Summary of Legislation

The bill exempts multi-serving liquid retail marijuana products from the edible retail marijuana requirement that products be marked with a standard symbol indicating that the product contains marijuana and is not for consumption by children if the product complies with all statutory and regulatory packaging requirements for multi-serving edibles. In addition, the multi-serving liquid must:

- be packaged in a structure that uses a single mechanism to achieve both child-resistance and accurate pouring measurement of each liquid serving in increments of 10 milligrams or less of active delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) per serving, with a maximum of 100 milligrams of THC per package; and
- have the measurement component within the child-resistant cap or closure of the bottle and not as a separate component.

Background

Department of Revenue (DOR) rules require that each single serving of marijuana contained in a multi-serving edible retail marijuana product be marked, stamped, or otherwise imprinted with the universal symbol directly on the product. The universal symbol below on the left cannot be used after October 1, 2016. The universal symbol below on the right can be used now but is mandatory October 1, 2016.



May not be used after October 1, 2016.



Required October 1, 2016.

State Expenditures

This bill will minimally increase workload for the Marijuana Enforcement Division (MED) to promulgate rules, which the fiscal note assumes will occur in FY 2016-17. The MED is appropriated funds to make and enforce rules as part of its regulatory oversight of medical and retail marijuana. As such, the rulemaking and enforcement required under this bill can be accomplished within existing appropriations.

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor and took effect on June 10, 2016.
