**BILL TOPIC:** PROHIBITS CONVERSION THERAPY MENTAL HEALTH PROVIDER

**NOTE: This bill was not enacted into law; therefore, the impacts identified in this analysis do not take effect.**

**Summary of Legislation**

The bill prohibits physicians specializing in psychiatry and licensed or registered mental health professionals from engaging in conversion therapy with patients under 18 years of age. The bill defines "conversion therapy" as practices that seek to change an individual's sexual orientation or gender identity, including efforts to change behaviors or gender expressions, or to eliminate or reduce sexual or romantic attraction to individuals of the same sex. Violations of this prohibition are addressed through the disciplinary processes for these regulated professionals.

Certain psychotherapies are exempted from the definition of conversion therapy if they provide acceptance, support, and understanding for the facilitation of an individual's coping, social support, and identity exploration and development. Sexual orientation-neutral interventions to prevent or address unlawful conduct or unsafe sexual practices are also permitted, so long as they do not seek to change the patient's sexual orientation or gender identity. Therapies are also allowed to assist a person undergoing gender transition.

**State Expenditures**

The bill may increase workload in the Department of Regulatory Agencies for the Colorado Medical Board and the state's six mental health professional boards to review complaints, conduct investigations, hold hearings, and take disciplinary action against practitioners who engage in conversion therapy with minors. The fiscal note assumes that no rulemaking is required. Workload may also increase in the Office of Administrative Courts in the Department of Personnel and Administration if administrative hearings are required in these cases. Generally, the fiscal note

assumes that regulated psychiatrists and mental health professionals will have a high level of compliance and will not engage in prohibited practices. Therefore, any impact to these agencies is assumed to be minimal and no change in appropriations are required for any state agency.

## Effective Date

The bill was postponed indefinitely by the Senate State, Veterans, and Military Affairs Committee on March 22, 2017.
