredible father to our children. I know you're relieved that  
28 we are nearing the end. To my mom and dad, who have been here every step of the  
29 way. My sister and brother, who are amazing. To my kids, you should be in school!

30  
31 To my friend and partner on this long journey, my Lieutenant Governor, Dianne  
32 Primavera. Thank you for all you do every single day to serve our state. Your strong  
33 moral compass, passion and strength have been an inspiration to our administration  
34 and helped us to navigate so many hard issues. Our state is better because of your  
35 service.

36  
37 To my chiefs of staff, Lisa, Rick, Alec, David, thank you for steering the ship with joy,  
38 fortitude, and steadfast dedication to our fellow Coloradans.

39  
40 And to my senior staff, cabinet, and our incredible team across state government who  
41 have contributed to my administration, thank you. It is with your expertise and  
42 commitment to service that we've achieved even bigger and bolder than we could have  
43 imagined.

44  
45 Seven years ago, I stepped up to the plate as your Governor: baseball aficionado,  
46 gamer, tech geek, a head mostly full of hair, ever-hopeful Rockies fan, well, hopeful  
47 back then.

48  
49 At the time, I certainly couldn't have predicted all that we would face as a state and  
50 a nation.

51  
52 There's all that we planned and worked for to put Colorado ahead of the curve. Shared  
53 achievements like:

54  
55 Delivering on the promise of free kindergarten and preschool, saving families  
56 thousands and giving our youngest learners a strong start.

1 Building out low-cost clean energy for more Coloradans to save money on energy  
2 bills, protecting our air and water, and creating good-paying jobs.  
3  
4 Making it easier and more affordable – even free in many cases – to get the skills  
5 needed to get a good job.  
6  
7 Breaking down barriers to housing for Coloradans at every budget.  
8  
9 Getting rid of the Budget Stabilization Factor and fully funding our schools.  
10  
11 Cutting income taxes three times and property taxes five times while supercharging  
12 the earned income and child tax credits. Establishing the Family Affordability Tax  
13 Credit, which helped cut child poverty rates by nearly 41%. Today, Colorado boasts  
14 the lowest childhood poverty rate in the nation.  
15  
16 Generating more than \$470 million each year in new funding for our roads, bridges,  
17 and transit – with the vast majority of that funding going to roads and bridges.  
18  
19 There’s the “pinch me” moments, when we seized opportunity and we called our shot  
20 to deliver monumental achievements for Colorado.  
21  
22 Becoming the new home of the world-renowned Sundance Film Festival. Keeping the  
23 Broncos in Denver with the revitalization of Burnham Yard.  
24  
25 Standing atop Fishers Peak, Colorado’s 42nd state park.  
26  
27 Bringing the M-L-B All-Star game to Colorado, boosting our economy as the world  
28 recovered from the pandemic.  
29  
30 Receiving Colorado’s first COVID vaccine shipment, marking a historic scientific  
31 achievement and the return to life lived together.  
32  
33 Celebrating President Biden’s designation of Camp Hale as a national monument, an  
34 effort I helped begin more than 15 years ago during my time in Congress. First Pup  
35 Gia, who is also here with us today, accompanied me to that signing. The Denver Post  
36 front page picture celebrating the new monument featured Gia front and center!  
37  
38 Earning national recognition as the epicenter of quantum computing technology.  
39  
40 And then, there’s the curveballs that come with the job. The unforeseen events that  
41 altered and shaped the trajectory of our state forever.  
42  
43 COVID was unlike anything we’d ever faced before. While the world plunged into  
44 uncertainty, we came together to support our brave and dedicated doctors, nurses, and  
45 frontline workers, and charted a path forward to chart hospital capacity.  
46  
47 At the height of the pandemic, we held three press conferences a week to help explain  
48 to Coloradans frankly what we knew – and what we didn’t know, too. Leading with  
49 data and science, we shared the most up-to-date information to empower Coloradans  
50 to make informed decisions, weigh their risks, and choose how to best protect  
51 themselves and their families.  
52  
53 And when Washington told states to figure it out for themselves, we all stepped up for  
54 Colorado. We quickly expanded life-saving tests, PPE, and when they were finally

1 available, thanks to President Trump's Operation Warp Speed, vaccines too. and  
2 pushed hard to be one of the first states to safely get our schools and economy back  
3 up and running.

4  
5 With the expertise of our Department of Public Health and Environment Director Dr.  
6 Jill Ryan and her team, and my then Chief of Staff Lisa Kaufmann, Colorado led the  
7 country in wastewater testing, and made it easier and quicker for Coloradans to get a  
8 COVID test. I am proud we had among the quickest vaccine uptakes of any state.

9  
10 In the middle of it all, we came together to deliver on the promises we made long  
11 before the pandemic hit. Democrats, Republicans, and my Administration all worked  
12 together to keep Coloradans safe while at the same time, passing free preschool and  
13 historic transportation funding. When we work together, we do big things.

14  
15 And because 2020 was the year that kept on giving, we also faced the three largest  
16 wildfires in the history of our state. The next year, we faced the Marshall Fire, the  
17 most destructive fire in Colorado history. I want to recognize and thank Department  
18 of Public Safety Director Stan Hilkey, Director of the Colorado Division of Fire  
19 Prevention & Control Mike Morgan, Director of the Division of Homeland Security  
20 and Emergency Management Kevin Klein, Chief of the Colorado State Patrol Matt  
21 Packard, Colorado National Guard Adjunct General (and now-acting CPW director  
22 - thank you for coming out of retirement) Laura Clellan, and the many, many more  
23 Coloradans involved for their steady, skilled leadership through Colorado's most  
24 trying times.

25  
26 We witnessed horrific mass shootings at the STEM School in Highlands Ranch, Club  
27 Q in Colorado Springs, King Soopers in Boulder, and most recently at Evergreen High  
28 School. We endured a horrific antisemitic attack on Pearl Street Mall in Boulder.

29  
30 And grief has also struck right here in our State Capitol, with the sudden and tragic  
31 passings of our colleagues Senator Faith Winter and Minority Leader Hugh McKean.

32  
33 To honor their legacy and all we've lost, the work continues. As Faith would say, we  
34 will "lift as we rise."

35  
36 For all of us here, we're going to bat for Colorado's future, to leave our great state  
37 even better than we found it.

38  
39 Seven years ago, some thought our bold goals were far-fetched.

40  
41 I've got the receipts, I mean headlines, doubting if I'd be able to get it all done.

42  
43 From 2019: Will Polis Get Full-Day Kindergarten, Or Will Colorado Give Another  
44 Flaky Promise? One year later, headlines read: Colorado's Free, Full-Day  
45 Kindergarten Boosted Enrollment By Nearly 25%.

46  
47 In my first year, the intrepid reporters at the Colorado Sun published a tracker of my  
48 campaign promises. 9News even wrote a song about it!

49  
50 Now, I appreciate their help holding us accountable for our bold goals. Although, I did  
51 notice they stopped keeping track because it's not as exciting when we keep delivering  
52 on our promises.

53  
54 But for me, it's always been about delivering real results, not headlines.

1 To me, politics is simple: you say what you're going to do, and then you do it.  
2  
3 We posted a transparent dashboard to share month-by-month updates with Coloradans  
4 on our progress delivering wildly important goals – what we call WIGs – for each  
5 agency. We are bringing ease and convenience to government services with mobile  
6 DMV offerings and the myColorado app, used by nearly 2 million Coloradans.  
7  
8 And when it comes to turning my bold agenda into a better daily life for Coloradans,  
9 we haven't always succeeded on our first try. But we've always stepped back up to the  
10 plate – because that's what we do in Colorado.  
11  
12 We are in this work to make life better, more affordable, safer for all Coloradans.  
13 Meanwhile, over the past 12 months, it seems Washington is in it to break it all down.  
14 To make life harder and less affordable. To make Americans feel more fearful, more  
15 belligerent, more vulnerable.  
16  
17 In the last month alone, the Trump administration has threatened over \$1 billion in  
18 funding for Colorado, and is making life more expensive and more difficult across our  
19 state.  
20  
21 Mean cuts target short-term support for the most basic and essential needs for  
22 Colorado families and threaten child care support that Colorado families and child  
23 care centers rely on. The President denied two major disaster relief requests for the  
24 Lee and Elk fires and devastating flooding in Western Colorado, hurting Coloradans  
25 and our recovery efforts, and went on to veto Lauren Boebert, Michael Bennet, and  
26 John Hickenlooper's unanimous, bipartisan bill to finally complete the pipeline  
27 providing clean water to rural Colorado, a project first promised under JFK. All while  
28 threatening to dismantle NCAR, a global leader in weather and global sciences, and  
29 a crown jewel of American scientific achievement.  
30  
31 That's before you get to the devastating impacts HR 1 had on our state, gutting our  
32 state budget by \$1 billion overnight, eliminating Coloradans' TABOR refunds, and  
33 slashing Medicaid and SNAP.  
34  
35 All the while, tariff taxes on Coloradans are driving up costs on everything from  
36 groceries to medicine. Trump's tariffs alone are expected to cost Coloradans on  
37 average \$1,700 for a single year. Tariffs hurt all of us, and make it unaffordable to  
38 live.  
39  
40 Since day one, we've worked together to save Coloradans money. To strengthen  
41 international trade and make our state the best place to start and grow a business.  
42  
43 Four years ago, I stood here and sang about finding 50 ways to save Coloradans  
44 money, and we went on to deliver over 100. We're saving the average Colorado family  
45 of four over \$600 dollars a year on income and property taxes, and last year Colorado  
46 taxpayers saved nearly \$2.5 billion.  
47  
48 Just as we came together during the special session to close corporate tax loopholes,  
49 I am hopeful that we can come together again to cut the income tax rate.  
50  
51 We are fighting - hard – to protect every federal dollar owed to Colorado. In  
52 partnership with Attorney General Weiser, the state has successfully defended nearly  
53 \$900 million.  
54  
55 But there's over \$1 billion more lost or at risk from illegal Trump administration cuts.

1 Washington Republicans – once the self-proclaimed party of states’ rights and small  
2 government – today are too often the party of socialism, overreach, and intrusion into  
3 people’s daily lives in ways wholly out of the scope of government. Picking corporate  
4 winners and losers, co-opting capitalism with cronyism. It often feels like Big  
5 Government is in our wallets, our doctor’s offices, in our homes, bullying businesses  
6 of all sizes.  
7  
8 This is not the Colorado Way.  
9  
10 Driving up costs with tariff taxes is not the Colorado Way.  
11  
12 Ripping away critical food and health access is not the Colorado Way.  
13  
14 Tearing families apart with a costly and cruel immigration agenda is not the Colorado  
15 Way.  
16  
17 Today, nearly 75% of people held in immigration detention centers have no criminal  
18 history. In America in 2026, a culture of fear and chaos means families debate going  
19 to work or sending their kids to school out of fear they won't come home. The words  
20 on the Statue of Liberty beckoning those who come to “breathe free” ring hollow  
21 against the cruel realities we are facing today.  
22  
23 This is not who we are.  
24  
25 Since day one, I’ve worked to build a Colorado for All.  
26  
27 It’s a mission that reflects our shared commitment to a compassionate, kind Colorado  
28 for everyone, and one that I hope and trust will continue well beyond my  
29 administration.  
30  
31 In the words of Aurora Smoky Hill High School graduate Bowen Yang, “the only way  
32 forward is to be joyous and to celebrate each other.”  
33  
34 At a time when Washington is peddling the illusion that America somehow isn’t for  
35 everyone - that somehow there’s only room for some – some people, some beliefs,  
36 some love, some prayer – I want to make it clear:  
37  
38 In our Colorado for All, there is room – and opportunity – for all of us.  
39  
40 In our Colorado for All, we welcome immigrants and refugees who seek to build a  
41 better life here, who strengthen our economy and enrich our communities under the  
42 shelter of our democracy.  
43 In our Colorado for All, an attack on one of us is an attack on all of us.  
44  
45 In our Colorado for All, we safeguard our fundamental freedoms, protecting the right  
46 to be who you are, marry who you love, and choose when or if to start a family.  
47  
48 There is space in our great big hexahectenneacontakaiheptagonal state for all of us.  
49 We are a state of adventure seekers chasing mountain peaks and fresh powder, of  
50 wide-eyed entrepreneurs, artists, devout Coloradans of faith, poets, vegans, soccer  
51 moms and ultimate frisbee dads, hunters and union workers, farmers and ranchers, and  
52 yes, immigrants and refugees.  
53  
54 We respect our differences, and we are stronger and better off because of our rich  
55 diversity. In our Colorado for All, hope and kindness are part of our DNA.

