## A BILL FOR AN ACT

101	CONCERNING RAISING ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE IN THE PUBLIC
102	SCHOOLS BY DISTRIBUTING UP TO ONE PERCENT OF PUBLIC
103	SCHOOL FUNDING BASED ON A COMPETITIVE DETERMINATION OF
104	ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE AMONG PEER SCHOOL DISTRICTS
105	COMMENCING IN THE 2018-19 BUDGET YEAR.

#### **Bill Summary**

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. The bill creates the "Rewarding Excellence With Annual Redirected Dollars Act" or "REWARD Act" (program) to award

SENATE Amended 2nd Reading March 21, 2017 excellence funding to school districts that achieve a level of success in student performance above that of their peer districts. The bill defines "school district" to include school districts and the state charter school institute (institute).

The bill directs the department of education (department) to annually identify peer school districts by categorizing all school districts as either non-rural or rural, as defined in the bill, and then group the school districts within those categories based on demographically similar student populations. Once peer school districts are identified, the department shall compare those school districts to determine which school districts outperform their peer school districts using objective measures of student performance. The bill includes eligibility criteria for participation in the program.

The department shall annually award excellence funding to the top 10 highest-performing non-rural school districts and to the top 10 highest-performing rural school districts, for a total of 20 districts.

The program is funded by redirecting 1% of statewide total program funding, after application of the negative factor, for the applicable budget year. The department shall reduce the state's share of total program funding for the applicable budget year by the amount of excellence funding, proportionately reducing each school district's state share of total program funding.

The department shall distribute 35% of the excellence funding to the top 20 highest-performing school districts in equal shares, and the remaining 65% of excellence funding to those school districts on a per-pupil basis. School districts, including the institute, shall transfer to a district charter school or an institute charter school 100% of the charter school's per-pupil allocation of the total amount of excellence funding received by the school district or the institute.

The program is implemented beginning in the 2018-19 budget year, and excellence funding is based on the school districts' student performance in the budget year immediately preceding the applicable budget year.

The department shall reduce the amount of excellence funding by the department's reasonable and necessary direct costs incurred in implementing the program.

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SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, add 22-54-139 as

 (1) THE SHORT TITLE OF THIS SECTION IS THE "REWARDING EXCELLENCE
 WITH ANNUAL REDIRECTED DOLLARS ACT" OR "REWARD ACT".

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(2) (a) THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FINDS THAT:

5 (I) A HIGHLY EFFECTIVE EDUCATION SYSTEM IS THE CORNERSTONE
6 OF SOCIETY. IF COLORADO'S STUDENTS DO NOT ACHIEVE THEIR FULL
7 POTENTIAL IN THE STATE'S ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY EDUCATION

IN ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS, ONLY FORTY PERCENT 16 OF FIFTH-GRADE AND EIGHTH-GRADE STUDENTS MET STATE PROFICIENCY 17 STANDARDS.

(III) IN ADDITION, DESPITE INVESTING OVER ONE HUNDRED
THOUSAND DOLLARS OF LOCAL, STATE, AND FEDERAL MONEY PER
STUDENT DURING A STUDENT'S PUBLIC SCHOOL EDUCATION, TWO-THIRDS
OF HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS GRADUATE BELOW TWELFTH-GRADE
PROFICIENCY LEVELS. FURTHER, ONLY TWENTY-FIVE PERCENT OF
COLORADO'S STUDENTS MEET COLLEGE AND CAREER READINESS
BENCHMARKS WHEN THEY LEAVE HIGH SCHOOL.

(IV) NATIONALLY, COLORADO DOES NOT FARE MUCH BETTER,
HAVING THE SECOND-HIGHEST ACHIEVEMENT GAP BETWEEN WHITE AND
HISPANIC STUDENTS IN FOURTH-GRADE MATH PROFICIENCY, AND, AT

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SEVENTY-SEVEN PERCENT, A HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION RATE THAT IS
 BELOW THE NATIONAL AVERAGE GRADUATION RATE OF EIGHTY-THREE
 PERCENT IN 2015.

4 (V) MOREOVER, AS A NATION, WE ARE NOT LIVING UP TO OUR
5 POTENTIAL. IN 2015, OUT OF SEVENTY-THREE COUNTRIES PARTICIPATING
6 IN INTERNATIONAL TESTING, THE UNITED STATES RANKED FORTIETH IN
7 MATH, TWENTY-FIFTH IN SCIENCE, AND TWENTY-FOURTH IN READING.

