A BILL FOR AN ACT
CONCERNING THE EXPANSION OF PENALTY MITIGATION UNDER THE
ALCOHOL BEVERAGE LAWS FOR VENDORS MEETING THE
DEFINITION OF A "RESPONSIBLE VENDOR" AS PROVIDED BY LAW

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. The bill requires state and local liquor licensing authorities to consider it a mitigating factor for certain violations of the state alcohol beverage laws, including sales to minors, sales to visibly intoxicated patrons, and other violations approved by rule of the state licensing authority, if a licensee meets the requirements of a "responsible vendor"