1 The legacy of Jane Goodall, who had a special place in her heart for Colorado, lives  
2 on, as we take inspiration from her words, “hope does not deny evil, but is a response  
3 to it.”  
4  
5 Hateful and divisive rhetoric rarely stops at just words. We are seeing online vitriol  
6 spill over into horrific violence, including right here on our doorstep.  
7  
8 Enough is enough.  
9 We refuse to sit idly by as a culture of targeting our fellow human beings festers in  
10 this country that we love.  
11  
12 In words and actions, we must reject the politics of division and the poison of blind  
13 hatred by doubling down on respect, kindness, compassion, and truly learn to disagree  
14 better.  
15  
16 These are the values that also guide our solidarity with those around the world fighting  
17 for freedom as we speak, in Iran and Venezuela, and in solidarity with the brave  
18 Ukrainian people in their continued fight against Russian aggression.  
19  
20 In my first State of the State address, I shared a story of a conversation Marlon and I  
21 had with our kids. Our then-6 year-old wanted to know the difference between the  
22 various political parties. And at the end, he went over to his four year old sister and  
23 asked, “What political party are you in?” And without missing a beat, she answered,  
24 “the Happy Birthday Party.”  
25 Colorado’s kids are wise in ways that we could all use a little more of.  
26  
27 This year, we will celebrate our state’s 150th birthday, and our country’s 250th. Let’s  
28 come together and honor these historic milestones, not as Democrats or Republicans,  
29 but as the Happy Birthday Party.  
30  
31 And we head into our special birthday tackling our shared challenges. Coloradans –  
32 of all political stripes, in every part of our state – tell us that the high cost of housing  
33 makes it harder to live in the Colorado we love.  
34  
35 In “Field of Dreams,” starring Colorado Rancher Kevin Costner, the wind whispers,  
36 “if you build it, he will come.” Or, as we say, if you build it, opportunity will come.  
37  
38 For too long, we’ve run up against roadblocks – from outdated laws to piles of  
39 paperwork – that slow or stop new housing, new transit, and new clean energy from  
40 even being built.  
41 It reminds me of the words of Taylor Swift and, maybe Kevin Bommer too - “I’ll sue  
42 you if you step on my lawn.”  
43  
44 Not us - we say, let us build!  
45  
46 We’ve empowered Coloradans with the freedom to build an ADU on their property,  
47 and let homeowners – not the government – make decisions about how much parking  
48 is needed, thanks to the bipartisan work of Senators Amabile, Hinrichsen, Exum,  
49 Mullica, and Representative Weinberg.  
50  
51 The benefits are even greater than we could have imagined, just ask Speaker Pro Tem  
52 Boesenecker whose mother-in-law now lives in an ADU in his own backyard!  
53  
54 We’ve unlocked more housing near transit, opened the door to single – or smart – stair  
55 homes, and broken down barriers to lower-cost modular housing, tackled by Speaker  
56 Pro Tem Boesenecker, and Woodrow, alongside Senators Ball and Bridges.

1 And at long last, we tackled construction defects liability to build more condos,  
2 unlocking the promise of homeownership for more Coloradans thanks to the work of  
3 President Coleman and Senator Roberts.  
4

5 We put our skin in the game: speeding up contracting times through the Department  
6 of Local Affairs, with the department now turning around contracts for new housing  
7 in 33 days, down from 61 days a year before. Under Maria De Cambra's leadership  
8 in partnership with the Housing Consortium, we launched the innovative housing hub  
9 to make it easier to apply for affordable rental housing tax credits.  
10

11 We stood up the Educator First Housing initiative to help 3,000 teachers buy their first  
12 home thanks to the work of Senators Amabile and Frizell and Representative Lukens.  
13

14 Through Proposition 123, we've built over 10,000 new homes across the state,  
15 including in rural communities who are building state-supported affordable housing  
16 for the first time.  
17 And there's more to be done.  
18

19 As Colorado-born Ji-Young Yoo, the voice of the iconic Zoey in KPop Demon  
20 Hunters says, "I do have one idea... Actually, 57, but let's start with my favorite." I  
21 share Zoey's enthusiasm when I think of the 57 – or maybe even more – ways we can  
22 unlock more housing at lower cost.  
23

24 This year, we want to ensure local governments have the resources they need to build  
25 and improve bus and train stations, and to pair these investments with more housing  
26 near transit. I want to thank Speaker McCluskie, Representative Woodrow, and  
27 Senators Roberts and Exum for taking this on.  
28

29 The Housing Opportunities Made Easier, or HOME Act, will open the door to more  
30 housing by partnering with higher education, nonprofits, transit agencies, school  
31 districts, and housing authorities to build on underutilized land. With Speaker Pro Tem  
32 Boesenecker, Representative Mabrey and Senators Exum and Gonzales leading the  
33 way, these steps are expected to significantly cut down on building times for new  
34 housing.  
35

36 Coloradans are eager to be a part of the housing solution. For example, in Edwards,  
37 the Eagle County School District opened up Miller Flats Apartments with 37 homes  
38 for district employees conveniently located near schools, parks, and transit.  
39

40 We've given homeowners the freedom to do more with their property. It's only the  
41 start. By making it easier to subdivide and sell your property, we can boost the supply  
42 of affordable starter homes and help Coloradans to stay in their homes.  
43

44 Together, we've worked hard to make the senior homestead exemption flexible and  
45 portable, help seniors downsize and free up homes for young families. We can and  
46 must make good on our promise to seniors by funding the senior homestead exemption  
47 this year.  
48

49 Doing so will require finding \$200 million dollars in one time funding this year.  
50 Converting Pinnacol is the way to shore up our workers compensation system to better  
51 protect workers, ensure Pinnacol can compete and thrive in today and tomorrow's  
52 marketplace, provide some relief with the budget shortfall, and make good on our  
53 bipartisan promise to seniors.  
54

55 Once you have a home you can afford, keeping up with the costs that come with it is  
56 the next challenge. That starts with homeowners insurance which costs too much.

1 This year we must bring homeowners insurance rates down. Costs continue to  
2 skyrocket, up 91% or an average of \$2,000 since 2019, and Coloradans in wildfire  
3 prone areas are having a harder time even finding insurance.  
4  
5 There are tools at our fingertips that can help bring down homeowners insurance rates.  
6  
7 While we might not tackle the entire challenge overnight, it's long past time we start,  
8 with steps like making hail resistant roofs more affordable, and reducing fire risks, we  
9 can drive down claims and lower premiums. Thank you Speaker McCluskie,  
10 Representative Brown, Senators Amabile and Snyder, for taking on this urgent issue.  
11  
12 The more we do here to bring down costs, the more opportunity opens up for  
13 Coloradans in the ways that matter most – where we live, and how we spend our time  
14 and money.  
15  
16 Five months into my time as Governor, an 8.5 million pound boulder fell smack dab  
17 in the middle of Highway 145 just outside of Dolores, Colorado, leaving an eight foot  
18 trench in the middle of the road.  
19  
20 When I learned that it would cost the state \$200,000 more to get rid of the rock than  
21 to reroute the highway I found another way.  
22  
23 I'm a rock tumbling enthusiast, much to Marlon's chagrin – for those who aren't  
24 familiar, check it out! But there was no way to tumble this particular rock. And so,  
25 heeding the wise words of the Beatles, we "let it be."  
26  
27 This is the same common-sense I've used to make it easier, safer, and more affordable  
28 to get around our state, whether you choose to do so by car, bike, foot, bus, or train.  
29  
30 Today, getting around takes up too much of Coloradans' budgets and time, and puts  
31 out too much pollution. We're showing that there's a better way forward for  
32 Coloradans, one with more choices and greater convenience.  
33  
34 We've re-paved 2,500 miles of roads in the past five years alone. Under the leadership  
35 of CDOT director Shoshana Lew, we've tackled long-neglected projects including  
36 Floyd Hill, to finally get drivers over Floyd Hill safely and quickly, taking away the  
37 scary drive that too many of us can relate to going to or from our incredible Rocky  
38 Mountains.  
39  
40 When I took office in 2019, there were 18,000 electric vehicles driving around  
41 Colorado, our energy office director Will Toor was one of those early adopters!  
42 Today, Will no longer feels lonely, with more than 204,000 electric cars on  
43 Colorado's roads. We're #1 nationally for percentage of electric vehicle sales, and by  
44 embracing these clean, quiet, fun to drive cars, we've cut emissions by nearly 600,000  
45 tons of carbon dioxide per year.  
46  
47 Folks: we got all of this done because of policy.  
48  
49 Working with Senator Weissman, we want to make it even more affordable to get an  
50 electric vehicle by directing savings to lower-cost electric vehicles.  
51  
52 The lion's share of additional transportation funding we've secured has gone to roads  
53 and bridges. But we know we can't just build our way out of the congestion that is  
54 robbing too many Coloradans of our free time and money.  
55  
56 That is why we've also supercharged state support for transit.

