EXECUTIVE ORDER

Call for the First Extraordinary Session
of the Seventy-Fourth General Assembly

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Governor of the State of Colorado and, in particular, pursuant to article IV, section 9 of the Colorado Constitution, and as recognized in article V, section 7, I, Jared Polis, Governor of the State of Colorado, hereby find that the following extraordinary occasions exist to convene the Seventy-Fourth General Assembly to meet in special session.

I. Background

With home values rising at historic rates across Colorado, Coloradans face an immediate crisis with a forty-percent average increase in their property tax bills if property tax bills are not reduced. Taxpayers are facing higher property tax bills not just this year but in future years, and these are immediate, statewide concerns. Increased property taxes make it harder for Coloradans to stay in their homes, build wealth, and save for the future. Increasing property taxes not only impacts homeowners but also renters that bear the burden of increased costs on landlords. Renters are most vulnerable to increased property taxes because they do not benefit from the corresponding gain in equity, making it harder for hardworking Colorado renters to thrive and have economic freedom. The skyrocketing values affect Coloradans' ability to afford housing costs and an inflationary economy with higher interest rates is making it difficult for fixed-income seniors to stay in a home that was once affordable. Colorado taxpayers deserve and need bipartisan solutions now.

SB 23-303 (presented to voters as Proposition HH) proposed reducing assessment rates and limiting the growth in property tax collections to protect Colorado homeowners. It would have replaced revenue lost to local governments by setting aside \$200 million in general fund and raising the state Taxpayer's Bill of Rights (TABOR) revenue limit for ten years. If Proposition HH had passed, it would have provided immediate relief for nonresidential and residential property owners in Colorado through 2032 without jeopardizing the revenue that goes to support fire districts, libraries, and schools. It also would have created a new subclass of renewable energy agricultural land for valuation for assessment and made the senior homestead exemption portable to give seniors more flexibility to downsize or move to a new property without losing the exemption. SB 23-303 addressed subject matter of significance to the people of Colorado.

Without the passage of Proposition HH at the ballot, there remains an immediate and dire need for solutions to help Coloradans impacted by rising property values. Some counties have warned homeowners that they should expect a forty to fifty percent increase in their 2024 and 2025 property tax bills. For Colorado's working families, the blow of higher property tax is felt in the greater context of rise in interest and inflation

1 rates and cost of living. The General Assembly has the opportunity to
2 provide support and optimism for families as they face next year,
3 especially for the critical low-and-moderate income families that use
4 income tax credits to pay for food and housing costs.

5
6 I am calling this extraordinary session to ask the General Assembly
7 to put people over politics by taking immediate action to provide
8 Colorado taxpayers relief that also balances the interests of local entities
9 funded with property tax revenue. The General Assembly now has the
10 ability to propose a solution that would provide property tax savings to
11 Coloradans while still fully funding schools. As property taxes for 2023
12 become due in early 2024, Coloradans cannot logistically receive
13 additional tax savings for this tax year without the immediate passage of
14 new residential property tax measures. Colorado law sets forth deadlines
15 by which local governments administer property tax. This extraordinary
16 session must begin on November 17, 2023 in order to give local
17 jurisdictions time to administer the new valuations, set levies, and meet
18 the first payment deadline.

19
20 Additionally, low-income Colorado children will benefit from
21 access to food during the summer months when they are not in school,
22 and I am asking the General Assembly to take immediate action to
23 support our children. The Colorado Department of Human Services
24 (CDHS) requires immediate legislative action to meet a federal deadline
25 to access federal Summer Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) funding for
26 over 300,000 food-insecure Colorado children during the summer of
27 2024. Without sufficient clarity prior to the Second Regular Session of
28 the Seventy-Fourth General Assembly, Colorado risks not being able to
29 provide families with needed support to prevent hunger during the
30 summer of 2024.

31
32 This call for an extraordinary session of the General Assembly
33 does not prescribe the specific form that the legislation should take;
34 however, as required by Article IV, section 9 of the Colorado
35 Constitution, the business to be transacted at this special session shall be
36 limited to the matters stated in Section III of this Executive Order.

37 38 II. Purpose and Need

39 40 A. Residential Property Tax Relief

41
42 With Colorado housing values among those increasing the fastest
43 in the nation, we must urgently work together to provide solutions to
44 Colorado homeowners facing significant property tax bill increases. We,
45 therefore, believe it is right and proper to provide immediate relief for the
46 next year, two years, or longer that balances the interests of Colorado
47 taxpayers and essential local government revenue needs like fire
48 department services and school funding.

