A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH SAFER STREETS UTILIZING
102 DESIGN MANAGEMENT STRATEGIES, AND, IN CONNECTION
103 THEREWITH, MAKING AN APPROPRIATION.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. The bill creates the crime prevention through safer streets grant program (grant program) in the department of public safety (DPS). The bill requires DPS to issue requests for proposals to local governmental agencies for the agencies to identify areas where crime is prevalent. After identifying such areas, local governmental agencies can apply to DPS for

grants for improvements designed to create safer streets.

The bill directs DPS to establish policies and procedures for the grant program. It also creates an advisory committee to review grant requests and make recommendations to the executive director of DPS. The executive director reviews responses to the requests for proposals and grants and determines which local governmental agencies will receive money and the amount of each grant.

The bill appropriates \$10.3 million to DPS for the grant program.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, **add** 24-33.5-117 as follows:

24-33.5-117. Crime prevention through safer streets grant program - created - committee - reports - repeal. (1) THERE IS CREATED IN THE DEPARTMENT THE CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH SAFER STREETS GRANT PROGRAM, REFERRED TO IN THIS SECTION AS THE "GRANT PROGRAM". THE GRANT PROGRAM ALLOWS THE DEPARTMENT AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS TO EVALUATE AND DESIGN SAFER STREETS AND NEIGHBORHOOD MODELS THAT DISCOURAGE CRIME, REVITALIZE COMMUNITY IMAGE, AND ESTABLISH PLACE-SPECIFIC CRIME PREVENTION STRATEGIES THAT ACCOUNT FOR GEOGRAPHIC, CULTURAL, ECONOMIC, AND SOCIAL CHARACTERISTICS OF THE TARGET AREAS. THE DEPARTMENT SHALL ADMINISTER THE GRANT PROGRAM PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION. **AND SOCIAL CHARACTERISTICS OF THE TARGET AREAS. SUBJECT TO AVAILABLE APPROPRIATIONS, THE DEPARTMENT MAY PROVIDE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TO AGENCIES INTERESTED IN SUBMITTING RESPONSIVE PROPOSALS. AFTER AREAS WHERE CRIME IS MORE PREVALENT ARE IDENTIFIED, LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES MAY SUBMIT A GRANT APPLICATION TO THE DEPARTMENT FOR A GRANT TO PAY FOR IMPROVEMENTS DESIGNED TO DECREASE THE INCIDENCE OF CRIME AND**

1 CREATE SAFER STREETS. A LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY MAY PARTNER
2 WITH A COMMUNITY-BASED NONPROFIT ORGANIZATION TO SUBMIT A JOINT
3 APPLICATION TO THE DEPARTMENT FOR A GRANT TO PAY FOR
4 IMPROVEMENTS DESIGNED TO DECREASE THE INCIDENCE OF CRIME AND
5 CREATE SAFER STREETS. SUCH IMPROVEMENTS MAY INCLUDE:

- 6 (a) BETTER LIGHTING;
- 7 (b) IMPROVED TRASH COLLECTION;
- 8 (c) ACCESS CONTROL;
- 9 (d) TERRITORIAL REINFORCEMENT; AND
- 10 (e) IMPROVED SPACE MANAGEMENT.

11 (2) THE DEPARTMENT SHALL DEVELOP POLICIES AND PROCEDURES:

- 12 (a) FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES TO SUBMIT RESPONSES
13 TO THE REQUESTS FOR PROPOSALS AND GRANT APPLICATIONS TO GUIDE
14 LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES IN THEIR APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS;

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16 (b) ENSURING THAT MONEY FROM THE GRANT AWARD IS NOT USED
17 FOR:

18 (I) HIRING LAW ENFORCEMENT OR CODE ENFORCEMENT
19 PERSONNEL OR PEACE OFFICERS;

20 (II) FACIAL RECOGNITION PURPOSES; OR

21 (III) SURVEILLANCE PROGRAMS THAT UTILIZE NETWORKS OF
22 SENSORS TO DETECT GUNSHOTS, COMMONLY REFERRED TO AS A
23 "SHOTSPOTTER" PROGRAM;

24 (c) ENSURING THAT MONEY FROM THE GRANT AWARD ENHANCES
25 COMMUNITY SAFETY BOTH INSIDE AND OUTSIDE OF URBAN AREAS; AND

26 (d) RELATED TO HOW MONEY IS DISBURSED TO AGENCIES.

