Summary of Legislation

This bill clarifies that the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) in the Department of Regulatory Agencies has no regulatory authority over the originating service providers of basic emergency service. The bill defines basic emergency service as the aggregation and transport of a 911 call by a basic emergency service provider (BESP) to a public safety answering point (PSAP), such as a 911 call center, regardless of the technology used to provide the service.

State Expenditures

The PUC routinely conducts rulemaking to implement legislative changes. Beginning in FY 2015-16, the PUC will have an increase in workload to conform its existing rules with the provisions of this bill, but this can be accomplished within existing appropriations.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect upon signature of the Governor, or upon becoming law without his signature.