1 We are blazing a trail on cost-efficient passenger rail, and we're doing it in record  
2 time. With a new lease and access agreement to begin Mountain Passenger Rail  
3 service through the Moffat Tunnel, we are turning the promise of daily, year-round  
4 service from Denver to Craig into a reality with the first routes from Denver to Granby  
5 kicking off about a year from now.  
6  
7 Looking to the Front Range, we are on the precipice of delivering a joint service  
8 partnership from Denver to Fort Collins, working closely with CDOT, RTD, and local  
9 governments to get Front Range Passenger Rail across the finish line.  
10  
11 I want to thank Lisa Kaufmann for her amazing work on passenger rail, and before that  
12 she thought being Chief of Staff was a hard job!  
13  
14 The success of Bustang, Snowstang, Pegasus, and Outrider show that Coloradans have  
15 a big appetite for reliable, affordable bus transit options. In the past five years alone,  
16 Bustang ridership has increased fivefold to reach nearly 2.3 million riders to date.  
17  
18 Bustang now runs 20 routes, with lower fares and exciting partnerships with iconic  
19 Colorado events, like the X Games. And we are pursuing long-term sustainable  
20 funding so Bustang can continue to grow, providing even better service to even more  
21 Coloradans now and in the future.  
22  
23 We've made major progress. But the reality is, until we have a world-class metro area  
24 transit agency with RTD, we simply cannot meet our climate or affordability goals.  
25 This begins with governance changes, increased accountability and transparency, and  
26 a stronger partnership between the cities it serves and the transit agency. I want to  
27 thank Senators Ball and Jodeh,  
28  
29 Representative Froelich, and the late Senator Winter along with Maria Garcia Berry  
30 and the accountability committee for putting together a thoughtful and effective  
31 approach for how we can realize a world-class transit agency.  
32  
33 Now, letting our Broncos leave Denver would have been like getting an invite to  
34 Taylor Swift's wedding and saying no -- Which is to say, not an option, And by the  
35 way, Taylor -- I'm an excellent officiant, just ask Allie Kimmel.  
36  
37 In all seriousness, the revitalization of Burnham Yard, one of our state's most historic  
38 properties, lays the groundwork for an amazing hub with multimodal transit, shops,  
39 restaurants, and entertainment, and of course, the A-F-C-West Champion Denver  
40 Broncos. We look forward to beating the Bills this Saturday, and -- hopefully -- hosting  
41 a Super Bowl parade in February.  
42  
43 We are looking at every piece of the puzzle to make it safer and more affordable to get  
44 where you need to go. Today, high auto insurance rates -- the 5th highest nationally --  
45 lead to far too many uninsured drivers, making our roads less safe for all and further  
46 driving up rates.  
47  
48 That's why I launched the Roadmap to Reduce Auto Insurance Premiums, an action  
49 plan to improve road safety and lower auto insurance costs.  
50  
51 And by more than doubling the number of wildlife crossings statewide to more than  
52 70, including the world's largest in Greenland -- no, not that Greenland, Greenland,  
53 Colorado, leave the other Greenland alone! -- we're reducing wildlife-vehicle  
54 collisions by 90%.  
55

1 We're putting the days of too much time spent in traffic, too much money to get  
2 around, and too much pollution in the rearview mirror, pushing past the way it is to  
3 achieve the way it can be.  
4

5 Twenty-six years ago, I was driving around the state in an old school bus campaigning  
6 for the State Board of Education, demanding more investment in Colorado schools to  
7 ensure every student could get a high quality education and thrive.  
8

9 My passion for education is what drew me into public service after starting my career  
10 as an entrepreneur, and is what continues to drive my work as Governor.  
11

12 There are so many ways we can build a bright future for Colorado and almost all of  
13 them begin with education. Education is about opportunity and hope.  
14

15 Colorado students today get a strong start with free preschool and free full day  
16 kindergarten, thanks to Representative Sirota and Senator Bridges.  
17

18 Students head into fully funded schools thanks to our work with the JBC. Indicators  
19 of class size are down by one student today from when I first took office – and average  
20 teacher pay is up over \$13,000 dollars per year.  
21

22 If you visit a Colorado classroom today, as I did this week in Colorado Springs, you  
23 might notice something special about Colorado's first and third graders. These classes  
24 include the first group of Colorado students to go to free preschool and free full day  
25 kindergarten.  
26

27 I've met a lot of them in our schools and usually their first question is 'who are  
28 YOU?!, ' sometimes followed by, "I want to be governor when I grow up!"  
29

30 When I started out as Governor, going to kindergarten for a full day of school, and  
31 going to preschool at all was treated like a bonus, not a necessity.  
32

33 But the data speaks so clearly otherwise.  
34

35 High-quality early education prevents achievement gaps, and helps with reading, math,  
36 and long term success in school, all while saving families \$6,300 a year on preschool  
37 and \$500 a month on full day kindergarten.  
38

39 Colorado families eagerly raised their hands to sign up for preschool and kindergarten,  
40 catapulting Colorado from 27th nationally for preschool enrollment to third under the  
41 leadership of Dr. Lisa Roy.  
42

43 And today, 98% of kindergarteners take advantage of free-full day kindergarten.  
44

45 We've dedicated historic funding to Colorado classrooms, increasing funding per  
46 student from just over \$8,000 in 2019 to nearly \$12,000 today, and finally with the  
47 leadership of Speaker McCluskie, Assistant Majority Leader Bacon, and the Joint  
48 Budget Committee, tackled the beast – the Budget Stabilization Factor that for more  
49 than a decade hamstrung our schools with too little funding.  
50

51 At the same time, we've worked to protect school funding and the services Coloradans  
52 rely on from a rainy day or recession. When I took office, the state's budget reserves  
53 were at 7.25% and today, we're in the double digits with 13% in the bank.  
54  
55

1 While our reserves took a minor dip after President Trump and Congress torched our  
2 budget last year, we're on track to get our reserves back up to 15% in the coming  
3 years.

4  
5 In Colorado, we're doing our part to help our talented, hardworking educators do what  
6 they do best: shaping the next generation of learners and leaders.

7  
8 Each of us can remember a teacher, or likely several, who helped us become who we  
9 are today. I want to thank all of the teachers here today, and across Colorado, for your  
10 incredible contributions to our state now and into the future.

11  
12 A good education gives students a head start right out of the box, and high-quality  
13 skills and workforce development help Coloradans cross home plate to a good job.

14  
15 Last year, Colorado high school students enrolled in a record 146,000 courses through  
16 our Community College System, earning college credit before graduating and saving  
17 over \$71 million in tuition costs.

18  
19 Today we are joined by Mariah, a Nursing student at CSU Pueblo. Thanks to  
20 concurrent enrollment opportunities, Mariah earned two credentials and completed the  
21 first three years of her Bachelor's, while still in high school at Swallows Charter  
22 Academy in Pueblo. And today, Mariah is working in an ICU in Colorado Springs  
23 while completing her studies. Welcome, Mariah!

24  
25 Through the bipartisan National Governors Association, my Chair Initiative: Let's Get  
26 Ready: Educating All Americans for Success, kickstarted a long-overdue national  
27 conversation about how we better connect the skills students get in school with those  
28 that lead to a good job.

29  
30 Now, we are putting the lessons learned from Let's Get Ready into practice. Alongside  
31 six other states, led by both Democratic and Republican governors, we are tracking  
32 student readiness in real-time with a new dashboard to more accurately and quickly  
33 evaluate if students are ready for and successful at what comes next.

34  
35 We're saving Coloradans money with free and low-cost training opportunities, and  
36 making the first two years of college free for many Coloradans, thanks to the  
37 bipartisan work of Speaker McCluskie, Representatives Taggart, Senators Kirkmeyer  
38 and Mullica.

39  
40 As one of the largest employers in the state, we're leading by example by hiring for  
41 the right skills instead of the right degree, putting an end to the days where good  
42 candidates were turned away just because they don't have a college degree.

43  
44 Our workforce investments are bold, innovative, and nation leading. And while there's  
45 a lot to be proud of, it's not enough.

46  
47 People change jobs more frequently nowadays.

48  
49 And yet, our job training system is not working for every Coloradan. It's a maze of  
50 more than 20 divisions, offices, and units across seven state departments. The 110  
51 programs available have different eligibility requirements, applications, and outcome  
52 measures. I will now read the names of all 110 workforce programs. There will be a  
53 quiz at the end.

54  
55

1 But seriously, if even I can't name them all, how can we expect everyday Coloradans  
2 trying to get ahead to figure out how to navigate this maze?

3  
4 Transformative results require bold action. That is why we are calling for a unified  
5 department to serve as a one-stop-shop for Coloradans to access high-quality skills,  
6 training, apprenticeships, and education. This bipartisan effort led by Speaker  
7 McCluskie, Representative Taggart, and Senators Bridges and Frizell is truly poised  
8 to unlock opportunity and prosperity for all Coloradans.

9  
10 Helping Coloradans get job-ready is another way we are making Colorado the best  
11 place to work and do business. Today, we are proudly home to a robust  
12 business-friendly ecosystem, ranked the top state for female entrepreneurs three years  
13 in a row, and fourth best business environment overall by US News and World Report.  
14 With Eve Lieberman at the helm of our Office of Economic Development and  
15 International Trade, companies continue to thrive in Colorado. Businesses like Boom  
16 Supersonic, a \$1.5 billion dollar company that started in a Denver basement and is  
17 now building a supersonic passenger jet that could get from Denver to London in just  
18 over five hours.

19  
20 My own career is one that in its earliest days was shaped by the promise of emerging  
21 technology – at the time, internet 1.0 – when I launched an internet service provider  
22 from my college dorm room. This experience taught me a lot about how technology  
23 is a tool that can and must be used to maximize opportunity and innovation.

24  
25 Along those same lines, AI has tremendous potential – but I assure you, did not write  
26 this speech! We must act thoughtfully to embrace innovation while empowering  
27 consumers.

28  
29 Today, we are called upon to ensure Colorado remains a leading state for artificial  
30 intelligence for both businesses and consumers. Now is the time to get this done in a  
31 way that drives innovation and protects Coloradans.

32  
33 In my time as Governor, one of the greatest honors has been serving alongside the  
34 talented men and women who work for state government. We are so fortunate to have  
35 such passionate, dedicated Coloradans working across the state, taking on the most  
36 difficult challenges we face, and bringing creativity and a commitment to service to  
37 their work every single day.

38  
39 Today, I am honored to be joined by Fidela Jacquez, one of our longest serving state  
40 employees whose nearly 50 years in service to Coloradans across the Departments of  
41 Public Safety, Transportation, and Revenue, and mentorship of her fellow state  
42 employees, has and will continue to make a huge impact on our state now and into the  
43 future.

44  
45 Our efforts to support Colorado's hardworking and dedicated state employees is  
46 further strengthened by our work with Colorado WINS, led by Hilary Glasgow. Thank  
47 you Hilary and your team, including President Diane Byrne here with us today, for  
48 your passionate advocacy on behalf of our workforce, and for our partnership  
49 throughout my governorship.

50  
51 Since day one, I've taken on special interests and tackled challenges that critics said  
52 could never be solved.

53  
54 When it comes to health care, I would measure our accomplishments against any state  
55 in the nation.

1 Under the leadership of Lieutenant Governor Dianne Primavera and our Office of  
2 Saving People Money on Health Care, we've tallied nearly three billion dollars in  
3 savings for Coloradans even as national costs went up tens of billions of dollars more.  
4  
5 We partnered with bipartisan legislators including Patrick Neville and Pueblo's own  
6 Daneya Esgar on our nation-leading hospital price transparency law. We passed the  
7 landmark Colorado Option and bipartisan reinsurance alongside Speaker McCluskie,  
8 Senators Jodeh, Rich, and Roberts. We brought Republicans and Democrats together  
9 to put an end to surprise billing. We've made six behavioral health care sessions free  
10 for Coloradans under 18 with Senator Michaelson Jenet. Thanks to the efforts of  
11 Senators Gonzales and Weissman, Representatives Froelich and Zokaie, we built in  
12 needed protections to assure Coloradans that if they are in need of emergency care and  
13 their doctor recommends an abortion to save their life, they will not be turned away.  
14  
15 With the leadership of Division of Insurance Commissioner Mike Conway, we created  
16 a first-in-the-nation group that is finally capping the cost of the most expensive drugs  
17 and we know we're on the right track, because we've already been sued twice by big  
18 pharma. Years before the federal government, alongside Senator Roberts we capped  
19 the price of insulin.  
20  
21 Despite all this – and more – we're not where we need to be.  
22  
23 High-powered and well-funded corporate interests have proven to be deeply  
24 entrenched in our politics. It's like the Avengers fighting Thanos. We are up against  
25 big hospitals, pharma, and insurance, alongside a federal government often eager to  
26 cozy up to these special interests.  
27  
28 Colorado's application to import lower-cost prescription drugs from Canada – thanks  
29 to the leadership of Kim Bimestefer and Senator Rodriguez – languishes in  
30 Washington, first under President Biden and now under President Trump and RFK Jr.  
31  
32 The reality is, the incentives are simply FUBAR. Americans are getting screwed on  
33 health care.  
34  
35 Today, hospitals rake in billions of dollars in profits, and actually get away with  
36 charging \$5,000 for an ice pack, \$600 for a bandaid, while insurance companies and  
37 pharma raise prices on consumers. I was perhaps a bit naive to think I'd be able to pull  
38 together a coalition to fight back against such absurd charges.  
39  
40 Too often, we fight over incremental progress, and when we stand up for systemic  
41 change, we are met with the might of the medical industrial complex and their highly  
42 effective scare tactics. I saw this firsthand when I was in Congress working to pass the  
43 Affordable Care Act, and I've seen it time and time again as Governor.  
44  
45 It's truly mind-boggling that every other industrialized Western country in the world  
46 has figured out a way to provide universal health care at a baseline for everyone. Japan  
47 spends less than half of what America spends on health care, and their average  
48 lifespan is six years longer.  
49  
50 Let me be clear. Our dedicated doctors, nurses, and providers work around the clock  
51 to give Coloradans great care. Our essential safety-net hospitals – especially in rural  
52 communities – are filling the gap while fighting tooth and nail to keep their doors  
53 open, made all the more difficult with the federal government taking a sledgehammer  
54 to Medicaid.  
55

1 Fixing the broken cycle is not about spending more. We're already doing that and it  
2 ain't working.

3  
4 The federal government today makes up about half of health care payers through  
5 Medicare and Medicaid – it's long past time the feds start negotiating with  
6 prescription drug companies and hospitals and actually drive down costs.

