4 Call for the First Extraordinary Session  
5 of the Seventy-Second General Assembly  
6

7 Pursuant to the authority vested in the Governor of the State of  
8 Colorado, and in particular, pursuant to article IV, section 9 of the  
9 Colorado Constitution, and as recognized in article V, section 7, I, Jared  
10 Polis, Governor of the State of Colorado, hereby find that the following  
11 extraordinary occasions exist to convene the 72nd General Assembly to  
12 meet in special session.  
13

14 I. Background  
15

16 The Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment's  
17 (CDPHE) public health laboratory confirmed the first presumptive  
18 positive coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) test result in Colorado on  
19 March 5, 2020. I declared a disaster emergency due to the presence of  
20 COVID-19 in the State of Colorado on March 11, 2020. Since then, the  
21 COVID-19 Pandemic Emergency has cost the lives of over 2,300 of our  
22 fellow Coloradans, has strained our public health care system and health  
23 care capacity, damaged our economy, and taken a significant toll on our  
24 schools and institutions of higher education.  
25

26 Recent developments in vaccine research are encouraging. We can  
27 envision a near future when the COVID-19 Pandemic Emergency is  
28 behind us. But while the finish line is in sight, we must continue to  
29 protect ourselves and our loved ones from COVID-19. Case counts have  
30 steadily climbed through the fall, and it has become clear that we must  
31 take extraordinary measures to support Colorado's people and economy.  
32 Businesses and families need assistance to get through the challenging  
33 winter ahead. To meet this moment, we must make critical investments  
34 as soon as possible. Colorado small businesses and families struggling to  
35 pay rent and their electric bills cannot afford to wait until the 73rd  
36 General Assembly convenes on January 13th, 2021, which is why I am  
37 calling this extraordinary session of the General Assembly.  
38

39 This past fiscal year, the General Assembly passed a responsible  
40 budget in a very challenging fiscal environment. Their actions, combined  
41 with better than anticipated revenues during the summer months, resulted  
42 in surplus funds in the current fiscal year that we can direct to one-time  
43 support for businesses and families impacted by the COVID-19 Pandemic  
44 Emergency, while also helping to sustain our economy. I am calling this  
45 extraordinary session to ask the General Assembly to consider taking  
46 action in seven areas:  
47

48 Small Business

49 Small businesses, including gyms, restaurants, bars, arts and culture  
50 venues, and event-related businesses, such as entertainment venues, have  
51 struggled to stay open at lower capacities, making it difficult to pay their  
52 staff and rent. While these small businesses saw some recovery over the  
53 summer when many were able to provide walk-up and outdoor service,  
54 many still struggle due to lack of consumer confidence and COVID-19  
55 restrictions. These challenges will likely increase through the fall and  
56 winter months.

1 Child Care

2 The COVID-19 Pandemic Emergency has burdened child care  
3 providers, which we know are crucial to building and sustaining a  
4 thriving economy by enabling families to work and preparing children for  
5 school. Colorado's fragile child care system is strained and vulnerable to  
6 a collapse due to the pandemic. Lower enrollment, required changes to  
7 ensure student and worker safety consistent with health requirements,  
8 staffing issues including quarantine measures consistent with protecting  
9 the public health, sporadic closure of the schools, and other impacts of the  
10 pandemic are also impacting the child care system. Based on a recent  
11 survey, at least 26% of child care facilities in Colorado may close  
12 permanently without financial support, due to the pandemic.

13  
14 Housing and Direct Assistance

15 Because of the federal Paycheck Protection Program, loans for small  
16 businesses, enhanced unemployment benefits, and direct payments to  
17 Americans, we have avoided a significant wave of housing evictions and  
18 foreclosures. Now, though, the expiration of these programs leaves  
19 vulnerable Coloradans at risk of eviction or foreclosure in the coming  
20 months. We must mobilize additional resources to allow Coloradans to  
21 stay in their homes in the near term and rebuild their lives in the long  
22 term.

23  
24 Broadband

25 A Colorado Department of Education and Colorado Education  
26 Initiative survey demonstrated that 65,860 children lacked stable internet  
27 access at home. While many school districts across Colorado are learning  
28 in person, the most recent increase in COVID-19 cases has led other  
29 school districts, including many Denver metro area school districts, to  
30 switch to remote learning. Without broadband or wi-fi hotspots, these  
31 students will face significant learning loss that will have implications for  
32 their future academic careers and lifetime earnings.

