Current Appropriations Clause in Bill

The bill includes a provision appropriating \$200,000 General Fund to the Department of Labor and Employment for FY 2023-24. In addition, the provision appropriates \$67,627 cash funds to the Department of Regulatory Agencies, of which \$23,263 is reappropriated to the Department of Law in FY 2023-24. The provision states that the appropriation is based on the assumption that the Department of Regulatory Agencies will require an additional 0.5 FTE and the Department of Law

will require an additional 0.1 FTE.

Points to Consider

General Fund Impact

The Joint Budget Committee has proposed a budget package for FY 2023-24 based on the March 2023 Office of State Planning and Budgeting (OSPB) revenue forecast. The budget package includes two set-asides for legislation outside of the package: (1) \$30.0 million General Fund for bills that create ongoing obligations; and (2) \$469.0 million for bills that create one-time obligations for FY 2023-24 (see table below).

The budget package accounts for the 15.0 percent reserve associated with the above placeholders (a total of \$74.9 million).

This bill creates a one-time obligation and requires a General Fund appropriation of \$200,000 for FY 2023-24, reducing the \$469.0 million set aside by that amount.

The bill also includes an appropriation of \$67,627 cash funds from the Division of Insurance Cash Fund to the Department of Regulatory Agencies for FY 2023-24. Pursuant to Section 10-3-209 (4), C.R.S., taxes on insurance premiums are credited to the Division of Insurance Cash Fund (with a maximum transfer of five percent of premium tax collections) to cover appropriations made by the General Assembly. Any increase in appropriations reduces the amount of tax revenue deposited in the General Fund, thereby reducing the amount of General Fund available for other purposes.