7  
8 Instead, premiums are skyrocketing across the country after Congress failed to extend  
9 the tax credits that millions of Americans rely on to keep health care affordable. In  
10 some ways, it's one of those \$600 bandaids, but has at least prevented major increases  
11 in insurance premiums.

12  
13 In Colorado, we're doing the best with what we have by maximizing efficiency and  
14 refusing to let Medicaid, the payer we do have, fail.

15  
16 The reality is that health care expenses are rising far faster than the rest of our budget.  
17 We must take action to bring Medicaid costs to a more sustainable level and protect  
18 access for the 1.2 million Coloradans who rely on Medicaid.

19  
20 The numbers are stark - I almost brought my charts, but I'll spare you. Ask a JBC  
21 member, we can't afford to keep growing Medicaid at its current pace while still  
22 funding schools, roads, and public safety.

23  
24 So let's focus on spending less, covering more people, and getting better health  
25 outcomes.

26 As Babe Ruth famously said, "never let the fear of striking out keep you from playing  
27 the game." Let me be clear. We've been in the game and we're giving it our all.

28  
29 But when it comes to health care, special interests like big hospitals, big pharma, big  
30 insurance and Pharmacy Benefit Managers, are the umpires and have way too much  
31 influence to call the pitches the way they like.

32  
33 We will continue fighting for Coloradans, but ultimately, we need Washington to step  
34 up and take real action on a real solution. Call it what you will – a social insurance  
35 model, multi-payer universal health care, Medicare for All, a single payer system with  
36 private insurance and care on top – no matter the jargon, the outcome is what matters:  
37 health care for everyone at lower costs.

38  
39 It's long past time Washington got on the side of hardworking Americans, and out of  
40 the pockets of special interests.

41  
42 Just like our health, our safety is also critical to being able to lead a good life. When  
43 I set the bold goal to make Colorado one of the ten safest states in the nation, we got  
44 right to work taking data-driven, common-sense steps to prevent crime in the first  
45 place, better equip law enforcement, and crack down on crime.

46  
47 We're seeing real progress. A new report from our Division of Criminal Justice shows  
48 that In the past year, violent crime is down over 13%. Property crime is down nearly  
49 18%, representing nearly 14,000 fewer crimes. Through targeted investments and  
50 increased penalties, we've achieved a 61% decrease in auto theft in four years,  
51 including a 34% drop in the last year alone. In a single year, we've seen a 95% decline  
52 in catalytic converter theft in Denver.

53  
54

1 Thanks to the support of voters, we are boosting state support for local law  
2 enforcement through Proposition 130, which I proudly supported. This year, the first  
3 round of \$15 million in funding will go to local law enforcement to boost recruitment,  
4 retention, and training.  
5

6 We are endlessly grateful for the service, bravery, and dedication of Colorado's law  
7 enforcement officers, veterans, and service members. I want to thank all those here  
8 with us today for serving our state and nation with pride, ensuring our safety and  
9 security.  
10

11 Keeping Coloradans safe includes better preparing for, preventing, and responding to  
12 the year-round threat of wildfires. We've expanded Colorado's arsenal of firefighting  
13 tools, including state-owned helicopters like the Firehawk and multi-mission aircraft,  
14 fire engines, crews, and contracted air tankers, to ensure we can act quickly and  
15 decisively whenever and wherever a fire breaks out.  
16

17 Our National Guard servicemembers have been on the frontlines – on the ground and  
18 in the air – in the aftermath of Colorado's devastating fires and floods. Always at the  
19 ready, they flew helicopters to drop water on the Cameron Peak and East Troublesome  
20 fires, provided real-time data on fire spread, and helped control traffic out of  
21 evacuation zones in the Marshall Fire. These are the missions that matter for our  
22 communities. I want to recognize the bravery and commitment to service that  
23 exemplify our Colorado National Guard, and show our respect for their commitment  
24 to helping Coloradans through our hardest moments.  
25

26 Looking ahead, there is more work to be done to ensure all Coloradans can thrive in  
27 safe communities.  
28

29 While the Trump administration leaves states in the lurch, cancelling \$29 million and  
30 threatening \$19 million more in safety grants owed to Colorado, we are stepping up  
31 to do what we can to fill the gap, refusing to leave our safety to chance.  
32

33 My balanced budget proposal includes support to monitor and protect Coloradans  
34 against rising threats of political violence and extremism, along with support for  
35 emergency preparedness, response, and recovery to ensure we are prepared to act  
36 quickly if disaster strikes. Once again, this is work that we would normally have  
37 federal partnership on, but Washington is threatening exactly this funding.  
38

39 Keeping Coloradans safe includes protecting the spaces we gather, learn, and pray.  
40 Today, over 73 non-profits including synagogues, mosques, and churches have made  
41 security upgrades with support from the Nonprofit Security grants. Our students  
42 deserve to learn free from fear. Our Office of School Safety has supported 239  
43 projects to boost safety and emergency response at 190 schools and districts across  
44 Colorado.  
45

46 Together, under the leadership of Senator Sullivan and so many others – too many to  
47 name here – we've taken common-sense steps to reduce gun violence while protecting  
48 our second amendment rights. The nation-leading red flag law has been enforced over  
49 478 times to protect Coloradans and our communities. Waiting periods, safe and  
50 responsible gun storage requirements, and cracking down on ghost guns, help keep all  
51 Coloradans safe. Colorado is proud to support responsible gun ownership, including  
52 with expanded background checks and making the theft of any firearm a felony. We  
53 are protecting the rights of Coloradans to own the gun of their choice while  
54 implementing new training for rapid fire and assault-style weapons through Colorado  
55 Parks and Wildlife later this year. By cracking down on gun trafficking and illegal  
56 firearm activity, we've gotten 183 illegal guns off the streets.

1 To truly keep Colorado safe, we must urgently address gaps in our system related to  
2 those who cannot stand trial but are charged with a crime, and ensure that individuals  
3 who pose a danger to themselves or others are not just released onto the streets. My  
4 supplemental budget request includes funding for the state to work alongside local  
5 governments and the judicial branch to pursue appropriate, secure placements and  
6 services, and I am asking the legislature to move quickly to get bipartisan legislation  
7 to my desk. Thank you to Speaker McCluskie, Minority Leader Caldwell, Senator  
8 Amabile, and Minority Leader Simpson for leading bipartisan action.

9  
10 Delivering real results for Coloradans is as much about our values as it is about  
11 making life easier and more affordable.

12  
13 We are showing that it's possible to cut pollution, lower costs, and spur innovation,  
14 following the demands of the market.

15  
16 By cutting pollution, we are cleaning up our air in ways we can see and feel, helping  
17 to reduce bad air quality days, which are down from 65 days in 2021 to 30 days in  
18 2025. My dad in particular appreciates that.

19  
20 During my time as Governor, the share of energy Colorado gets from low-cost clean  
21 sources has grown by nearly 75%, enough power nearly 3 million homes for a year.

22  
23 I am excited about bright spots like Holy Cross Energy serving Eagle, Pitkin, Garfield,  
24 Mesa, and Gunnison Counties. At its peak last spring, Holy Cross generated 96% of  
25 its energy from low-cost clean sources.

26  
27 Meanwhile, Washington DC, is tipping the scales toward expensive, out-of-date coal  
28 production that drives up costs, pollutes our air, and subjects all of us to volatile price  
29 swings in natural gas. We saw this after the Texas winter storm which drove up energy  
30 bills for many Coloradans by nearly \$20 a month for years.

31  
32 In Colorado, we tackle climate challenges head on, instead of burying our heads in a  
33 pile of coal. I would say snow, but sadly snowpack this year is only 62% of average.

34  
35 We're charging forward on the plan to 100% clean energy to unlock the lowest cost  
36 clean energy for Coloradans. By 2030, more than 70% of Colorado's electricity will  
37 come from wind and solar. But we need emerging technologies like geothermal or  
38 carbon capture to get us to 100%.

39  
40 That is why we are taking action alongside Representatives Willford, Senators  
41 Weissman and Amabile to maintain the important goal of 100% clean energy while  
42 building in needed flexibility to adapt to the realities of federal headwinds.

43  
44 Now is the time to double down on investment and innovation to build more of what's  
45 needed to power our homes and businesses, including power lines and power plants.

46  
47 Local governments play a key role in moving energy and transmission projects along,  
48 but there is room to grow to ensure permitting across the state is clear, fast, and  
49 consistent.

50  
51 Long before my time as Governor, the oil and gas wars plagued our state. Colorado's  
52 patchwork regulatory environment had few if any meaningful standards.

53  
54 At best, Coloradans had to worry if oil and gas would be able to drill in their backyard  
55 and literally in their living rooms. For far too many Coloradans, this worry became a

1 reality. Even today, the devastating Enterprise Pipeline gasoline spill still impacts  
2 Southern Ute Indian Tribe land, showing us the importance of safety.

3  
4 In my first year as Governor, we passed the most robust regulatory framework for oil  
5 and gas in the country, moving drilling operations further from homes and schools. We  
6 drilled down to ensure that energy oversight is held to the highest standards, under the  
7 cutting-edge Energy and Carbon Management Commission, further supporting  
8 innovation in underground geothermal and carbon capture.

9  
10 I want to thank ECMC Commissioner Jeff Robbins for being with us since day one,  
11 dedicating his passion, vision, and expertise to this incredible generationally-important  
12 work.

13  
14 I also want to thank Erin Martinez who bravely shared her story after her home  
15 exploded from an undetected gas leak from drilling operations, tragically killing her  
16 husband and brother, and all those who paved the way to a safer future for Colorado.

17  
18 The apocalyptic warnings that our gold-standard regulations would somehow shut  
19 down the oil and gas industry in Colorado have proven to be completely unfounded.  
20 Today, we have a thriving, robust industry that is electrifying and getting cleaner  
21 while adding more protections for health and safety, and is accountable to Coloradans.

22  
23 We went on to bring responsible oil and gas companies and the environmental  
24 community together, preventing costly, divisive ballot measures and creating a new  
25 funding stream that moves our state from 42nd in transit funding to 23rd. This work  
26 was led by the late Senator Faith Winter, alongside Speaker McCluskie,  
27 Representatives Velasco, Willford, Froelich, Bacon and Senator Cutter.

