| | WHEREAS, Colorado has been blessed with some of the most | |
| | beautiful, pristine, and productive land in the United States; and | |
| | WHEREAS, Coloradans and tourists enjoy this beautiful land, | |
| | publicly and privately, every year, using it responsibly for its recreation | |
| | and its resources; and | |
| | WHEREAS, Coloradans steward the land as much as they love | |
| | using the land, with deep enjoyment shared by the many adventure | |
| | seekers, backpackers, bird watchers, campers, explorers, farmers, | |
| | fishermen, hikers, homeowners, homesteaders, hunters, miners, mountain | |
| | climbers, photographers, ranchers, skiers, stargazers, thrill seekers, and | |

| 1 | WHEREAS, Coloradans have used and continue to use this great |
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| 2 | land to raise some of the finest crops, the greatest livestock, and the best |
| 3 | timber; to safely produce energy; and to properly mine resources for |
| 4 | ourselves and our neighbors, enjoyed every day by nearly all of us; and |
| 5 | WHEREAS, While the federal government already shares some of |
| 6 | the responsibility of stewarding part of our land through various national |
| 7 8 | parks and other designations, Coloradans recognize that this land is largely and rightly our responsibility because it is not merely land that |
| 9 | Coloradans use and enjoy, it is also the land that we call home; and |
| 10 11 | WHEREAS, Coloradans recognize that nature is best guarded through good stewardship; and |
| 12 | WHEREAS, Nature left to itself is not naturally balanced but |
| 13 | destructive, requiring proper and reasonable management, including best |
| 14 | practices for its use, to safeguard the land, the plants, and the wildlife that |
| 15 | live in it; and |
| 16 | WHEREAS, Land that is returned to an unmanaged, purely wild |
| 17 18 | state is more susceptible to catastrophic forest fires and invasive infestations and disease and to other dangers to plants and wildlife; and |
| 19 | WHEREAS, Coloradans care for this land because of the |
| 20 | understanding that each individual has been given responsibility under |
| 21 | God to be good stewards of this earth and of Colorado, and our duty in |
| 22 | caring for the planet includes wise use of the land with which we have |
| 23 | been entrusted, and that we must cultivate it well for us, our families, our |
| 24 | posterity, our communities, and the environment we wish to protect; and |
| 25 | WHEREAS, In the United States, governments are instituted by |
| 26 | the people, deriving their just power from the consent of the governed, to |
| 27 | secure the people's inherent and inalienable rights, which rights are |
| 28 | granted by the one who made the laws of nature that we so enjoy, |
| 29 | including protection of our property; and |
| 30 | WHEREAS, Private property rights are recognized by and |
| 31 | guaranteed protection under the Constitution of Colorado and the |
| 32 | Constitution of the United States, both of which prohibit the violation of |
| 33 | these rights for a public purpose; and |

WHEREAS, On January 27, 2021, President Joseph R. Biden, Jr., issued Executive Order 14008, which is titled "Tackling the Climate Crisis at Home and Abroad", 86 Fed. Reg. 7619 (Feb. 1, 2021); and

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WHEREAS, In section 216 of Executive Order 14008, President Biden directs the Secretary of the Interior, in consultation with the Secretary of Agriculture and other officials, to develop a program to preserve and conserve at least 30 percent of the lands and waters in the United States by 2030, and this order is commonly referred to as the "30 by 30" program; and

WHEREAS, The 30 by 30 program intends to set aside approximately 700 million additional acres of United States land, threatening to permanently isolate and limit such land from responsible and necessary use and enjoyment; and

WHEREAS, Colorado contains 66.6 million acres of land, of which 24.1 million acres are already owned by the United States government, representing 36.2 percent of all Colorado land, most of which is managed by the United States Forest Service; and

WHEREAS, Many Coloradans privately and carefully steward their lands without the need for the federal government to intervene or direct their use; nevertheless, the federal government has already impacted or otherwise taken an estimated 6 percent of privately owned Colorado land, according to Colorado State University, in addition to the 36.2 percent of federally owned land, subjecting it to perpetual conservation easements; and