33  
34 Food Insecurity

35 Demand for food assistance via food pantries and food banks has  
36 increased as a result of the COVID-19 Pandemic Emergency. The  
37 demand appears to be correlated with unemployment and furloughs in the  
38 service sector, as well as school and camp closures, and is not anticipated  
39 to abate in the short-term. Meanwhile, food pantries' food resources were  
40 often stretched prior to the pandemic and resulting economic fallout. As  
41 dollars available for hunger relief through the Coronavirus Aid, Relief,  
42 and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) and Families First Coronavirus  
43 Relief Act (FFRCA) end in December 2020, no new federal funding is  
44 currently available to replace these funds.

45  
46 Utilities Assistance

47 Heading into the winter, many Coloradans are unemployed,  
48 underemployed, or unable to find new work. At the same time, these  
49 Coloradans may have little to no savings and growing expenses due to the  
50 COVID-19 Pandemic Emergency. This segment of the population now  
51 qualifies as low-income, and is at risk of being unable to afford their  
52 utility bills over the coming months. Energy Outreach Colorado  
53 applications are up 25% compared to the same time last year, and funding  
54 allocated by the General Assembly during the prior legislative session  
55 will be distributed by December 4, 2020.

1 Public Health Response

2 As the pandemic has entered its third wave in Colorado, additional  
3 funds are needed immediately to continue the State's robust public health  
4 response. My budget request set aside funds to ensure the State can  
5 continue to protect public health while we await additional federal  
6 stimulus and reimbursement from the Federal Emergency Management  
7 Agency.

8  
9 In the face of federal inaction, Colorado must act now to support small  
10 businesses, protect renters and homeowners, support child care providers,  
11 and enable students to access remote education. We can make one-time,  
12 urgently needed investments now to help these crucial sectors of our  
13 economy survive the winter and sustain our economy.

14  
15 I urge the General Assembly to act and am defining the appropriate  
16 subject matter for legislative consideration herein. The following section  
17 describes the purpose and need for the special session.

18  
19 II. Purpose and Need

20  
21 In the coming months, we will need to focus on suppressing the  
22 spread of COVID-19 in our communities to conserve our strained  
23 healthcare resources. We recognize that the lack of consumer confidence,  
24 the reality of the risky health situation, and compliance with justified  
25 public health measures comes at a cost to our business owners, workers,  
26 educators, and families. We therefore believe it is right and proper to take  
27 all necessary measures to enable our residents to weather the economic  
28 and logistical challenges that accompany our mitigation strategies. We are  
29 calling on the General Assembly to consider taking action to fund the  
30 following support programs to help minimize the disruptions caused by  
31 our COVID-19 emergency response:

32  
33 A. The General Assembly should consider taking legislative action  
34 to provide direct support and emergency tax relief to small businesses  
35 impacted by the COVID-19 Pandemic Emergency. This includes but is  
36 not limited to an expeditious, direct assistance funding mechanism for  
37 small businesses that are operating at a significantly reduced capacity or  
38 closed under public health orders. Small businesses, including gyms,  
39 restaurants, bars, arts and culture venues, and event-related businesses,  
40 such as entertainment venues, have struggled to stay open at lower  
41 capacities, making it difficult to pay their staff and rent. The General  
42 Assembly should also consider providing tax and administrative relief,  
43 including sales tax retention, for certain small businesses, including  
44 restaurants and bars. The General Assembly should consider allowing  
45 these certain small businesses to retain up to \$2,000 per month of the  
46 2.9% gross state sales tax collections they already collect and should  
47 allow for the waiver of certain fees associated with the sale of liquor and  
48 enforcement and the operation of a restaurant, including retail food  
49 establishment licensing fees administered by CDPHE and Colorado  
50 Department of Revenue.