28  
29 Time and time again, we've worked together to tackle the complex challenges we face  
30 and chart a sustainable, affordable path forward for Colorado.

31  
32 From securing our water future, to protecting our wildlife and conserving our public  
33 lands, we are taking these lessons with us to prepare for and build resilience to a  
34 hotter, drier climate.

35  
36 Under the leadership of Dan Gibbs with the Department of Natural Resources, we are  
37 implementing the visionary Colorado Water Plan and directing over \$127 million in  
38 new funding to support local water projects. We are seeing record interest in Water  
39 Plan Grants, which so far have supported 530 local projects.

40  
41 Agriculture is on the front lines of drought, and we are helping the next generation of  
42 producers get the tools and training needed to adapt to a changing climate. From  
43 Water Plan Grants to the transformative work led by Ag Commissioner Kate  
44 Greenberg, who just gave birth to her first child earlier this week, we are helping  
45 farmers and ranchers to prepare for and build resilience in the face of a hotter, dryer  
46 climate.

47  
48 Looking to the Colorado River, under the leadership of Commissioner Becky Mitchell,  
49 we are working to find consensus while protecting the water for Upper Basin states.  
50 There is no state better positioned to lead the way to a sustainable future for our  
51 namesake river.

52  
53 In light of the pine beetle outbreak spreading in the Front Range and foothills, we are  
54 stepping up to mitigate the most harmful impacts and protect our communities, forests,  
55 and key water sources.

1 We are also stepping up to support our pollinators, the workhorses of our ecosystems  
2 who are responsible for one in three bites of food we eat. Together, we are building  
3 on our work to protect pollinators from threats faced from some pesticides, including  
4 with bills this year led by Senators Kipp and Wallace.

5  
6 Our treasured public lands are part of the fabric of who we are in Colorado, full of fun  
7 and adventure, home to incredible wildlife, and key to our economy.

8  
9 Elevating enjoyment and care of our great outdoors go hand in hand. We've expanded  
10 our state parks and wildlife areas by over 90,000 acres, advanced conservation for  
11 270,000 federal acres like the Thompson Divide, and opened up access to over 1  
12 million acres of state trust lands.

13  
14 We've created more than \$120 million in new annual funding for the care and  
15 conservation of our public lands, including with the Keep Colorado Wild pass that cut  
16 the price of a state parks pass by more than half to \$29, and growing lottery funding  
17 for Colorado's outdoors. The first-of-its-kind outdoors strategy sets the vision to best  
18 care for our great outdoors while putting every dollar to the best possible use.

19  
20 The moving words of America the Beautiful have connected generations to Colorado's  
21 "Purple Mountains Majesty," inspired by the beauty of Pikes Peak, where I was earlier  
22 this week, we are ensuring that America's Mountain remains as central to Colorado's  
23 future as it has been to our nation's past. Through Colorado Parks and Wildlife's  
24 partnerships with Mayor Yemi, Colorado Springs Utilities, the US Forest Service,  
25 Great Outdoors Colorado, county and local leaders in the Outdoor Pikes Peak  
26 Initiative, and the Pikes Peak Outdoor Recreation Alliance, we are expanding  
27 opportunities – including new campgrounds, new trails, even better facilities  
28 maintenance – for Coloradans to enjoy and protect this hallowed place for generations  
29 to come.

30  
31 As we look ahead to our state's 150th birthday, what better way to honor Colorado's  
32 proud history and build toward a bright future than by elevating the care and  
33 conservation of our most iconic wild spaces.

34  
35 Our state's milestone year is also a milestone for many of us who are embarking on  
36 our last year in this building.

37  
38 I've truly enjoyed working with everyone here in this chamber, and those who came  
39 before. I want to recognize all of the legislators whose terms have matched up with  
40 mine – the class of 2026.

41  
42 And I encourage all of you to take this year to lead on issues you know I will agree  
43 with you on perhaps more than the next governor, whether it's school choice,  
44 eliminating puppy mills, technology innovation, supporting blockchain and crypto, or  
45 reducing the income tax, now's your chance.

46  
47 And on issues you know I disagree with you on, let's work together to find agreement.  
48 Much to my staff's chagrin, this year I demanded a special veto pen, after poor Jeff  
49 Bridges couldn't even get a regular one from David when I vetoed his bill.

50  
51 In the Lord of the Rings, Sam speaks to Frodo, saying "there's some good in this  
52 world, Mr. Frodo, and it's worth fighting for."

53  
54 Colorado, there's so much good, and we keep fighting for more.

55

1 There's good we've achieved – more homes for every budget, more ways to get  
2 around easier without sitting in traffic, and more opportunities for students at every  
3 stage – and the good that we know is still possible, what we continue to fight for.  
4  
5 When I ran to serve as your Governor I promised to be bold - heck, I made a lot of  
6 promises, that together, we've turned into a reality for Colorado.  
7  
8 Free preschool. Free full day kindergarten. More housing. Less pollution. We dream.  
9 We dare. We do.  
10  
11 I've been called many things – Colorado's education governor, marijuana governor,  
12 tech bro governor, gay governor, socialist, fascist, communist, capitalist, libertarian.  
13 I'll keep putting in the work and let others decide the labels, but at the end of the day,  
14 it's always been about delivering real results that leave our state better than we found  
15 it. And it's also about showing loving kindness for everyone and everything. I leave  
16 you with the advice to be kind and love your fellow human.  
17  
18 Through it all, what will always stick with me are the special moments during my time  
19 as Governor – visiting all 64 counties, picking and eating a fresh peach in Palisade,  
20 warm from the Colorado sun, the breathtaking view from atop the mesa at Fort Lewis  
21 College. Attending church on All Saints Day in Otero County trying with limited  
22 success to descend into the only active volcano in Colorado in Dotsero on a wire tied  
23 to a tree, taking our kids to see Tarantulas crawl near La Junta, picking Pueblo chiles,  
24 surprising seniors for lunch at the San Luis Senior Center. White knuckling it on the  
25 drive to the top of Pikes Peak.  
26  
27 Fulfilling a life goal by “playing” Red Rocks with Colorado South Park creators Matt  
28 Stone and Trey Parker. And, of course, getting married at the Mary Rippon Theater  
29 at the University of Colorado Boulder, Marlon's alma mater.  
30  
31 Speaking at the preschool graduation ceremony for the first class of universal free  
32 preschool. Reading to the first class of full-day kindergarteners.  
33  
34 And of course the people. My cabinet, including those who have been here since the  
35 beginning, many of whom I've already mentioned, along with Joe Barela, Michelle  
36 Barnes, Patty Salazar, and Tony Gheradini. Our incredible executive team, Danielle,  
37 Kara, Allie, Mark, Conor, Jesse, our entire staff, and their families who have also  
38 dedicated so much.  
39  
40 Our spectacular Colorado is matched only by the heart and ingenuity of those who call  
41 our great state home.  
42  
43 Seven years ago, I joined you all in delivering my first State of the State address, and  
44 shared what an honor it is to be your Governor.  
45  
46 In the time since, forces beyond us have shaped our reality - a once in a century  
47 pandemic, widespread inflation, the biggest and most destructive fires in our state's  
48 history, an unpredictable federal landscape, a massive wormhole connecting to the  
49 Abyss with an upside down version of Colorado and our only hope is a group of  
50 Dungeons & Dragons - playing teens.... Well, maybe not that.  
51  
52 But despite it all, we faced our challenges head on, never losing sight of our values  
53 and what makes us who we are. We stared down the abyss, destroyed our metaphorical  
54 Vecnas, and delivered big, bold progress for Colorado while rolling a natural 20 on  
55 landing Sundance, the All-Star Game, and the quantum accelerator.

1 In this time of great division, now more than ever we must come together as  
2 Coloradans, leading with kindness and respect to move our ONE team, our great state,  
3 forward.

4  
5 The state of our state is strong. Resilient. Loving. Kind. Innovative. Free. And ever  
6 bright with the promise of a Colorado for All. So long, and thanks for all the fish.

7  
8 G-d bless you all, G-d bless Colorado, and G-d bless the United States of America!

9

 48 The Speaker declared a quorum present and as is customary presented the  
 49 gavel to the President of the Senate to preside over the Joint Session.

 51 President Coleman requested the Joint Committee, composed of Senators  
 52 Danielson, Chair, Hinrichsen, and Kirkmeyer, and Representatives Ricks,  
 53 Chair, Clifford, and Suckla to escort the Tribal Representatives from the  
 54 Ute Mountain Ute Tribe Tribal Council and the Southern Ute Indian  
 55 Tribe Tribal Council to the rostrum.

1 Chief Sergeant-at-Arms Stephen Rosenthal announced the arrival of the  
2 Melvin J. Baker, Chairman of the Southern Ute Indian Tribe and  
3 Councilmember Marilyn House of the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe.

4  
5 The Joint Committee escorted the Tribal Representatives from the Ute  
6 Mountain Ute Tribe and the Southern Ute Indian Tribe to the rostrum  
7 where they addressed the Joint Session.

**ADDRESS BY COUNCILMEMBER MARILYNN HOUSE**

12

First and foremost I want to thank you all for giving the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe and our Sister Tribe, the Southern Ute Indian Tribe this time to address the Colorado Assembly.

My name is Marilyn Susan House I am a member of the Ute Mountain Ute Tribal Council from Towaoc Colorado.

The Ute Mountain Ute Tribe and the State of Colorado have a history of working together. Together we have been able to meet the needs of both state and Tribe. This is a time of Economic growth and development in all areas for the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe. The Ute Mountain Ute Tribe would ask to receive support from the state in moving its growth forward.

Moving forward the Colorado Legislatures have the ability to assist the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe with issues that impact the Ute Mountain Ute Tribes resources, and the lives of the Ute Mountain Ute People. Giving the opportunity for the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe to have a voice and position to express our concerns is critical for our tribe and it's stability.

Our needs as a Ute Sovereign nation are many, those needs and wants are possibly the same as other Native American Tribes and Communities in our country today.

We as the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe would like to address the continued work and attention to the following areas:

Safety amongst our Tribal Community has always been a priority and in the recent years even more so. We have seen gun violence and other acts of violence in our community and from these acts we have seen families who cry and bury their loved ones. These acts of violence knows no age or gender. These acts have become the norm for our people of Towaoc. We as a tribe have requested added BIA Law Enforcement to help protect our people. But we have been met with not enough BIA officers or not enough Funding. Recently the UMUT was visited by the US Attorney General from Colorado. Phil Weiser. The Ute Mountain Ute Tribe requests that the US attorney General prosecute any individuals who bring harm to our Community and it's members to the fullest extent of the law.

We deserve to give our members and families justice for crimes that are committed on the Ute Mountain Ute Lands. We hope for a day where we too can live and thrive in a safe community for all our members within the boundaries of the Ute Mountain Ute Reservation.

We know housing is a common factor in all communities. Families grow and with growth comes the need for space. And Like so many other cases in Indian Country Housing is a priority. Our Housing waiting list has # of people, waiting for a home.

