	<b>HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 23-1013</b>
CONCERNING THE RECOGNITION AND REMEMBRANCE OF MILITARY	
	VETERANS IN COLORADO WHO SERVED IN THE VIETNAM WAR.
	WHEREAS, United States military involvement in the Vietnam
	War began in South Vietnam in 1964 and continued throughout the
	region until 1975, involving North Vietnamese Army and Viet Cong
	guerrilla forces in armed conflict with United States Armed Forces and
	the Army of the Republic of Vietnam; and
	WHEREAS, During this period, more than 2.7 million American
	soldiers, both volunteers and draftees, served tours of duty in Vietnam,
	with a total of more than 9 million active duty military personnel, in what
	was an extremely long, difficult, and complex war; and
	WHEREAS, More than 58,220 members of the United States

1 2 3	Armed Forces, including 623 Coloradans, lost their lives in the Vietnam War, and more than 300,000 members of the United States Armed Forces were wounded; and
4 5 6 7	WHEREAS, In addition, more than 1,500 members of the United States Armed Forces listed as prisoners of war (POWs) or missing in action in the Vietnam War remain unaccounted for, including 24 Coloradans; and
8 9 10 11	WHEREAS, According to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, more than 6 million veterans of the United States Armed Forces who served during the Vietnam era are still alive today, including, as of 2020, more than 117,000 Coloradans; and
12 13 14 15	WHEREAS, Formal acknowledgment of Vietnam War veterans is as important now as ever, not only for those veterans who served but for all citizens; bipartisan legislation signed in 2017 permanently enshrines March 29 as National Vietnam War Veterans Day; and
16 17	WHEREAS, April 30, 2023, marks the 48th anniversary of the end of the Vietnam War; now, therefore,
18 19 20	Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-fourth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:
21	That we, the members of the Colorado General Assembly, hereby:
22 23	(1) Honor the service and sacrifices of Colorado military veterans who served in the Vietnam War alongside South Vietnamese soldiers;
24	(2) Recognize the challenges faced by many of these veterans,
25	both while serving in the Vietnam War and upon returning home;
26	(3) Express our appreciation for the fortitude of Colorado
27	veterans; their activism on behalf of fellow veterans; their patriotism;
28	their accomplishments and contributions; and the leadership they have
29	shown their families, community organizations, and the state; and
30	(4) Encourage all Coloradans to remember the sacrifices made by
31	Vietnam War veterans.

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1	Be It Further Resolved, That copies of this Joint Resolution be sent
2	to the Colorado Department of Military and Veterans Affairs; the United
3	Veterans Coalition of Colorado; Project Sanctuary; the President of the
4	United States Joseph R. Biden, Jr.; the honorable Jared Polis, Governor
5	of Colorado; and the Colorado Congressional delegation.

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
