The bill appropriates funds from the Colorado Water Conservation Board Construction Fund in the Department of Natural Resources for specified water-related projects in FY 2019-20 and makes several cash fund transfers. All appropriations are for made for FY 2019-20, though funds are available until fully expended.

### **Summary of Legislation**

The bill appropriates funds from the Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCB) Construction Fund in the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to the CWCB and the Division of Water Resources for specific water-related projects in FY 2019-20 and makes several cash fund transfers. The bill also:

- authorizes the CWCB to make loans of up to \$15,150,000 for the Walker Recharge Project, a water supply effort that uses the alluvial aquifer of the South Platte River to increase irrigation opportunities for agricultural production;
- extends the availability of an existing \$8.0 million appropriation for Republican River matters until the money is fully expended; and
- repeals an annual transfer from the Severance Tax Perpetual Base Fund to the CWCB Construction Fund.

## **Background**

The CWCB Construction Fund was created in 1971 to provide low-interest loans for water projects. Revenue for this revolving loan fund comes from interest earned on outstanding loans and the fund's cash balance and distribution of royalties from federal mineral leases.

#### State Revenue

Because this bill authorizes new loans, revenue from the interest generated on water project loans will increase, but that amount will depend on the terms of the loans and cannot be determined at this time.

#### **State Transfers**

In the current FY 2018-19, the bill transfers \$2.5 million from the CWCB Construction Fund to the Water Supply Reserve Fund.

In FY 2019-20, the bill transfers up to \$2.0 million from the CWCB Construction Fund to the Litigation Fund, to restore a \$2.0 million fund balance. In FY 2019-20 and future years, the bill transfers up to \$1.0 million from the CWCB Construction Fund as follows:

- up to \$500,000 to the Feasibility Study Small Grant Fund, to restore a balance of \$500,000; and
- up to \$500,000 to the Flood and Drought Response Fund, to restore a balance of \$500,000.

In FY 2020-21 and future years, the bill eliminates an annual \$10 million transfer from the Severance Tax Perpetual Base Fund to the CWCB Construction Fund for implementation of the state water plan.

#### **State Expenditures**

For FY 2019-20, the bill increases state expenditures by \$19,355,000 from the CWCB Construction Fund. The funds are appropriated in the bill and remain available for the designated purposes until fully expended. The projects to be funded are shown in Table 2.
