Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. The bill relocates the Colorado food systems advisory council (council) from the department of agriculture to Colorado state university.

The bill ends the terms of current members of the council and provides for the appointment of new members to the council.

As updated in the bill, the council's duties are to:

- which producers have access to new markets and low-income populations have access to fresh, affordable, and healthy foods. The council will collaborate and coordinate with producers, relevant state and federal educational institutions, nongovernmental organizations, and consumers to connect state and federal agencies and to provide Colorado producers, including fruit and vegetable producers, with viable market opportunities.
- ! Support the implementation of the recommendations in the Colorado blueprint of food and agriculture project, ensure that the blueprint, or its successor project, is updated as needed, and ensure alignment with other state or local food plans if relevant;
- ! Conduct research regarding national best practices regarding food and nutrition assistance, direct and intermediated market development, institutional procurement, and farm-to-school programs as well as other priorities determined by the council;
- ! Collaborate with, serve as a resource to, and receive input from local and regional food policy councils in the state; and
- ! Explore methods of collecting and assessing statewide data relating to council activities and report the relevant information and data regarding council activities as required by current law.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, add with amended and relocated provisions part 11 to article 31 of title 23 as follows:

6 **23-31-1101.** [Formerly 24-37.3-101] Legislative declaration.

- (1) The general assembly hereby finds and declares that:
 - (a) In September 2009, the federal centers for disease control and prevention reported that no state in the United States was meeting national goals for the amount of fruits and vegetables that Americans should be eating. As a result, the centers for disease control and

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prevention identified the creation of food policy councils, consisting of 2 multi-stakeholder organizations, as an effective way to support system 3 changes to improve local, regional, and state food economies IN 4 SEPTEMBER 2009, THE FEDERAL CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND 5 PREVENTION REPORTED THAT NO STATE IN THE COUNTRY WAS MEETING 6 NATIONAL GOALS FOR THE AMOUNT OF FRUITS AND VEGETABLES THAT 7 AMERICANS SHOULD BE EATING. AS A RESULT, THE CENTERS FOR DISEASE 8 CONTROL AND PREVENTION IDENTIFIED, AS A FIRST STRATEGY, THE 9 CREATION OF FOOD POLICY COUNCILS TO IMPROVE THE FOOD 10 ENVIRONMENT AND ECONOMIES AT THE LOCAL, REGIONAL, AND STATE 11 LEVELS. 12 (b) Food councils formed in other states have been effective in 13 bringing together a broad array of food-related government and 14 nongovernment constituencies to employ a food systems approach that 15 facilitates evaluation and program development at every stage of the food 16 process from farm to table; FOOD POLICY COUNCILS CONSIST OF 17 MULTISTAKEHOLDER ORGANIZATIONS THAT EMPLOY A FOOD SYSTEMS 18 APPROACH THAT FACILITATES EVALUATION AND PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT 19 AT EVERY STAGE OF THE FOOD PROCESS FROM FARM TO TABLE. BY 2016, 20 THERE WERE OVER TWO HUNDRED TWENTY FOOD POLICY COUNCILS 21 THROUGHOUT THE UNITED STATES ADDRESSING ISSUES SUCH AS HEALTHY 22 FOOD ACCESS, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, AND FOOD PROCUREMENT. 23 COLORADO'S FOOD SYSTEMS ADVISORY COUNCIL, WHICH WAS CREATED IN 24 2010, HAS FOCUSED PRIMARILY ON STRENGTHENING HEALTHY FOOD 25 ACCESS FOR ALL COLORADANS THROUGH THE GROWTH OF COLORADO 26 AGRICULTURE AND LOCAL FOOD SYSTEMS AND ECONOMIES. (c) Formation of a state food advisory council is intended to 27