1 We would request that funding for Housing and Housing Development be a priority  
2 for the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe.  
3

4 The Ute Mountain Ute Tribe is addressing its housing shortage and plans to apply to  
5 Colorado Housing and Finance Authority- CHFA for both Federal Low Income  
6 Housing Tax Credits and Colorado State Housing Tax credits. Should the Tribe be  
7 awarded from these programs it will enable the Tribe to build 15 new homes in the  
8 Towaoc Community. In moving this project forward the Tribe has meet with  
9 individuals from Colorado state offices. This working relationship is one that the Tribe  
10 is excited to continue working with the State on.  
11

12 The Health of the Ute Mountain Ute tribe and it's people are vital for our tribe to  
13 thrive. And when we talk about Health it's not just about Healthcare that's important  
14 but Mental Health, Physical Health, emotional health and Environmental Health.  
15 Having Access to more Funding for programs to help strengthen our people is a must.  
16 As we all heard yesterday Health care for all is what we strive for and the Ute  
17 mountain Ute Tribe is no exception to that.  
18

19 Continuation of Tribal Consultation is needed and a must in order for the Ute  
20 Mountain Ute Tribe to have their issues addressed and properly considered when  
21 legislation is being proposed or eliminated. Colorado usually honors Tribal  
22 Consultation, However there have been times when Colorado has not followed  
23 through with its obligation to consult with the Tribes on certain matters or legislation  
24 issues. Tribal Consultation allows the Tribes say in any areas that may be changed or  
25 affected. An open communication is what all tribes in this country should have and be  
26 entitled too as the Government has broken many promises and treaties. A way to move  
27 forward from the past would be to always consult with the tribes. Our voice of the Ute  
28 Mountain Utes Matter.  
29

30 The Tribe needs assistance with the complex negotiations with States and Federal  
31 agencies to secure their water rights in the Colorado River post 2026 operations. Many  
32 Tribes have been forced to bargain away their senior water rights in order to have  
33 access to the much needed infrastructure. This leaves the tribes within the basin more  
34 susceptible to state decisions to just accept their water cuts. Water is a cornerstone of  
35 the tribes growing their communities and developing local economics while  
36 supporting the livihoods and well- being of their members. The February 14, 2026  
37 deadline for these negoations are quickly approaching and the Tribe has treaty  
38 obligations that federal agencies and states must respect and up hold and the Tribe  
39 would ask for any assistance from the State in protecting these water rights. And as  
40 it was said by the Late Chief Jack House, the last Hereditary Chief of the Ute  
41 Mountain Utes, and I Quote " Chief wants his water too".  
42

43 Colorado Department of Transportation, CDOT- Our roads that run through our  
44 reservation must be safe for all, especially our people of the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe  
45 who travel these roads on a daily basis for school, Work and everyday needs. More  
46 maintenance and signage on the Colorado Highway 491 would ensure that the roads  
47 that run through the reservation are equipped properly for drivers to be safe. More  
48 safety studies on high traffic intersections and safety plans are needed. Over the years  
49 these high traffic intersections are dangerous and have been overlooked.  
50

51 Educational Curriculum in Colorado Schools and the Native American impacts and  
52 history in the State of Colorado: The Utes have settled in the state of Colorado since  
53 time and memorial. The Utes and other Native American leaders have had an impact  
54 on the state of Colorado. Some of those Ute Leaders we see here today in our capitol,  
55 such as Chief Jack House and Buckskin Charlie. In areas of education it would be

1 important to not only teach this very important lesson in Colorado Schools but also  
2 give back recognition to the Native Americans who have made contributions to the  
3 state of Colorado. These lessons are crucial to understanding how our state of  
4 Colorado partners with the Ute Tribes in Colorado. The partnerships we build together  
5 are very important today.

6  
7 The Ute Mountain Ute Tribe is a growing tribe and along with the growth comes a  
8 need for more infrastructure. New infrastructure helps improve the lives of young and  
9 old who are living on the reservation. Access and assistance on future infrastructure  
10 on the Ute Mountain Ute Reservation is needed.

11  
12 There needs to be a continuation of Tribal engagement at all departments who interact  
13 with the tribes to embolden them to seek their own self- determination and  
14 self-reliance. The Tribe wants to contribute to the state and the Sun Bear Solar Project  
15 the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe is developing is one key component in this contribution.  
16 The energy this solar project can provide will assist with the stabilization of the  
17 electric grid and add another energy project to the state's portfolio. There are issues  
18 holding back this project that Colorado Legislatures could held provide a solution too  
19 and help the Tribe to make this project a complete success.

20  
21 The tribe has asked the State to work with them to convince Congress and the US  
22 Administration to disseminate Tribally-Designated funds directly to the Tribe rather  
23 than burden the State with cost and effect to manage and distribute the funds. An  
24 example of this is the Broadband grant funding, originally the Tribe was to directly  
25 receive the Broadband grants however the grants ended being passed to the Tribes  
26 through the State of Colorado. Again that is working together for all.

27  
28 The Ute Mountain Ute Tribe has been apart of the state of Colorado since time and  
29 memorial. We are located in the Southwest part of Colorado. Our reservation expands  
30 to 3 states, Colorado, Utah and New Mexico. We the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe request  
31 that we meet more than twice a year with you all. If you invite we will come. In  
32 Building not just a relationship, but a connection happens when we see more of each  
33 other and while the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe appreciates the time to address you all we  
34 would like to do it more often. Needs do change often and the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe  
35 would like to communicate those needs as often as possible.

36  
37 As you see the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe has interest in all areas. The Ute Mountain Ute  
38 Lands extend throughout the state of Colorado and these issues presented today are  
39 but a few issues the Tribe would like to work on with the state of Colorado. There are  
40 numerous ongoing issues and these issues addressed today are just an indication of the  
41 value of our relationship and a demonstration of the extent to which we can help each  
42 other when we work together, consult with one another and to support one another.

43  
44 I also would like to highlight the positive outcomes when the State of Colorado works  
45 together with the Tribes.

46  
47 Colorado Consulted with and worked with the Tribes and were able to provide  
48 benefits to its Tribal Citizens by allowing free entry into State Parks. The State of  
49 Colorado has mandated outreach by the division of Parks and Wildlife by June 2026.  
50 This mandate gives tribes reassurance the state is providing the tribes with as much  
51 assistance as possible.

52  
53 The Colorado Voting Rights was another benefit the state provided to the tribes, by  
54 allowing Tribal ID's for voting and requiring the drop boxes on Tribal reservations.

1 This allowed more access to voting for our Tribal membership. This also provided the  
2 Tribe with the opportunity to be involved in their State's elections and have proper  
3 representations.

4  
5 Legislation was passed which gives full faith and credit to Tribal Court orders. This  
6 was long overdue and by working together the State and Tribe are now able to give  
7 full faith and credit to arrest warrants and the state further recognizes other Tribal  
8 Court Orders, including behavioral health commitment orders.

9  
10 This Legislation improves public safety and is a great example of the State recognizing  
11 the Tribe as a sovereign nation as ensuring enforcement of Tribal Judicial decisions  
12 within the State.

13  
14 I would also like to highlight the achievements made by the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe  
15 with assistance from the state of Colorado.

16  
17 This month we opened our first Grocery Store. On January 5th, 2026 the Ute  
18 Mountain Ute Tribe had the ribboning cutting of its' Nuchu Market. The market has  
19 been a long planned out grocery store that the Tribe envisioned during the Covid  
20 pandemic outbreak. The Tribe began working on the store once it realized the Tribal  
21 members had to travel to Cortez or New Mexico for basic grocery needs during a time  
22 when travel was dangerous to the health of Tribal members.

23  
24 Due to federal cuts in grants and other obstacles that the Tribe faced throughout the  
25 last several years the store opening was delayed. However, in recent weeks the Nuchu  
26 Market's opening finally came to reality. The store serves fresh fruit and vegetables  
27 as well as other every day groceries items which serves the community as Tribal  
28 members no longer have to drive 12 miles to get fresh groceries. When the federal  
29 funding was cut for the store the Tribe reached out to Colorado for funding assistance  
30 and received funding from Colorado Housing and Finance authority (CHFA) and the  
31 Colorado Trust. Without this additional funding from Colorado Nuchu Market may  
32 not have been able to open its doors. The Tribe thanks the State for working with the  
33 Tribe so that the Store was able to open. This is an accomplishment on the Tribe's  
34 behalf and it benefits all of the Towaoc community members, as well as meeting the  
35 people's needs who are traveling through the area.

36  
37 As everyone may recall, in 2020 the Ute Mountain Tribe established the Kwiyaat  
38 Community Academy, authorized by the Charter School Institute. The Kwiyaat  
39 Community Academy received funding from the Colorado Charter School Program.  
40 The Academy has been a huge success and continues to grow, from initially having  
41 kindergarten to 2nd grade.

42  
43 Now adding a grade every year. The Tribe is planning on adding the 6th grade to its  
44 program This is the only public school on a reservation in Colorado. At this Charter  
45 school our children are learning the Ute Language and the culture of the Ute People.  
46 We take pride in our school and what is taught, and as you all may or may not know  
47 Ute Children and other children of different tribes who attended boarding schools  
48 were beaten just for talking their language. It is a blessing to have our children learn  
49 these teachings that they will carry with them for the rest of their lives.

50  
51 At the Academy our Ute children are experiencing a unique learning atmosphere in  
52 which Tribal traditions are incorporated into every day learning. The children are  
53 taught by teachers and well as Ute elders who come into the school and story tell Ute  
54 history, and Ute Traditions. The Academy has complied with all the Colorado Grant  
55 Conditions and we thank the State for working with the Tribe in this original  
56 endeavor. The Tribe is now looking to build a new school to accommodate its growth.

1 The Tribe hopes it continues to receive support, both financially and academically,  
2 from Colorado such that this new school can come to actuality and the Academy can  
3 continue to grow for the benefit of the Tribal members and its children future.

4  
5 In closing, I would like to leave you with a few words to always remember as you all  
6 make decisions and laws regarding our state of Colorado. As times change and  
7 leadership changes, the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe may be overlooked and in some cases  
8 forgotten. But The Ute Mountain Ute Tribe is resilient and we are determined to thrive  
9 in all areas for the betterment of our people. The people of the Ute Mountain Ute  
10 Tribe are here and we are not going anywhere.

11  
12 I invite and welcome you all to come and visit the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe and the  
13 people. Come and see our children grow and learn in their School, come and see what  
14 our beautiful land has to offer, from our Sleeping Ute Mountain that has breath taking  
15 sunsets, come and see our rich culture of our people and the beautiful Beadwork we  
16 as Ute People wear with pride. We invite and welcome you all.

17  
18 I want to Acknowledge my fellow Council members who came to support this effort  
19 today, Council Woman Tawnie Knight and Council Woman Kathryn Jacket. Would  
20 you please stand up.

21  
22 I also want to acknowledge our other Ute Mountain Ute Council Members: Chairman  
23 Selwyn Whiteskunk, Vice Chair woman Gwen Cantsee, Council man Conrad Jacket,  
24 Council man Alston Turtle We all took this role as leaders to help lead our people of  
25 the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe to a better, brighter future. And we continue to strive and  
26 fight for what is best for our land and our people everyday.

27  
28 I want to thank you for your time and the opportunity to work together for the best  
29 interests for all who share Colorado and call it home.

30  
31 May God Bless you and your families and May God Bless the Ute Mountain Ute  
32 Tribe.

### **ADDRESS BY CHAIRMAN MELVIN J. BAKER**

39  
40

41 Maykh! Good morning to the members of the Colorado House of Representatives and  
42 Senate, staff, and honored guests. Thank you for the opportunity to stand before you  
43 today.

44 My name is Melvin J. Baker, and I am Chairman of the Southern Ute Indian Tribe.

45  
46 As I look around this chamber, I am reminded of the meaningful relationships we have  
47 built together. Relationships that cross party lines and are grounded in mutual respect  
48 and shared responsibility.

49  
50 I thank the leaders of this body for their continued engagement and partnership.

