Summary of Fiscal Impact: □ State Transfer

Date: July 7, 2020

The bill would have required the Judicial Department to publish every opinion of the Colorado Supreme Court and the Colorado Court of Appeals online by March 1, 2022. All online opinions would have been required to be searchable and available free of charge. Beginning in FY 2021-22, this bill would have increased state expenditures and decreased state revenue on an ongoing basis.

Appropriation Summary:

No appropriation was required.

Fiscal Note Status:

This fiscal note reflects the reengrossed bill. This bill was not enacted into law;

therefore, the impacts identified in this analysis do not take effect.

Summary of Legislation

This bill requires the Judicial Department to publish every opinion of the Colorado Supreme Court and the Colorado Court of Appeals online by March 1, 2022. All online publications must be searchable and available free of charge.

Background and Assumptions

The Colorado Supreme Court Library supports the research needs of the Judicial Department. It maintains online resources at cscl.colibraries.org, where the public may currently access Colorado Supreme Court and Court of Appeals opinions back to 1998. The public-facing website currently utilizes a limited Google search application that scans documents for keywords. Based on the most recent three-year average, the Department publishes approximately 250 opinions a year.

Every year, opinions are published as printed, copyrighted books: *Colorado Reports* and *Colorado Court of Appeals Reports*. The Judicial Department self-published printed opinions from 1862 to 1980. From 1980 forward, it used West Publishing Company as its publisher. One option for the Judicial Department to comply with the bill is to scan copies of the opinions through 1980 from its own publications and use the State Archive to supplement the copyrighted materials after 1980.

A lesser cost alternative is to use a vendor that specializes in online legal resources which already has electronic versions of the opinions. An initial quote estimates a one-time cost of \$97,500 to create a public-facing online portal with customized search functionality. In subsequent fiscal years, ongoing costs up to \$5,000 per year are estimated for maintenance and support.

State Revenue

Beginning in FY 2021-22, the bill will decrease revenue to the State Archives and Public Records Cash Fund in the Department of Personnel and Administration from public record fees associated with court opinions by approximately \$5,000 per year. This estimate is based on FY 2018-19 fee revenue to the State Archives from Court of Appeals and Supreme Court records requests. The first year of revenue reduction has been prorated for four months.

State Expenditures

The bill will increase General Fund costs in the Judicial Department by \$97,500 in FY 2021-22 and up to \$5,000 in FY 2022-23 and each year thereafter. These costs are shown in Table 2 and discussed below.

Judicial Department. As discussed in the Background and Assumptions section above, the fiscal note assumes that the Judicial Department will hire a vendor to facilitate the requirements under the bill, estimated at \$97,500 in FY 2021-22. Ongoing maintenance costs are estimated at up to \$5,000 per year beginning in FY 2022-23. Actual costs will be determined through the request for proposals process and the annual budget process.

TABOR refunds. The bill is expected to decrease state General Fund obligations for TABOR refunds by \$5,000 per year beginning in FY 2021-22. Under current law and the December 2019 Legislative Council Staff forecast, the bill will correspondingly decrease the amount refunded to taxpayers via sales tax refunds made available on income tax returns for tax year 2022. A forecast of state revenue subject to TABOR is not available beyond FY 2021-22.

Effective Date

The bill was postponed indefinitely by the Senate Judiciary Committee on May 26, 2020.