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benefit Colorado agriculturists and others involved in all aspects of agricultural production; IN 2017, COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY, IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE COUNCIL AND OTHERS, RELEASED THE COLORADO BLUEPRINT OF FOOD AND AGRICULTURE THAT IDENTIFIED KEY ASSETS, EMERGING ISSUES, AND SHARED PRIORITIES FOR FUTURE INVESTMENTS IN FOOD AND AGRICULTURE THROUGHOUT COLORADO. THE BLUEPRINT AND THE EXISTING WORK OF THE COUNCIL DEMONSTRATE THAT BUILDING LOCAL, REGIONAL, AND STATE FOOD ECONOMIES WILL CREATE JOBS, STIMULATE STATEWIDE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, AND CIRCULATE MONEY FROM LOCAL FOOD SALES WITHIN LOCAL COMMUNITIES. (d) Creation of a state food advisory council will provide

- increased focus on the economic development opportunities of Colorado's food system along with improvements to agricultural production, community well-being, and public health The continuation and enhancement of the council is necessary to address the recommendations in the blueprint to support food system changes designed to grow local, regional, and statewide food economies within which agricultural producers have access to new markets and Colorado's population has improved access to fresh, affordable, and healthy foods; and
- (e) Nothing in this article is intended to impede, cause harm to, or limit conventionally produced agricultural products or the persons who produce them Building Robust, resilient, and long-term local and regional food economies in Colorado will preserve and protect the natural environment; increase consumer access to fresh, healthy, and safe foods; and provide greater food security for all Coloradans.

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(2) The general assembly further finds that building local,
regional, and state food economies will create jobs, stimulate statewide
economic development, and circulate money from local food sales within
local communities. The general assembly finds that building robust,
resilient, and long-term local food economies in Colorado will preserve
and protect the natural environment, increase consumer access to fresh,
healthy, and safe foods, and provide greater food security for all
Coloradans.

advisory council - created - membership - terms - vacancies - repeal.
(1) There is hereby established in the department of agriculture WITHIN
COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY the Colorado food systems advisory
council, referred to in this article PART 11 as the "council". The council
is created as an advisory committee to foster a healthy food supply
available to all Colorado residents while enhancing the state's agricultural
and natural resources, encouraging economic growth, expanding the
viability of agriculture, and improving the health of our communities and
residents. The council's role is to make recommendations to the general
assembly and to the appropriate regulatory agencies, not to create policy.
The council shall use a method of dialogue and consensus
decision-making to arrive at its PROVIDE recommendations REGARDING
INCREASING HEALTHY FOOD ACCESS FOR ALL COLORADO RESIDENTS,
CREATING ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES FOR COLORADO AGRICULTURAL

 - (3) In making appointments to the council, the governor APPOINTING AUTHORITIES shall ensure, TO THE EXTENT POSSIBLE, that the membership of the council includes geographic representation from all areas of the state. The governor shall also consider appointing persons who have expertise in more than one functional area. No more than five members of the council appointed by the governor shall be members of the same political party AND SOCIAL DIVERSITY, AS WELL AS A BALANCE OF EXPERTISE, BOTH GOVERNMENTAL AND NONGOVERNMENTAL, IN ISSUES RELATING TO COLORADO'S FOOD SYSTEMS.
 - (4) Each member of the council who is appointed pursuant to subsection (2) of this section shall serve SERVES at the pleasure of the appointing authority who appointed the member. Each member of the council shall serve SERVES a three-year term; except that the governor OR THE GOVERNOR'S DESIGNEE shall appoint four SIX members to serve two-year terms AND FOUR MEMBERS TO SERVE FOUR-YEAR TERMS. AN APPOINTING AUTHORITY MAY REAPPOINT THE MEMBER FOR ONE ADDITIONAL THREE-YEAR TERM.
 - (5) (a) THE TERMS OF THE COUNCIL MEMBERS APPOINTED PRIOR TO THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS PART 11 EXPIRE ON AUGUST 30, 2019. The appointing authorities shall make their initial appointments to the council AS SPECIFIED IN SUBSECTION (2) OF THIS SECTION no later than October 1,

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2010 AUGUST 31, 2019.

