This bill requires crisis system facilities and programs to meet certain standards and provides other clarifications. It will increase state workload in FY 2022-23 only.

Appropriation Summary: No appropriation is required.

Fiscal Note Status: The final fiscal note reflects the enacted bill.

Summary of Legislation

This bill requires crisis system facilities and programs, including walk-in centers and mobile crisis programs, to meet minimum regulatory standards that include mental health and substance use disorder standards. Additionally, this bill clarifies that mobile crisis services and walk-in center services can be provided to youth without parental or guardian consent.

State Expenditures

In FY 2022-23 only, the bill will increase workload in the Division of Community Behavioral Health in the Department of Human Services to update crisis system program rules and contracts to ensure minimum regulatory standards are met. No change in appropriations is required.

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor and took effect April 27, 2022.