51  
52 At a time of deep polarization and differences across the nation, the Southern Ute  
53 Indian Tribe and the State of Colorado share a strong, government-to-government  
54 relationship—one that stands as a model for the rest of the country.

55

1 In many places, state-tribal relations remain strained. Here in Colorado, we have  
2 chosen a different path: one rooted in consultation, collaboration, and trust. This is a  
3 relationship we must maintain and look to improve.

4  
5 This relationship affirms our inherent sovereignty and our shared commitment to work  
6 together for our elders, children, relatives, neighbors, and for the generations yet to  
7 come.

8  
9 We must never forget that the mountains, rivers, and plateaus of this beautiful state  
10 bear the mark of the history and presence of the Ute people.

11  
12 The Utes are the oldest continuous inhabitants of what is now the State of Colorado,  
13 and our legacy endures in every part of this land. We call ourselves Nuuchiu, which  
14 translate to The People. Unlike many other Tribes, we do not have a migration story.

15  
16 According to our Creation story, we were placed in the Rocky Mountains by the  
17 Creator, who promised:

18  
19 "The Utes, though few in number, will be the mightiest and most valiant of heart."  
20

21 That promise lives on. The Nuuchiu are resilient. We are still here—advocating,  
22 protecting, and building a future for our people. We understand that our future  
23 depends on the health of the land. Conservation and stewardship are not just policies  
24 to us—They are responsibilities passed down through generations.

25  
26 Our homeland was once vast. In 1849, the Ute Nation—consisting of seven  
27 bands—entered into a treaty with the United States, establishing a Reservation that  
28 covered the western third of this state. Yet as mining interests sought access to our  
29 lands, those treaties were repeatedly broken. Through deception and broken promises,  
30 millions of acres were taken.

31  
32 In 1874 alone, the Brunot Agreement resulted in the loss of 3.7 million acres of Ute  
33 homeland—despite clear evidence of fraud. Still, we endured. Our current Reservation  
34 was established by treaty in 1878. Today, the Mouache and Kaputa bands form the  
35 Southern Ute Indian Tribe near Ignacio, Colorado.

36  
37 Our Reservation—72 miles long and 15 miles wide—is a checkerboard of Tribal trust  
38 lands, allotments, private lands, and federal holdings. This complexity creates  
39 jurisdictional gaps that challenge governance and public safety. Even in the face of  
40 these painful challenges, hope endures.

41  
42 Our connection with the land is unbreakable—it is our home, our strength, and our  
43 future. We are committed to protecting it and preserving our sovereignty.

44  
45 Through foresight, disciplined financial planning, and in-house expertise, the Southern  
46 Ute Indian Tribe has become a leader across Indian Country. We are developers of  
47 energy, real estate, construction, and private equity, and we are the largest employer  
48 in La Plata County, with more than 1,000 employees. We are honored to be the only  
49 Tribe in the nation with a Triple-A credit rating—a distinction that reflects integrity,  
50 accountability, and long-term vision.

51  
52 Our Growth Fund, which oversees the Tribe's economic development, recently  
53 celebrated its 25th anniversary. A milestone made possible by the wisdom of our  
54 elders, the leadership of those who came before us, and the dedication of our  
55 employees. From modest beginnings to becoming a cornerstone of economic strength,

1 the Growth Fund stands as a testament to stewardship and foresight. As the late  
2 Chairman Leonard C. Burch would often say, "What is good for the Tribe is good for  
3 the community." That truth guides everything we do.  
4  
5 The Southern Ute Indian Tribe is not just a partner; we are working to shape the future  
6 of Colorado to benefit all.  
7  
8 We have entered into Compacts and agreements with the State and local governments  
9 to ensure that we promote economic development and provide services to the  
10 community.  
11  
12 We honor our tax compacts and make payments in lieu of taxes—tens of millions of  
13 dollars that support local and state services.  
14  
15 Businesses on our Reservation contributes significant revenue to state and local  
16 governments.  
17  
18 And what makes this partnership unique is that the Tribe also provides essential  
19 services not only to our members, but to more than 10,000 Native and non-Native  
20 residents who live within the Reservation boundaries—often at no cost to the State.  
21  
22 We provide healthcare to thousands of patients each year. We fund and operate public  
23 safety, detention, and judicial services. We offer culturally responsive education  
24 through our Montessori Academy. We regulate air quality and protect water at  
25 standards that exceed state and federal requirements. We maintain irrigation  
26 infrastructure that supports Tribal and non-Tribal farmers. We helped make possible  
27 a modern hospital in La Plata County by providing land and significant financial  
28 support. And today, as communities across Colorado face a housing crisis, we are  
29 investing our own resources to deliver affordable housing for not only our Tribal  
30 Members.  
31  
32 But for teachers, healthcare workers, first responders, and local families—ensuring the  
33 people who serve our communities can afford to live in them. The Buckskin Charlie  
34 Housing project will consist of two apartment buildings with 30 units in each.  
35 Bringing 60 housing units to southwest Colorado. We anticipate opening our doors  
36 later this year.  
37  
38 In looking at historic milestones, the Tribe settled its water rights with the State of  
39 Colorado in 1986 —an agreement affirmed by Congress. Last May, the Tribe put its  
40 Animas-La Plata Project water to use for the first time for energy development.  
41  
42 The proceeds collected from this will be reinvested to update aging irrigation systems  
43 to benefit agricultural production and strengthen water resiliency for the benefit of the  
44 Tribe, our membership, and the community. But the strength of our relationship relies  
45 upon continuing collaboration and communication. There are times when we could do  
46 more.  
47  
48 This is the last year of my Chairmanship. Likewise, this is the last year of Governor  
49 Polis's term. For our last year, we should make certain commitments.  
50  
51 First, Missing Murdered Indigenous Relatives (MMIR) is not just an issue — it's a  
52 devastating reality for too many families. It is an epidemic in Indian Country. The  
53 safety of our loved ones 'should not be hindered by questions as to who has  
54 jurisdiction to investigate a crime. Behind every name and missing flyer, is a loved

1 one whose absence leaves a void. These are our sisters, brothers, cousins, children,  
2 parents, and grandparents. We must come together, stronger than ever to protect them  
3 and ensure that no more lives are stolen and no more voices are silenced.

4  
5 Therefore, I encourage the state and our local jurisdictions to enter into an  
6 Intergovernmental Agreement with the Tribe to share information and require law  
7 enforcement agencies to collaborate to protect our Native population living on the  
8 Reservation.

9  
10 Second, we need to collaborate to protect funding sources for those in our community  
11 who are most in need. On January 6th, Colorado received a letter from the federal  
12 Administration for Children and Families (ACF) indicating that they are restricting  
13 access to funding that supports families with children who have limited income. This  
14 kind of action affects us all — Tribal and non-tribal. We must work together to make  
15 sure these funds are restored, and we applaud Attorney General Phil Weiser's quick  
16 response in challenging this restriction.

17  
18 Third, stewardship also requires vigilance. When the land and water are threatened,  
19 we must take action cooperatively. In December of 2024, a gasoline pipeline owned  
20 by Enterprise Products of Houston, Texas, failed on private fee land within the  
21 exterior boundaries of our Reservation.

22  
23 The spill occurred adjacent to the Animas River. Enterprise never detected it. It was  
24 the homeowners who discovered it. Enterprise insisted the spill was 23,000 gallons.  
25 The Tribe questioned that number and finally, Enterprise acknowledged the spill was  
26 at least 97,000 gallons — over four times larger than their original estimate. We  
27 believe the true amount is considerably higher. Today it stands as the largest refined  
28 gasoline pipeline spill in Colorado since the State began tracking such incidents in  
29 2016.

30  
31 This spill occurred on land within the Reservation over which the State claimed  
32 jurisdiction. But the response of the Colorado Department of Public Health and  
33 Environment was weak.

34  
35 They failed to address the spill aggressively, allowing the gasoline plume to spread  
36 into the groundwater and inch closer to the Animas River. When we insisted the plume  
37 was larger than represented by Enterprise, our concerns were disregarded.

38  
39 One landowner after another has had to sell their home because their water wells were  
40 contaminated. State leadership has never visited the spill site to hear the concerns of  
41 the residents and the Tribe. We believe that if a similar spill occurred on the Front  
42 Range, the response would be immediate and direct.

43  
44 From the very beginning, the Southern Ute Indian Tribe has been actively and  
45 consistently engaged in responding to this incident. The Tribe has invested significant  
46 Tribal resources, over \$700,000 dollars: to independently monitor conditions,  
47 participate in ongoing coordination with state and federal agencies, and ensure that  
48 remediation efforts meet the highest standards.

49  
50 The presence of gasoline contamination in the groundwater raises serious concerns  
51 for: public health, environmental safety and long-term impacts to the Animas River,  
52 our Reservation and cultural resources, and those downstream. My Tribe has spent  
53 significant funds to address a major gasoline spill on land over which the State claims  
54 jurisdiction.

1 We believe the State has not allocated the appropriate level of resources to address the  
2 largest gasoline spill to date. We need to do better.  
3  
4 This incident is a reminder of the risks posed by aging infrastructure and the serious  
5 consequences when failures occur. It reminds us of the urgent need for strong  
6 regulatory oversight, timely remediation, transparency, and full accountability from  
7 responsible parties.  
8  
9  
10 While we remain deeply disappointed by the slow timeline for remediation and the  
11 lack of engagement: including the absence of a visit from elected state leadership.  
12  
13 My role as Chairman carries a strong duty to ensure we are being good stewards of the  
14 land, and that duty will remain as we navigate this crisis. We will be dealing with the  
15 ramifications of this spill for decades.  
16  
17 I encourage this administration to begin negotiations for an intergovernmental  
18 agreement with the Tribe to ensure that we collaborate and share economic resources  
19 for addressing this environmental disaster.  
20  
21 Fourth, we need to work cooperatively to address the unlawful use of our respective  
22 lands.  
23 For years, Lumen, which used to be called CenturyLink, has been trespassing on our  
24 Reservation.  
25  
26 Lumen uses Reservation land to gain access to other areas of the state, while failing  
27 to compensate the Tribe. Today, there are over 170 miles of line installed by Lumen  
28 crossing Tribal land, most of which were never approved.  
29  
30 The age of illegally using Tribal land should have ended long ago. But Lumen doesn't  
31 understand that. It has a history of trespassing on Tribal land in Indian Country. We  
32 have asked the CEO of Lumen to meet with us to discuss the issue, but the response  
33 we received was that she was too busy.  
34  
35 As Lumen attempts to divest itself of assets in Colorado, I encourage the Attorney  
36 General to engage with the Tribe to investigate the illegal use of Tribal lands and other  
37 lands within the State by Lumen.  
38  
39 Finally, for the past few years we have disagreed with the Governor over the Tribe's  
40 ability to engage in sports betting on Reservation lands.  
41  
42 We have a longstanding compact that governs gaming in this State. When we tried to  
43 enforce it, the Governor claimed immunity.  
44  
45 Our relationship depends on cooperation. We need to be able to enter into agreements  
46 with the State and trust they will be respected. We have just begun a mediation with  
47 the State to try to resolve this matter. We need to move forward. We may disagree at  
48 times, but we have always agreed to disagree and find a way to move forward. I  
49 challenge this administration in 2026 to work with us to find a solution to this  
50 longstanding issue.  
51  
52 As we look ahead, we remain committed to building upon the accomplishments of past  
53 leaders and elders—working tirelessly to create opportunity for our youth and stability  
54 for our communities. As a leader, I am deeply honored to advocate for policies that  
55 prioritize their well-being and open doors to their success.

