**BILL TOPIC:** ALLOW ELECTRONIC COMMITTEE PARTICIPATION DURING INTERIM

**Summary of Legislation**

The bill permits the executive committee of the Legislative Council to establish policies allowing members of the General Assembly to participate electronically in committee meetings occurring during the legislative interim. Members who participate electronically must be counted for purposes of establishing a committee's quorum, but only members attending meetings in person are permitted to vote. Members who participate electronically may receive per diem or other compensation they are otherwise entitled to claim for attendance at the meeting, but may not be reimbursed for any expenses incurred to participate electronically.

**Background**

House Bill 14-1303 authorized the executive committee of the Legislative Council to establish policies allowing legislative committees to take remote testimony from one or more centralized sites around the state. In 2016, remote testimony is available at five locations in the state: Colorado Mesa University in Grand Junction, Otero Junior College in La Junta, Fort Lewis College in Durango, and Trinidad Junior College in Trinidad and Alamosa. Five committee rooms in the Capitol and Legislative Services Building have been outfitted with the necessary equipment to facilitate remote testimony.

**State Expenditures**

Conditional upon the executive committee of the Legislative Council making rules permitting electronic participation in committee meetings during the interim, the bill may reduce expenditures for the Legislative Department beginning in FY 2016-17. Allowing committee members to

participate remotely decreases the amount reimbursed to those members in travel costs to attend interim committee meetings in Denver. For example, if a legislator from the Western Slope attended a meeting electronically, the cost savings would be approximately \$410 (\$260 for mileage and \$150 for hotel) per meeting; a legislator from southern Colorado would save approximately \$255 (\$105 for mileage and \$150 for hotel) per meeting.

Some of these costs may be offset by increased per diem expenditures if members attend a meeting remotely that they otherwise would not have attended at all. Legislators receive \$119 in salary and supplemental benefits per meeting day attended. However, as it is not known how many or how often members would participate in meetings electronically, the specific fiscal impact has not been estimated.

**Staffing costs.** The bill also increases the workload for the Legislative Council Staff to staff the meetings in which members are attending remotely. This increase in workload does not require an additional appropriation.

## Effective Date

The bill takes effect upon signature of the Governor, or upon becoming law without his signature.
