Current Appropriations Clause in Bill

The bill includes an appropriation clause that adds a provision appropriating \$424,500 cash funds to the Department of Natural Resources from the Oil and Gas Conservation and Environmental Response Fund for FY 2023-24. However, the Revised Fiscal Note identifies \$558,500 cash funds to the Department of Natural Resources from the Oil and Gas Conservation and Environmental Response Fund, which is an increase of \$134,000 compared to the current appropriation. Additionally, the Revised Fiscal Note identifies an appropriation of \$85,361 General Fund and 0.2 FTE to the Department of Public Health and Environment.

Description of Amendments in This Packet

J.002 Staff has prepared amendment **J.002** (attached) to increase the appropriation to the Department of Natural Resources for FY 2023-24 from \$424,500 to \$558,500. The amendment also adds a provision appropriating a total of \$85,361 General Fund to the Department of Public Health and Environment for FY 2023-24. This provision also states that the appropriation is based on the assumption that the Department of Public Health and Environment will require an additional 0.2 FTE.

Points to Consider

General Fund Impact

The Joint Budget Committee has proposed a budget package for FY 2023-24 based on the March 2023 Office of State Planning and Budgeting (OSPB) revenue forecast. The budget package includes two set-asides for legislation outside of the package: (1) \$30.0 million General Fund for bills that create ongoing obligations; and (2) \$469.0 million for bills that create one-time obligations for FY 2023-24 (see table below).

The budget package accounts for the 15.0 percent reserve associated with the above placeholders (a total of \$74.9 million).

This bill creates an ongoing obligation and requires a General Fund appropriation of \$85,361 for FY 2023-24, reducing the \$30.0 million set aside by the same amount.