WHEREAS, Although more than 30 percent of Colorado is currently preserved and conserved in some way by the federal government itself, and although much more of Colorado is properly stewarded by private citizens, the Biden administration has, nevertheless, stated that, to reach the 30 percent target by 2030, the administration will use all the tools in existing law to both restrict the public land we currently share and to take portions of the land or the rights that we privately enjoy, including using conservation easements in perpetuity, establishing federal conservation programs, designating areas as national heritage sites, establishing wildlife corridors, listing species as endangered, and designating areas as critical habitats; and

WHEREAS, There is no constitutional or statutory authority

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| 1 2 3 4 | referenced in section 216 of Executive Order 14008 for the President, the Department of the Interior, the Department of Agriculture, or any other federal agency to set aside and permanently preserve 30 percent of all land and water in the United States; and |
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| 5 6 7 8 | WHEREAS, The goal of preserving and conserving at least 30 percent of the land and water in the United States from the people was not voted on or consented to by the people, the Congress, or the Colorado General Assembly; and |
| 9 10 11 12 13 | WHEREAS, Historically, federal conservation programs artificially drive up the cost of owning land, making it and the housing upon it less affordable, and they directly compete with working landowners who depend on the ability to lease or purchase land for the production of food, fiber, energy, and minerals; and |
| 14 15 16 17 18 | WHEREAS, Placing a parcel of land under a permanent conservation easement reduces the value of the parcel, restricts its use, impacts its individual tax assessment, and invariably increases the tax burden on other Coloradans, especially neighboring landowners, to make up the lost revenue; and |
| 19 20 21 22 23 | WHEREAS, Many Colorado businesses and citizens are involved in or otherwise dependent on industries that use United States lands and their resources, representing an important component of Colorado's economy and contributing to the entire state's economic and social welfare; and |
| 24 25 | WHEREAS, One of these industries, cattle ranching, provides for Colorado's largest export, which is beef; and |
| 26 27 28 29 | WHEREAS, The 30 by 30 program, if implemented, is likely to cause significant harm to the economy of Colorado, injuring Colorado's businesses and Colorado's citizens by depriving them of access to public lands and national forests and preventing the productive use of land; and |
| 30 31 32 33 | WHEREAS, The withdrawal of approximately 700 million acres of federal land from beneficial use and the placement of the lands in permanent conservation status will cause dramatic and irreversible harm to the economies of many western states, including Colorado; and |
| 34 | WHEREAS, The 30 by 30 program, if implemented, will conflict |

HJR23-1022 -4with the plans, policies, and programs of Colorado; interfere with our ways of life; harm our economy; restrict the enjoyment of recreational activities; and not materially benefit the land and environment we protect; now, therefore,

- Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-fourth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:
- (1) That Colorado opposes the 30 by 30 program, including its main objective of conserving and preserving 30 percent of the nation's land in its natural state or any similar program that will prevent the productive use of Colorado land;
- (2) That Colorado opposes the designation of public lands and national forests in Colorado as wilderness, wilderness study areas, wildlife preserves, or open space as well as other designations that restrict public access to those lands and prevent the productive use of the resources of the lands;
- (3) That Colorado supports the continued management of public lands, including national forests, under the principles of multiple use and sustained yield, recognizing the need for domestic sources of minerals, energy, timber, food, and fiber;
- (4) That Colorado supports maintaining and enhancing public access to public lands, including national forests, and opposes road closures, road decommissioning, moratoria on road construction, and other limits on public access to meet the 30 by 30 program's goals;
- (5) That Colorado recognizes and supports Colorado's water rights system, including the doctrine of prior appropriation, and opposes any federal designation of waters and watercourses that would impair or restrict water diversions and uses authorized by Colorado law;
- (6) That Colorado supports reasonable national, regional, and global environmental stewardship policies and goals that are comprehensive, practical, and cost-effective and that do not unnecessarily single out specific industries or activities, but Colorado opposes using climate change as a reason to set aside large tracts of land as preserves or open space under the 30 by 30 program; and
