HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 24-1015
CONCERNING RECOGNITION OF THE CONTRIBUTIONS OF LATINA AND
LATINO VETERANS.
WHEREAS, A diverse group with shared history and culture that
identifies as Latina/o, Hispanic, and Chicana/o, among other shared
identities, including many faiths, orientations, and all gender identities
has fought in support of the United States and the cause of freedom in
every American conflict since the American Revolution; and
WHEREAS, During the Revolutionary War, Colonel Bernardo de
Galvez, the Spanish governor of the Louisiana territories, and his men
helped General George Washington and the Continental Army defeat the
British forces advancing into the then-southwestern U.S. territories; and
WHEREAS, In the 150 years following the American Revolution,

1	Latina/o service members fought with distinction in support of the United
2	States in conflicts including the Spanish-American War and World War
3	I. During World War II, Latina/o contributions in the Armed Forces
4	increased extraordinarily; and
5	WHEREAS, Nearly 500,000 Latina/o Americans, many of them
6	women and the children of immigrants, fought for the cause of freedom
7 8	in World War II, among them the 158th Regimental Combat Team, nicknamed the "Bushmasters", and Company E of the 141st Infantry
9	Regiment, which consisted entirely of Mexican-American soldiers; and
10	WHEREAS, In 1948, in the aftermath of World War II, Dr. Hector
11	Garcia founded the American GI Forum to ensure educational, medical,
12	housing, and other benefits and services for Latina/o veterans. Dr. Garcia
13	and the American GI Forum worked diligently to secure equal access to
14	benefits, and in 1984, Dr. Garcia was the first Mexican American to
15	receive the Presidential Medal of Freedom; and
16	WHEREAS, In the Korean War, the Puerto Rican 65th Infantry
17	Regiment, also known as "the Borinqueneers", served with distinction and
18	valor-for their efforts they were awarded two Presidential Unit Citations,
19	a Meritorious Unit Commendation, and two Republic of Korea
20	Presidential Unit Citations. In 2014, the unit was recognized with a
21	Congressional Gold Medal; and
22	WHEREAS, During the Vietnam War, more than 80,000 Latina/o
23	service members served, 22 of whom were awarded the Congressional
24	Medal of Honor; Latinas/os have also served the United States in the War
25	on Terror, Gulf Wars, and elsewhere; and
26	WHEREAS, In total, 61 Latina/o veterans have been awarded the
27	Congressional Medal of Honor for service in the United States Armed
28	Forces-the medal is the country's highest award for military valor; and
29	WHEREAS, Today, more than 200,000 Latinas/os are active duty
30	members of the Armed Forces, and more than 1.4 million Latina/o
31	veterans call the United States, including Colorado, home; now, therefore,
32	Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the
33	Seventy-fourth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate
34	concurring herein

3	served the cause of freedom as part of the Armed Forces of the United
4	States.