27 (3) ALL GRANT APPLICATIONS MUST ADDRESS:

1 (a) THE TARGET AREA AND CRIME CHALLENGE THE APPLICANT
2 HOPES TO ADDRESS;

3 (b) DATA REGARDING THE INCIDENCE OF CRIME IN THE TARGET
4 AREA, DISAGGREGATED BY THE TYPE OF CRIME, AND DEMOGRAPHIC DATA;

5 (c) THE SPECIFIC PROJECTS THE GRANT WOULD FUND;

6 (d) MEASURABLE OR OBSERVABLE GOALS TO DECREASE THE
7 INCIDENCE OF CRIME, DISAGGREGATED BY THE TYPE OF CRIME;

8 (e) DETAILS ON HOW THE APPLICANT HAS COLLABORATED WITH
9 COMMUNITIES AND OTHER AGENCIES IN DEVELOPING THE IMPROVEMENTS
10 TO BE FUNDED UNDER THE APPLICATION; AND

11 (f) DETAILS ON HOW THE PLAN WOULD PREVENT THE
12 DISPLACEMENT OF HOMELESS POPULATIONS AND HARM TO COMMUNITIES
13 OF COLOR AND VULNERABLE POPULATIONS.

14 (4) PRIOR TO SUBMITTING GRANT APPLICATIONS TO THE
15 DEPARTMENT, LOCAL GOVERNMENT AGENCIES SHALL SOLICIT FEEDBACK
16 AND CONSULT WITH IMPACTED COMMUNITIES, INCLUDING BUT NOT
17 LIMITED TO AREA RESIDENTS AND BUSINESS OWNERS; HOMEOWNERS'
18 ASSOCIATIONS; REGISTERED NEIGHBORHOOD ORGANIZATIONS; AND
19 EXPERTS IN ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN, INCLUDING URBAN AND
20 TRANSPORTATION PLANNING PROFESSIONALS AND ARCHITECTS WITH
21 RELEVANT EXPERIENCE IN ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN.

22 (5) THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SHALL:

23 (a) REVIEW RESPONSES TO REQUESTS FOR PROPOSALS TO IDENTIFY
24 AREAS AROUND THE STATE WHERE CRIME IS MORE PREVALENT, SELECT
25 LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES TO RECEIVE MONEY TO IDENTIFY SUCH
26 AREAS, AND DETERMINE THE AMOUNT OF MONEY FOR EACH AGENCY;

27 (b) DEVELOP AND DISTRIBUTE GUIDELINES THAT APPLICANTS MUST

1 USE TO DEMONSTRATE:

2 (I) SUFFICIENT CONSULTATION AND COLLABORATION WITH THE
3 RELEVANT IMPACTED COMMUNITY WHERE A PROJECT WOULD TAKE PLACE;

4 (II) SUFFICIENT INDICATION OF COMMUNITY SUPPORT FOR THE
5 PROJECTS INCLUDED IN THE GRANT APPLICATION; AND

6 (III) A SUFFICIENT PLAN TO PREVENT THE DISPLACEMENT OF
7 HOMELESS POPULATIONS AND HARMS TO COMMUNITIES OF COLOR AND
8 OTHER VULNERABLE POPULATIONS.

9 (c) APPOINT MEMBERS OF THE CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH SAFER
10 STREETS ADVISORY COMMITTEE ESTABLISHED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION
11 (6) OF THIS SECTION; AND

12 (d) SELECT GRANT RECIPIENTS FOR THE GRANT PROGRAM AND
13 DETERMINE THE AMOUNT OF EACH GRANT AFTER REVIEWING THE
14 RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE AND DETERMINING THAT EACH
15 SELECTED APPLICANT HAS DEMONSTRATED:

16 (I) SUFFICIENT CONSULTATION AND COLLABORATION WITH THE
17 RELEVANT IMPACTED COMMUNITY WHERE A PROJECT WOULD TAKE PLACE;

18 (II) SUFFICIENT INDICATION OF COMMUNITY SUPPORT FOR THE
19 PROJECTS INCLUDED IN THE GRANT APPLICATION; AND

20 (III) A SUFFICIENT PLAN TO PREVENT THE DISPLACEMENT OF
21 HOMELESS POPULATIONS AND HARMS TO COMMUNITIES OF COLOR AND
22 OTHER VULNERABLE POPULATIONS.