8 (VI) WHILE THERE IS ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT, SCHOOL FUNDING
9 LEVELS IN COLORADO DO NOT ACCOUNT FOR MEDIOCRE RESULTS.
10 COLORADO'S MEDIAN SCHOOL FUNDING, INCLUDING STATE, LOCAL, AND
11 FEDERAL SPENDING, IS MORE THAN \$10,200 PER PUPIL, AND MANY SCHOOL
12 DISTRICTS ARE ACHIEVING ABOVE-AVERAGE RESULTS WHILE FACING THE
13 SAME FUNDING CONSTRAINTS AS OTHER SCHOOL DISTRICTS;

14 (VII) THE TWENTY-FIRST-CENTURY WORLD REQUIRES A
15 KNOWLEDGE-BASED ECONOMY AND A WORLD-CLASS, EFFECTIVE STATE
16 EDUCATION SYSTEM THAT COMPETES TO SUCCEED;

17 (VIII) COLORADO MUST BREAK THE MOLD AND EMPLOY CREATIVE
18 METHODS OF CLOSING THE ACHIEVEMENT GAP WITHIN EXISTING FUNDING;

(4) (a) THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION SHALL CREATE AND
IMPLEMENT THE REWARDING EXCELLENCE PROGRAM TO AWARD
EXCELLENCE FUNDING TO ELIGIBLE DISTRICTS THAT ACHIEVE A LEVEL OF
SUCCESS IN STUDENT PERFORMANCE ABOVE THAT OF THEIR PEER
DISTRICTS. TO IDENTIFY EXCELLENT PERFORMANCE, THE DEPARTMENT OF
EDUCATION, IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE TECHNICAL ADVISORY PANEL
CREATED IN SECTION 22-11-202, SHALL:

20 (I) ANNUALLY IDENTIFY PEER DISTRICTS BY CATEGORIZING
21 ELIGIBLE DISTRICTS AS EITHER RURAL OR NON-RURAL, AND, WITHIN THOSE
22 TWO CATEGORIES, GROUPING DISTRICTS THAT HAVE DEMOGRAPHICALLY

(II) COMPARE ELIGIBLE DISTRICTS WITHIN SIMILAR DEMOGRAPHIC

ON DATA FROM STATE ASSESSMENTS, INCLUDING TENTH- AND

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ELEVENTH-GRADE ASSESSMENTS, ADMINISTERED PURSUANT TO SECTION
 22-7-1006.3 DURING THE BUDGET YEAR IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING THE
 BUDGET YEAR FOR WHICH EXCELLENCE FUNDING IS AWARDED. THE
 DEPARTMENT SHALL ANNUALLY DETERMINE THE OBJECTIVE MEASURES OF
 STUDENT PERFORMANCE, WHICH MEASURES MAY INCLUDE BUT ARE NOT

9 BUDGET YEAR ARE THE <u>SIX</u> HIGHEST-PERFORMING ELIGIBLE DISTRICTS
10 COMPARED TO THEIR DEMOGRAPHIC PEERS IN EACH CATEGORY, RURAL
11 AND NON-RURAL, FOR A TOTAL OF <u>TWELVE</u> DISTRICTS ANNUALLY.

12 (5) TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR EXCELLENCE FUNDING, A DISTRICT MUST:
13 (a) HOLD ONE OF THE FOLLOWING ACCREDITATION RATINGS

SECTION 22-7-1006.3 DURING THE BUDGET YEAR IMMEDIATELY
PRECEDING THE BUDGET YEAR FOR WHICH EXCELLENCE FUNDING IS
AWARDED.

26 (6) (a) EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION (7) OF THIS SECTION,
27 BEGINNING WITH THE 2018-19 BUDGET YEAR, AND EACH BUDGET YEAR

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THEREAFTER, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL AWARD TO THE <u>TWELVE</u>
 HIGHEST-PERFORMING ELIGIBLE DISTRICTS IDENTIFIED PURSUANT TO
 SUBSECTION (4) OF THIS SECTION THE AMOUNT OF EXCELLENCE FUNDING
 CALCULATED PURSUANT TO SECTION 22-54-104 (7) FOR THE APPLICABLE
 BUDGET YEAR, AS FOLLOWS:

9 (b) THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION SHALL PROPORTIONATELY 10 REDUCE THE STATE'S SHARE OF EACH DISTRICT'S TOTAL PROGRAM 11 FUNDING FOR THE APPLICABLE BUDGET YEAR TO REFLECT THE AMOUNT OF 12 THE STATE'S SHARE OF TOTAL PROGRAM FUNDING REMAINING AFTER THE 13 APPLICATION OF THIS SUBSECTION (7).

SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 22-54-106, amend

SECTION 4. Act subject to petition - effective date. This act takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following the expiration of the ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly (August 9, 2017, if adjournment sine die is on May 10, 2017); except that, if a referendum petition is filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V of the state constitution against this act or an item, section, or part of this act within such period, then the act, item, section, or part will not take effect unless approved by the people at the general election to be held in November 2018 and, in such case, will take effect on the date of the official declaration of the vote thereon by the governor.