1 As this legislative session moves forward, I ask that we remain grounded in the  
2 principles that define our partnership. The relationship between the Southern Ute  
3 Indian Tribe and the State of Colorado is progressive, enduring, and vital. To  
4 strengthen this relationship, we would warmly welcome the opportunity to provide a  
5 formal orientation for legislators. An opportunity to share our history, culture,  
6 governance, and priorities, and to identify areas where collaboration can continue to  
7 grow.

8  
9 While we have not always been formally included in these spaces, we believe  
10 meaningful partnerships begin with understanding. Let us learn from one another as  
11 leaders, so that we can continue building together with clarity, respect, and trust. This  
12 invitation comes at a meaningful moment.

13  
14 As our nation approaches America's 250th anniversary, and as Colorado reflects on  
15 its 150 years of statehood, we are called to consider not only the past, but the future  
16 we are shaping.

17  
18 Long before statehood and long before the founding of this nation, the Ute people  
19 have been here since time immemorial.

20  
21 Our history did not begin with these anniversaries, but our shared future continues  
22 well beyond them.

23  
24 As Colorado reflects on its first 150 years, let us ensure that the next 150 years are  
25 built together—with the two resident Tribes: Southern Ute and Ute Mountain Ute,  
26 fully seen, fully heard, and fully respected as sovereign governments and enduring  
27 partners.

28  
29 Through education, consultation, and collaboration, we can honor the full story of this  
30 land.

31  
32 While disagreements may arise, our commitment to working together ensures we will  
33 always find a path forward.

34  
35 As I head into the final year of my term as Chairman, I am deeply honored to stand  
36 before you today. I want to sincerely thank you for your partnership, for helping  
37 elevate our priorities, and for working beside us to build a stronger and better  
38 Colorado.

39  
40 Thank you for your willingness to listen, to learn, and to engage in good faith—and  
41 to many of you, thank you not only as colleagues, but as friends. It has been both an  
42 honor and a privilege to serve in this role and to speak on behalf of my Tribe. I am  
43 deeply grateful for the work we have accomplished together and for the future we  
44 continue to shape.

45  
46 As we build upon the legacy of our ancestors, past Tribal leaders, and former  
47 legislators, we reaffirm our commitment to their vision—and to building a brighter  
48 tomorrow together. Please accept my invitation to visit us not just for business but to  
49 build relationships and broaden our perspectives.

50  
51 Toghoyaqh!

24 After consideration on the merits, the Committee recommends the

36 (a) Chronic kidney disease and end-stage renal disease impose a  
37 severe health and financial burden on Colorado residents. In 2021, over  
38 8,000 Colorado residents were being treated for end-stage renal disease,  
39 with 4,994 of those residents depending on dialysis to stay alive. The  
40 annual insurance costs for chronic kidney disease in Colorado have  
41 reached \$457 million with patients paying nearly \$58 million  
42 out-of-pocket. According to the centers for disease control and prevention  
43 in the federal department of health and human services, one out of every  
44 7 adult Americans has chronic kidney disease, and up to 90% of those  
45 individuals do not know that they have it. The number of individuals who  
46 have chronic kidney disease is disproportionately higher in minority  
47 communities.

48 (b) Early screening for chronic kidney disease is essential but  
49 currently underutilized in Colorado. Among the 800,206 Coloradans who  
50 have hypertension, diabetes, or both hypertension and diabetes, an  
51 estimated 144,217 individuals likely have advanced, stages four or five,  
52 chronic kidney disease but many remain undiagnosed due to inadequate  
53 screening. Screening is critical because it allows for earlier diagnosis and  
54 cheaper interventions, which prevent the significant rise in cost and strain  
55 on the health-care system that occurs when chronic kidney disease is  
56 diagnosed late and, as a result, is often more advanced.

1 (c) Early detection through screening is cost-effective and  
2 prevents disease progression. Each comprehensive kidney function  
3 screening test includes serum creatinine, estimated glomerular filtration  
4 rate, and urine albumin-creatinine testing. This modest investment in  
5 preventive care can identify kidney disease at earlier and more treatable  
6 stages.

7 (d) Without early detection, the financial burden of chronic kidney  
8 disease escalates dramatically as the condition progresses. Patient  
9 out-of-pocket expenses rise from an average of \$280 annually for stage  
10 one chronic kidney disease to \$10,183 for end-stage renal disease.

11 (e) The kidney disease prevention and education task force,  
12 established pursuant to House Bill 21-1171, enacted in 2021, conducted  
13 a comprehensive study and identified early detection through accessible  
14 screening as critical to reducing both health complications and the  
15 financial strain of kidney disease on Colorado residents and the Colorado  
16 health-care system.

The House Committee on Ethics appointed pursuant to House Rule 49 has met to consider the complaint filed by Representative Brandi Bradley against Representative Ron Weinberg on July 29, 2025. In her complaint, Representative Bradley made the following allegations:

1. Amendment 41 and campaign finance violations (allegation number 1);
2. Aggressive behavior toward Representative Bradley during the 2023 legislative session (allegation number 2);
3. Firearm possession while intoxicated in violation of section 18-12-106, C.R.S. (allegation number 3);
4. Inappropriate or sexual comments directed at Representative Bradley in violation of the General Assembly's Workplace Harassment Policy (allegation number 4);
5. Aggressive behavior towards Representative Luck in the House State, Civic, Military, and Veterans Affairs Committee during the 2025 legislative session (allegation number 5);
6. Inappropriate sexual comments about other female legislators during a gathering at the Brown Palace on May 7, 2025, in violation of the General Assembly's Workplace Harassment Policy (allegation number 6); and
7. Taking and using a master key to gain access to unauthorized areas within the Capitol building, in violation of theft and trespass laws (allegation number 7).

Representative Weinberg filed a written answer to the complaint with the Ethics Committee on February 6, 2026, in which he denied all of the allegations and asserted that the allegations "are categorically false, misleading, and without merit." The complaint and answer are available on the House Committee on Ethics webpage.

The Ethics Committee met eight times, starting on February 2, 2026, and concluding on March 17, 2026, to conduct a preliminary investigation in accordance with House Rule 49 (c), make probable cause determinations on each of the allegations in accordance with House Rule 49 (d), and to

1 conduct further proceedings in accordance with House Rule 49 (d), (f),  
2 and (i). All of the meetings were open to the public, recordings of the  
3 meetings are available through the General Assembly's website, meeting  
4 summaries are available on the House Committee on Ethics webpage, and  
5 other public documents are available upon request to the Legislative  
6 Council Staff (LCS).

7  
8 At its meetings on February 2, February 12, and February 19, 2026, the  
9 Ethics Committee directed staff from the Office of Legislative Legal  
10 Services (OLLS) and the LCS to request documentary evidence from  
11 current and former members of the House of Representatives, House  
12 partisan and nonpartisan staff, legislative aides, the Colorado State Patrol,  
13 the Legislative Human Resources Division, the Elections Division in the  
14 Secretary of State's Office, and the Director of Security at the Brown  
15 Palace Hotel regarding specified allegations and to post a request to the  
16 public on the Ethics Committee's webpage regarding allegation number  
17 3. Additionally, at the Ethics Committee's request, the OLLS and LCS  
18 compiled information from the Secretary of State's TRACER database  
19 regarding allegation number 1, various news articles related to any of the  
20 allegations in the complaint, and audio recordings from two meetings of  
21 the House State, Civic, Military, and Veterans Affairs Committee related  
22 to allegation number 5.

23  
24 In response to its requests, the Ethics Committee received email and text  
25 message correspondence; social media posts; a report from the  
26 Legislative Human Resources Division; a report from the House Chief  
27 Clerk; an affidavit from a legislative aide; a member's handwritten,  
28 contemporaneous notes; and data from Colorado State Patrol regarding  
29 swipe key use by Representative Weinberg on December 31, 2024, to  
30 access the Capitol Building and open any doors within the Capitol  
31 Building that require a swipe key to access. Based on its review of these  
32 materials and the applicable laws, rules, and ethical principles, at its  
33 meeting on February 25, 2026, the Ethics Committee found, by  
34 unanimous vote on the motion on each allegation, the following:

- 35
- 36 • That probable cause exists to find that an ethics violation may  
37 have occurred regarding the following allegations in the ethics  
38 complaint:
    - 39 • Allegation numbers 4 and 6 regarding inappropriate sexual  
40 comments made by Representative Weinberg directed at  
41 Representative Bradley and inappropriate sexual  
42 comments made during a gathering at the Brown Palace in  
43 violation of the General Assembly's Workplace  
44 Harassment Policy; and
    - 45 • Allegation number 7 regarding taking and using a master  
46 key to gain access to unauthorized areas within the Capitol  
47 building; and
  - 48 • That probable cause does not exist that a violation occurred  
49 regarding allegation numbers 1, 2, 3, and 5.

50  
51 With regard to the finding on allegation number 1 regarding violations of  
52 Amendment 41 and campaign finance laws, the Ethics Committee based  
53 its determination on several factors, including:

54  
55

- 1 • That there is a separate complaint, based on the same underlying  
2 facts, pending before the Secretary of State, and that proceeding  
3 is a more appropriate venue to address alleged campaign finance  
4 violations;
- 5 • That the task of the Ethics Committee is to review conduct of  
6 members of the General Assembly rather than candidates for  
7 elected office; and
- 8 • That the expenditures were disclosed in campaign finance reports  
9 rather than hidden.

10

11 With regard to the finding of probable cause on allegation numbers 4 and  
12 6, the Ethics Committee combined these allegations, finding that there  
13 was a pattern of alleged behavior that indicated violations of the  
14 Workplace Harassment Policy may have occurred.

15

16 On the same day it made the probable cause findings, the Ethics  
17 Committee notified Representative Weinberg of its decisions and  
18 informed him of his right to request, by March 4, 2026, an evidentiary  
19 hearing pursuant to House Rule 49 (d). The Ethics Committee met again  
20 on February 27, 2026, to discuss next steps, including the procedures for  
21 and scope of an evidentiary hearing if requested. On March 4, 2026,  
22 Representative Weinberg submitted a request for a hearing before the  
23 Ethics Committee, and on March 9, 2026, the Ethics Committee met to  
24 discuss the procedures for the requested hearing, the process for  
25 determining witnesses to appear before the Ethics Committee, and the  
26 schedule for the hearing, which was set to commence on March 17, 2026,  
27 and continue on March 27, 2026, and subsequent dates as necessary to  
28 complete the hearing. On the afternoon of March 10, 2026,  
29 Representative Weinberg withdrew his request for a hearing, and Chair  
30 McCormick accepted the withdrawal.

31

32 At its final meeting on March 17, 2026, the Ethics Committee determined  
33 that, based on its probable cause determinations, it should proceed with  
34 recommendations. By unanimous vote, the Ethics Committee approved  
35 motions to recommend:

36

- 37 • That the Speaker, the Majority Leader, and the Minority Leader  
38 jointly send a letter of admonition to Representative Weinberg;  
39 and
- 40 • That the letter:
  - 41 • Express disapproval of Representative Weinberg's  
42 behavior at the Brown Palace, as demonstrated by a  
43 pattern of sexual harassment, and his conduct related to  
44 taking and using a master key to gain unauthorized access  
45 to areas of the Capitol; state that his behavior is  
46 unbecoming of a legislator; and, while the evidence was  
47 not clear, direct him to change his behavior in the future;  
48 and
  - 49 • Recommend that Representative Weinberg undertake  
50 sexual harassment training through the Legislative Human  
51 Resources Division.