49
50 The General Assembly should consider taking legislative action to
51 create a property tax relief package to offset value increases that also
52 balances the interests of schools and local governments that are funded
53 with property tax. This could include but is not limited to changes to
54 reserve policy, general fund, and TABOR tax refund mechanisms.

55

1 Simultaneously, to ensure that we are protecting Colorado
2 taxpayers from future extreme property tax increases and being fiscally
3 responsible, the General Assembly should also consider creating and
4 providing a process to review and recommend long-term property tax
5 relief. The General Assembly should consider a review of best practices
6 to create property tax relief for homeowners and businesses, while
7 preventing lapses in the administration of public services by local
8 governments that rely on property tax revenue to provide such public
9 services, and make legislative changes to create long-term tax relief and
10 stability for Colorado homeowners and businesses.

11 12 B. Resources to Enable Colorado's Families to Receive Summer EBT

13
14 In 2022, Congress enacted the Consolidated Appropriations Act
15 (PL 117-328), increasing access to meals for children during the summer
16 months. Summer EBT is a new, permanent federal program to provide
17 nutrition benefits to qualifying families for the months in which students
18 are not in school. By participating in the program, Colorado would
19 receive an estimated \$35 million annually for over 300,000 food-insecure
20 Colorado children during the critical summer months when there is
21 limited access to other resources such as the free and reduced lunch
22 program. States have until January 1, 2024 to provide the U.S.
23 Department of Agriculture with an intent to administer the program for
24 summer 2024. The need to rapidly establish systems and structures for
25 this new program necessitates immediate action before the Second
26 Regular Session of the 74th General Assembly to reduce the risk of
27 non-compliance.

28
29 Given this critical timeline, the General Assembly should consider
30 taking appropriate legislative action to allow the CDHS to establish and
31 administer this program in partnership with CDE beginning in summer
32 2024. Such action should include but is not limited to providing resources
33 for program administration and establishing relevant departmental
34 authorities, including the authority to issue benefits, promulgate rules, and
35 access the data needed for the purposes of administering the Summer
36 EBT program in accordance with federal law.

37 38 III. Proclamation

39
40 I, Jared Polis, Governor of the State of Colorado, with this proclamation
41 find extraordinary occasions exist to convene the Seventy-Fourth General
42 Assembly of this State and summon the members of the Seventy-Fourth
43 General Assembly to meet in Special Session at 9:00 AM on November
44 17, 2023, at the State Capitol, in the City and County of Denver, and
45 designate the following specific subjects for consideration, appropriate
46 legislative action, and finding:

47
48 A. Concerning a property tax relief package to reduce Coloradans'
49 property tax burden in 2023.

50
51 B. Concerning the fiscal impact of the tax relief package on the
52 interests of schools and local governments that are funded with property
53 tax potentially utilizing reserves, TABOR surplus, and general fund.

54
55 C. Concerning necessary administrative changes attributed to the
56 tax relief package only for 2023.

- 1 D. Concerning TABOR tax refund mechanisms only for 2023.
- 2
- 3 E. Concerning rental assistance only during the 2022-2023 fiscal
- 4 year.
- 5 F. Concerning adjustments to the Earned Income Tax Credit only
- 6 for the 2023 tax year, utilizing resources available from 2022-2023 fiscal
- 7 year.
- 8 G. Concerning the creation of a process to review and make
- 9 recommendations on long-term property tax relief.
- 10
- 11 H. Concerning the nutrition of over 300,000 food-insecure
- 12 Colorado children during the summer months by establishing
- 13 departmental authority to authorize the Summer Electronic Benefits
- 14 Transfer program in Colorado beginning in summer 2024.

27 (a) Colorado has experienced historic growth in property values
28 which has caused property taxes to rise well above the rate of inflation,
29 contributing to an increase in the cost of housing;

30 (b) Legislation passed in 2022 and 2023 temporarily reduced
31 property taxes for homeowners and businesses;

32 (c) It is important that leaders come together to work towards
33 developing a property tax structure for future years that balances the
34 needs of homeowners, businesses, and local governments that rely on
35 property tax to provide local services;

36 (d) The state of Colorado has a long tradition of respecting local
37 control. In furtherance of that tradition, the general assembly declares that
38 buy-in and involvement from individuals with an intimate understanding
39 of the needs of their communities will be crucial in realizing its goal to
40 develop a permanent and sustainable property tax structure for the state.

41 (e) Colorado public schools receive over half of their funding
42 from property tax and the Colorado general assembly has a bipartisan
43 objective to fully fund the Public School Finance Act without a budget
44 stabilization factor; and

45 (f) Renters pay property taxes through their rent, which
46 contributes to the high cost of housing, making renters an important
47 consideration in any property tax proposal.