51  
52 B. The General Assembly should consider taking legislative action  
53 to provide housing and rental assistance and direct cash assistance for  
54 individuals and families who have been impacted both directly and  
55 indirectly by the COVID-19 Pandemic Emergency through existing  
56 funding mechanisms such as the Property Owner Preservation program

1 (POP), the Emergency Housing Assistance program (EHAP), the  
2 Workers Left Behind Fund (WLBFF), the Housing Counseling Assistance  
3 Program (HCAP), homeless youth programs, and direct cash assistance.  
4

5 C. The General Assembly should consider taking legislative action  
6 to provide monetary assistance to new and existing child care providers  
7 through existing funding mechanisms such as sustainability grants for  
8 existing child care providers, and support for child care start-up or  
9 expansion costs for providers located in child care deserts, demonstrated  
10 need, or areas of the State hardest hit by COVID-19.  
11

12 D. The General Assembly should consider taking legislative action  
13 to expand broadband and wi-fi access for educational purposes, especially  
14 for P-12 students and educators.  
15

16 E. The General Assembly should consider taking legislative action  
17 to provide support for food pantries and food banks so that they can  
18 provide assistance for those experiencing food insecurity due to the  
19 COVID-19 Pandemic Emergency.  
20

21 F. The General Assembly should consider taking legislative action  
22 to provide utility assistance to Coloradans experiencing financial hardship  
23 due to the COVID-19 Pandemic Emergency.  
24

25 G. The General Assembly should consider taking legislative action  
26 to appropriate funds to the Disaster Emergency Fund for public health  
27 expenses associated with the COVID-19 Pandemic Emergency.  
28

### 29 III. Proclamation 30

31 I, Jared Polis, Governor of the State of Colorado, with this  
32 proclamation find extraordinary occasions exist to convene the 72nd  
33 General Assembly of this State and summon the members of the 72nd  
34 General Assembly to meet in Special Session at 10:00 AM on November  
35 30, 2020, at the State Capitol, in the City and County of Denver, and  
36 designate the following specific subjects for consideration, appropriate  
37 legislative action, and funding:  
38

39 A. Concerning direct support and emergency tax relief to small  
40 businesses impacted by the COVID-19 Pandemic Emergency. This  
41 includes but is not limited to an expeditious direct assistance funding  
42 mechanism for small businesses that are at reduced capacity under public  
43 health orders including gyms, restaurants, bars, arts and culture venues,  
44 and event-related businesses, such as entertainment venues; emergency  
45 sales tax relief for public health order-impacted eating and drinking  
46 establishments by allowing them to retain up to \$2,000 per month of the  
47 2.9% gross state sales tax that they already collect, in order to pay for  
48 expenses including employee pay, rent, and overhead; and allowing for  
49 the waiver of certain licensing fees associated with sale of liquor and fees  
50 associated with the establishment or operation of a retail food  
51 establishment.  
52  
53

1 B. Concerning housing and rental assistance to individuals and  
2 residential property owners impacted by the COVID-19 Pandemic  
3 Emergency through existing funding mechanisms such as the Property  
4 Owner Preservation program (POP), the Emergency Housing Assistance  
5 program (EHAP), the Workers Left Behind Fund (WLBF), the Housing  
6 Counseling Assistance Program (HCAP), homeless youth organizations,  
7 non-profits, and cash assistance.  
8

9 C. Concerning support for existing and new child care providers  
10 impacted by the COVID-19 Pandemic Emergency through existing  
11 funding mechanisms such as, but not limited to, sustainability grants for  
12 existing child care providers and support for child care start-up or  
13 expansion costs for providers located in child care deserts or areas of the  
14 State hardest hit by COVID-19.  
15

16 D. Concerning expanding broadband and wi-fi access for  
17 educational purposes, especially for P-12 students and educators impacted  
18 by the COVID-19 Pandemic Emergency.  
19

20 E. Concerning support for the existing food pantry assistance grant  
21 program within the Department of Human Services to aid Colorado food  
22 pantries and food banks in the purchase and allocation of food to serve  
23 those who have experienced financial hardship caused by the COVID-19  
24 Pandemic Emergency.  
25

26 F. Concerning assistance for individuals unable to pay their utility  
27 bills due to financial hardship caused by the COVID-19 Pandemic  
28 Emergency, including support to the Energy Outreach Colorado  
29 low-income energy assistance program.  
30

31 G. Concerning appropriating funding to the Disaster Emergency  
32 Fund for public health expenses associated with the COVID-19 Pandemic  
33 Emergency.  
34