23 (6) (a) THERE IS CREATED IN THE DEPARTMENT THE CRIME
24 PREVENTION THROUGH SAFER STREETS ADVISORY COMMITTEE, REFERRED
25 TO IN THIS SECTION AS THE "COMMITTEE". THE COMMITTEE CONSISTS OF
26 THE FOLLOWING ELEVEN PERSONS, WHO ARE APPOINTED BY THE
27 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR:

- 1 (I) TWO MEMBERS OF LAW ENFORCEMENT;
- 2 (II) TWO ELECTED LOCAL OFFICIALS, ONE FROM AN URBAN
- 3 COMMUNITY AND ONE FROM A RURAL COMMUNITY;
- 4 (III) AN EXPERT IN SITUATIONAL CRIME PREVENTION;
- 5 (IV) THREE PERSONS FROM ORGANIZATIONS REPRESENTING
- 6 COMMUNITY INTERESTS;
- 7 (V) AN EXPERT WITH A BACKGROUND IN URBAN OR
- 8 TRANSPORTATION PLANNING;
- 9 (VI) AN ARCHITECT WITH EXPERIENCE IN CRIME PREVENTION
- 10 THROUGH ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN; AND
- 11 (VII) AN EXPERT IN EQUITY, DIVERSITY, AND INCLUSIVITY IN THE
- 12 LAW ENFORCEMENT OR PUBLIC SAFETY FIELD.

13 (b) MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE SERVE WITHOUT COMPENSATION
14 AND WITHOUT REIMBURSEMENT FOR EXPENSES.

15 (c) THE COMMITTEE SHALL REVIEW APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS
16 FOR SAFER STREETS AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE EXECUTIVE
17 DIRECTOR FOR WHICH GRANTS TO APPROVE AND THE AMOUNT OF EACH
18 GRANT. IN MAKING ITS RECOMMENDATIONS, THE COMMITTEE SHALL
19 CONSIDER THE APPLICANT'S:

- 20 (I) PLAN TO PREVENT:
- 21 (A) THE DISPLACEMENT OF HOMELESS POPULATIONS; AND
- 22 (B) HARM TO COMMUNITIES OF COLOR AND VULNERABLE
- 23 POPULATIONS; AND
- 24 (II) MEASURABLE OR OBSERVABLE GOALS TO DECREASE THE
- 25 INCIDENCE OF CRIME IN ACCORDANCE WITH SUBSECTION (3)(d) OF THIS
- 26 SECTION.

27 (7) THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY SHALL APPROPRIATE TEN MILLION

1 THREE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS IN FISCAL YEAR 2022-23 FROM THE
2 GENERAL FUND FOR THE GRANT PROGRAM.

3 (8) ON OR BEFORE JUNE 30, 2024, EACH LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL
4 AGENCY THAT RECEIVES A GRANT SHALL PROVIDE A FINAL REPORT TO THE
5 DEPARTMENT DESCRIBING HOW THE GRANT MONEY WAS UTILIZED AND
6 WHAT MEASURABLE OR OBSERVABLE IMPACTS THE USE OF THE GRANT
7 MONEY HAD ON REDUCING CRIME DISAGGREGATED BY THE TYPE OF CRIME
8 AND DEMOGRAPHIC INFORMATION. ON OR BEFORE OCTOBER 1, 2023, THE
9 DEPARTMENT SHALL SUBMIT A SUMMARY OF THE REPORTS TO THE
10 JUDICIARY COMMITTEES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND SENATE,
11 OR TO ANY SUCCESSOR COMMITTEES.

12 (9) THIS SECTION IS REPEALED, EFFECTIVE NOVEMBER 1, 2023.

13 **SECTION 2. Appropriation.** For the 2022-23 state fiscal year,
14 \$10,300,000 is appropriated to the department of public safety for use by
15 the division of criminal justice. This appropriation is from the general
16 fund and is based on an assumption that the department will require an
17 additional 2.0 FTE. To implement this act, the department may use this
18 appropriation for DCJ administrative services.

19 **SECTION 3. Safety clause.** The general assembly hereby finds,
20 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
21 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety.
