The bill repeals the Behavioral Health Transformation Council ahead of its original repeal date. This reduces state workload through FY 2019-20.

Appropriation Summary: No appropriation is required.

Fiscal Note Status: The fiscal note reflects the enacted bill.

Summary of Legislation

This bill repeals the Behavioral Health Transformation Council in the Department of Human Services which is set to repeal under current law on July 1, 2020.

Background

The Behavioral Health Transformation Council, created by House Bill 10-153, is an advisory council to the Governor and his cabinet. The Department of Human Services is the lead agency and council membership includes representatives from executive agencies, the judicial branch, behavioral health providers, consumers, and other stakeholders. The council does not receive an appropriation.

State Expenditures

By repealing the council nearly two years early, the bill will reduce workload for all participating agencies beginning in FY 2018-19 through FY 2019-20. Because no department was appropriated funds for participation in the council, no change in appropriations is required.

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor on April 12, 2018, and takes effect September 1, 2018, unless a referendum petition is filed.