 - (6) Any vacancy on the council shall be filled in the same manner in which the original appointment was made, and the term shall be IS for the balance of the unexpired term of the member whose term POSITION ON THE COUNCIL is vacant.
 - (7) A majority of the members of the council shall elect a chair and a vice-chair, who shall serve for two-year terms. A member of the council who is an executive director OR COMMISSIONER of a state department or his or her THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S OR COMMISSIONER'S designee may be elected to be a chair or a vice-chair of the council, but both positions shall not be held at the same time by members who are executive directors OR COMMISSIONERS of state departments or their designees.
 - (8) Each member of the council shall serve SERVES without compensation but may be reimbursed from the food systems advisory council fund created in section 24-37.3-105 23-31-1105 for actual and necessary subsistence and travel expenses incurred in the performance of his or her THE MEMBER'S duties as a member of the council.
 - (9) The chair shall call the meetings and notify the members of each meeting being called at least seven days in advance. THE CHAIR SHALL HOLD meetings shall be held as often as the chair deems necessary but not less than four times each calendar year. A quorum for the transaction of business consists of seven members of The council SHALL ADOPT POLICIES AND PROCEDURES NECESSARY TO CARRY OUT ITS DUTIES. - (a) (I) An examination of foods made available to children, including those in public schools, and consideration of ways to improve the nutritional quality of those foods and increase children's access to locally grown foods.
- (II) In designing recommendations to improve school nutrition and increase access to locally grown foods, the council shall incorporate input from, and coordinate with the work of, the Colorado campaign to end childhood hunger by 2015, initiated by executive order of the governor.
- (b) A study of efforts to make local, healthy, and safe foods available under public assistance programs, including the possibility of using electronic benefit cards for the supplemental nutrition assistance program (SNAP) and federal farmers' market nutrition program (FMNP) coupons at local farmers' markets;
- (c) An in-depth examination of local and regional efforts to strengthen and develop robust, resilient, and long-term local food economies by supporting and promoting urban, suburban, and rural agricultural production; identifying and developing solutions to regulatory and policy barriers; and strengthening local infrastructure and

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23-31-1105. [Formerly 24-37.3-105] Fund - acceptance of gifts, grants, or donations. (1) For the purposes of carrying out the duties of the council, the council is authorized to seek and accept gifts, grants, or donations, including in-kind donations, from private or public sources for the purposes of this article PART 11; except that the council may not accept a gift, grant, or donation that is subject to conditions that are inconsistent with this article PART 11 or any other law of the state. The council may accept in-kind donations of staff services from the private sector to staff the council. The council is also authorized to accept and expend federal funds MONEY available for food policy councils ITS ACTIVITIES. All private and public moneys MONEY received through gifts, grants, or donations shall be transmitted to the state treasurer, who shall credit the same IT to the food systems advisory council fund, which fund is hereby created IN THE STATE TREASURY and referred to in this section as the "fund". The moneys MONEY in the fund must be IS continuously appropriated by the general assembly to the department of agriculture TO COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY for allocation to the council for the direct and indirect costs associated with implementing this article PART 11. Any moneys MONEY in the fund not expended for the purpose of this article PART 11 may be invested by the state treasurer as provided by law. THE STATE TREASURER SHALL CREDIT all interest and income derived from the investment and deposit of moneys MONEY in the fund shall be credited to the fund. Any unexpended and unencumbered moneys remaining in the fund at the end of a fiscal year shall remain in the fund and shall not revert or be credited or transferred to the general fund or another fund; except that, if, at the time this article is repealed pursuant to section

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1	24-3/.3-10/, the fund contains a balance of unencumbered and
2	unexpended moneys, those moneys shall revert to the general fund.
3	(2) Moneys Money in the fund may be used for the following
4	purposes:
5	(a) The actual and necessary expenses incurred by members of the

7	(b) The costs of staffing the council, IF STAFFED BY COLORADO
8	STATE UNIVERSITY; and
9	(c) The costs of preparing and submitting the annual report
